

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

Don't be fooled – Hollywood still hates women

CRACK OPEN THE FIZZ and squeeze vourself into a t*t-crushing sample-size gown because Hollywood's favourite night of earnest backslapping is here again! There's a harsh irony in the fact that, since the Academy Awards' inception in 1929, it's leading ladies who have dominated the headlines in the days following the event - be they a weeping Gwyneth Paltrow, Björk wearing the lifeless corpse of a swan or Hattie McDaniel, the first African-American to win an award for her role in Gone With The Wind – and yet it's women who remain grasping the s**tty end of the film industry stick. And don't get us started on the fact that this is a pattern repeated across the globe in far less glamorous, less well-paid sectors without any tit-crushing frocks at all.

This year will doubtless be no different. The Time's Up campaign might be readying its biggest moment in the global spotlight so far but women are still vastly, ludicrously underrepresented in film. 





hen NME meets Steen, drummer Charlie Forbes, guitarists Sean Coyle-Smith and Eddie Green and bassist Josh Finerty at a London café the following day, the stereo is pumping out – appropriately enough – Oasis' 'Some Might Say'.

Did they realise that there were a couple of Gallagher brothers in the audience? "Yeah," laughs Coyle-Smith. "My mum was like, 'Did you see that Liam Gallagher from Oasis is here?' I was like, 'Mum, Liam Gallagher's not 19 – that's his son."

More important, of course, are the bands Shame have forged something of a south London scene with. Brixton dive bar the Windmill serves as the groups' shared stomping ground, and Steen describes last night's mass migration to central London as "like a reunion". Asked if he's bothered about the 100 Club's place in punk legend, Coyle-Smith replies, "Back when the Sex Pistols were playing it [in 1976], it was just a s**t club. It's a bit different now, going to this place with all this grandiose [reputation]."

Shame formed in a similarly scuzzy Brixton pub – The Queen's Head, formerly home to Fat White Family. They met through school and college, but credit the boozer – a spit-and-sawdust carnival of hedonism where the then 17-year-olds could rehearse – with enabling them to become Shame. As might be expected, given their history, their conversation is jokey, breathless and overlapping, and never more so than when they're recalling their salad days at The Queen's Head.

There was the memorable drag night. "It was four in the morning and

the place was rammed," Coyle-Smith recalls. "The landlord was dancing on the bar and went like that (mimes lifting his dress) and was wearing no underwear." For clarity, he adds: "He got out his c**k and his balls."

There was the day that one of the Fat Whites' beds caught fire and another when a man banged a big bag of asbestos on the bar. "One thing you're not supposed to do with asbestos is disturb it," Coyle-Smith notes sagely. "It releases the poisons and s**t and you die."

Shame lived to tell the tale, though The Queen's Head became a gastropub in 2015. "[In its heyday] it was like you were always walking into the middle of something when you walked in there," Steen says. "When it closed down, everyone was left stranded." Forbes adds, "It felt like we were back to square one. It was like, 'Where do we go and what do we do now?"

The answer, of course, is the Windmill. Shame agree the scene is at least tangentially politicised in the sense that it's a youth movement emerging as a reaction to the mainstream. "It does go hand in hand with [the fact that] in the last election there was a much larger youth turnout," says Finerty. "I think that's because of people getting more involved with politics and people speaking their opinions. A lot of young artists did speak out for Jeremy Corbyn. We're all f**ked right now, and that's definitely a catalyst for being more outspoken and political."

Shame broadly support the Labour leader and admire the #grime4corbyn movement. "A youthful voice is becoming more prominent," Steen proclaims. "Bands have a lot more to

say. We're living in a very exciting time for music and might just not realise the importance of it at the moment."

Coyle-Smith believes that the Queen's Head "gave us an old-school mindset". Perhaps that's why Shame sometimes feel like a political band from the Thatcher era (they once sold posters that read, "If you vote Tory you're a c**t", and in 2017 recorded the non-album track 'Visa Vulture', a protest against Theresa May's record as Home Secretary). For all this, though, 'Songs Of Praise' is as playful. lyrically, as the album's authors are in person (not least when the track 'The Lick' lightly pokes fun at NME). Shame gigged relentlessly last year - another example of their old-school mentality - and days after their *NME* interview will launch their upcoming Australian tour, followed by American shows and, eventually, UK dates in April. It's perhaps this pressure that causes the

afternoon's sole moment of tension.

Steen is saying he wants to slow down a little when it comes to touring, as 2017's relentless schedule caused him to end the year with a series of panic attacks, a fact he's brought up in previous interviews. Looking at the table, Coyle-Smith savs. "Don't talk about that," which leads Steen to flare up, "What do you mean, stop talking about that?"

Coyle-Smith: "I just mean... In every interview."

Steen: "In every interview? Talking about something that happened to me last month? Like my mental health that meant for us to cancel that tour and come back and you're saying -"

Coyle-Smith: "I know; the same thing happened to me."

Steen: "I know, but then talk about it."

It's natural Coyle-Smith and Steen should have the occasional bust-up; they've been close since primary school, after all. What's clear, though, is that Steen sometimes veers into more heavyweight

conversation before he's drawn back into the rest of Shame's japes. He often looks at the Dictaphone when he speaks, as though it's inhaling his words like that thing in *Ghostbusters* that collects ghosts. When the interview wraps up, Steen quietly approaches NME to arrange a separate follow-up chat. "Can you call me tomorrow? Or maybe we can meet up?" Perhaps he has a few things to exorcise.

n enormous, bear-like German Shepherd called Lucky lopes up and down the roof of the building as NME approaches the Windmill, the venue for the rendezvous. Daylight is unkind to the club's interior, which appears to be adorned with a thin layer of ectoplasm. A blackboard reveals that, sure enough, south London faves Hotel Lux, Sorry and Goat Girl will continue to champion the scene that gave us Shame. When Steen shuffles in. followed closely by bandmate Green, he mutters with a sly grin, "Eddie's come to babysit me. He's come to make sure I don't say anything stupid."

Green and Steen chat with a grizzled promoter called Tim, who fishes out two contraband cans of lager he confiscated from teenagers the other night. Shame have played countless gigs at the Windmill, most of which concluded with Steen shirtless, which he attributes to self-consciousness about his body image. "The first time I got onstage was the first time I felt freed from any criticism," he explains. "I could dismiss any thoughts of humiliation and was able to find empowerment in that. There's just one fragment of time in your day where you're untouchable. That builds your confidence as a person."

Steen is more considered than he was in the group interview. He's aware that some onlookers might mislabel Shame as lunkhead lads - and is determined to prove otherwise. "That experience of liberation from critique is the environment we try to create in our live performance," he says. "That's why the energy from the crowd is so important at our gigs - it's not just about us when we're onstage."

There was a punch-up at an early Shame show and Steen now says firmly, "Anyone who's bringing such aggression and harassment to one of our shows isn't welcome. It's supposed to be a safe space, an environment where everyone that wants to be involved can get involved. Anyone who wants to disturb that is completely unjust. That is never something we've

wanted or condoned - I don't want anyone to fall or be hurt or harassed in the crowd. That's everything we want to avoid and it's disgraceful that it happened in the first place. We want to do everything we can to prevent that from happening again." He then voices support for Girls Against, the activists dedicated to

eradicating sexual harassment at shows, "We are part of a completely new generation addressing issues that should have been addressed at the beginning of pop culture and should never have arisen in the first place," he says. "I think that [at punk shows in general] there may be some intimidation that comes from male aggression and that's something that we want to dissolve so everyone can be involved."

And what of his own wellbeing? Steen gently downplays his previous remark about anxiety, though uses the opportunity to make a point about mental health stigma in society at large. "Any band that has to endure the mental strain of sleep deprivation and constant moving will experience that,"

he says. "We gigged and gigged until it broke us - and it eventually broke my mind. This must be one of the only professions in the world where you'll be shivering in the corner, you've thrown up 12 times in one day and you're basically on the verge of tears - and then a promoter pokes you in the chest and says, "Go onstage, monkey, go onstage." He continues, "One in four people that you meet have anxiety. It's a prominent issue, and a situation that needs to be addressed."

In illustrating the issue, Steen mentions a scene in the Oasis documentary Supersonic where Noel Gallagher snorts dismissively of bassist Paul McGuigan's anxiety, "Nervous exhaustion? What's that - being in a band?" Things were different in the '90s, a truth emphasised when 20-year-old Steen speaks thoughtfully on a range of social issues. In many ways, Shame are an average bunch of lads, but Steen's desire to publicly explore social concerns indicates a sensitivity that sets them apart. He

sometimes runs out of steam when talking about the heavy stuff - perhaps that's why he drafted Eddie in as support - but, as he points out, "We're only 20 years old so we're still learning a lot about ourselves."

As that 100 Club show proved, Shame retain the energy of each youth guitar movement before them - Britpop via punk via post-punk and bring it into focus for 2018. Perhaps in 20 years, Steen's kids will swan into the Windmill to hear whichever new band is making a similarly joyous NME racket.

As Imagine Dragons' UK tour wraps up, Dan Reynolds takes Mark Beaumont inside the band's tortured soul

DAN REYNOLDS IS THE singer and emotional wellspring of Imagine Dragons, the 12 million-selling phenomenon who merge pop, R&B, EDM and country into their monumentally popular, vacuum-sealed, training-bra rock tunes. But you don't have to dig too deep into Reynolds' lyrics to uncover torment. If second album 'Smoke + Mirrors' "was written during the worst place in my life - I was dealing with suicidality," then their Top Five third 'Evolve' "is exactly that - I've been evolving". It might mark a breakthrough, but it delves into the darkness beneath Imagine Dragons' colourful scales...

THE TORTURED TEEN ANGST

KEY LYRIC: "Kids were laughing in my classes / While I was scheming for the masses / 'Who do you think you are? / Dreaming 'bout being a big star'"

"When I was in middle school, I had one friend," Dan says. "I was not good at making friends. I had a really hard adolescence. Really bad acne, an expander in my mouth so all my teeth were half an inch away from each other, I didn't fit into any group. I went home every day and I'd make music on the computer, that was my refuge. It was my secret that's how Imagine Dragons began. I hate the word 'outcast' because it's such a cliché, but I was a bit of a

recluse. I feel like I've been stuck in the head of a teenage adolescent for 15 years. That's why Imagine Dragons' music is always so angsty, over the top, dramatic, almost like a school boy complaining..."

His musical ambitions weren't taken too seriously at home either. Brought up in a Mormon family in Las Vegas surrounded by brothers who were doctors and attorneys, Dan's music was considered a hobby, right up until he dropped out of college to perform full-time. "It's taken a while to really let myself believe that art is just as important and that music, as stupid as it sounds, also saves lives," he says. "It saved my life - it's been my real religion."

THE REBELLIOUS STREAK

KEY LYRIC: "Just a young gun with a quick fuse... / Not a yes sir, not a follower" 'Thunder'

Dan clashed with his family over religion from an early age. His first songs concerned his loss of faith. "things that I couldn't say to my mom and dad but I could hide it in the music, very metaphorically," and the strict rules of Mormonism didn't exactly gel with his natural human instincts. Aged 18, he was kicked out of the Mormon-owned Brigham Young University in Utah when he confessed he'd slept with his girlfriend of four vears out of wedlock.

"That was a shaming experience for me," he says. "My entire community – or so I felt – looked at me as if I was dirty, which was

devastating and humiliating. I also felt like God looked at me as dirty, even though my heart said, 'This is fine, you're OK'. I stayed home for a year and all my friends went off to college. It first triggered depression in my life. My whole world just felt like it crumbled. I dealt with that for 10-plus years."

God should have had more faith in Dan - it's not like he's become the Mormon Nikki Sixx. "Even if I wasn't married, I don't identify with that part of rock'n'roll," Dan says. "As far as drugs and stuff, I understand that appeal big time and I have to be careful because I easily succumb to substance abuse... I'm a very all-ornothing person. I've stopped myself from chasing down some rabbit holes that I've found to be very dangerous."



Hence Dan's recent

documentary Believer,

Imbued with gospel, Celtic, Afrobeat and road-ravaged rock elements as a result of touring the world, Reynolds' tribute to his 'difficult' relationship with his parents introduced their millionselling second album 'Smoke + Mirrors'.

It's not all revving off into the sunset of success, however. 'Evolve' hints at the loneliness of the road and the strains fame puts on relationships. And then there are us dratted critics.

"[Fame is] a beautiful thing," Dan says. "I don't know if I'd be here today if it wasn't for art and having these people listen. But it comes with shaking the devil's hand: 'Yes I'll open my heart for the whole world to see and let some people take a s**t on it'. And if you're a sensitive person, there's gonna be times where you wanna hide in a hole and take it all back, but you can't... Imagine Dragons has been like opening my chest so everyone can see my heart and saying, 'Damn it's really broken, this sucks'. So to have someone laugh and say it was a joke or overdramatic..."

Some might consider Imagine Dragons as a prime symbol of rock being swallowed whole by pop. What would Kurt Cobain make of Imagine Dragons?

Dan grins. "What a loaded question. Part of the reason I love Nirvana was I felt [Cobain's] heart in everything he was saying and I felt it breaking. That honesty was what I identified with. I would hope that he would identify with someone who's trying to be honest."



Go let it out

The US songwriter bears her heart, soul and mega riffs on this ballsy, beautiful guitar record

LUCY DACUS
Historian
ROCK'N'ROLL HEARTBREAK

"THE FIRST TIME I tasted somebody else's spit / I had a coughing fit". And so opens US singer-songwriter Lucy Dacus's second album. The

brutally honest 'Night Shift' makes for a majestic six and a half minutes, an acutely open look into a troubled relationship that makes you feel like Lucy's pouring her heart out to you while sinking a bottle or two of red wine and doing some light Facebook stalking. The song's first part is teasingly soft and acoustic but the second is a caustic, grunged-up anthem with Lucy wailing over the top. We've all been there, mate – but rarely is heartbreak so catchy.

The follow-up to 2016's 'No Burden', 'Historian' is a far bigger, meatier beast than its predecessor. This is a rock'n'roll album with a deep understanding of pop melody but layered up with bold lyrics that disarm you as much as they connect with you. The soulful 'Addictions'

sees Lucy urging an ex to "forget your current lover" over a horn section, coming on like a forgotten 1990s teen movie soundtrack, while saying all the things you know you shouldn't.

HISTORIAN

The 1970s also loom large over 'Historian', with the unlikely influence of Pink Floyd coming to the fore in the alt-rocking psychedelics of 'The Shell', the

crunchy 'Timefighter' featuring some moody guitar soloing and a prog-rock breakdown, and 'Pillar Of Truth' recalling the haunting Britfolk of Sandy Denny. It's fun, too, with Lucy's laid-back humour bubbling to the surface in the lilting 'Next Of Kin', which tackles her own mental health issues with a sardonic wink: "I am at peace with my death / I can go back to bed". Sleep on 'Historian', however, at your peril.

PARDON THE pun, but there was always something of the pixie forest to The Breeders' 1990 debut 'Pod'; you visited it each time not knowing if it

would still be there if you went looking for it again. It had the cold colour and innocent darkness of the Brothers Grimm and - partly perhaps because Tanya Donelly soon absconded to form Belly with a chunk of the album's fairytale menace squirming in a sack - The

Breeders never quite captured its sticky charms again.

Until now. After a couple of prickly porcupine albums in 2002's 'Title TK' and 2008's 'Mountain Battles', Kim Deal

has repeated the spell that spun up The Breeders' initial magic - drug issues, flee the Pixies, piece together the premium Breeders line-up - and though the

band on 'All Nerve' is the same that recorded the celebrated 'Last Splash' in 1993, it's the flat, glossless glory of 'Pod' and the subsequent 'Safari' EP that it most recalls. Bassist Josephine Wiggs intones one of her mother's poems on

'MetaGoth' in the vein of 'Pod''s 'Metal Man'. Ode to isolation 'Spacewoman' and 'Walking With The Killer' - the ghost of a murder victim remembering hitching a ride with their killer - plod wonderfully along with the same chilling grunge gorgeousness as classics 'Glorious' and 'Iris'. Opener 'Nervous Mary' is 2018's 'Doe', 'Wait In The Car' a modern-day 'When I Was A Painter'. The pixie grotto materialises from

the ether once more.

Not that 'All Nerve' is purely 'Pod: Resurrection'. The Breeders are smart and skilful enough to allow their roots to regrow in whatever direction they will. So the title track bolsters the soporific ballroom vibe of 'Oh!' with layers of brutalist guitars, to capture the cold derangement of a woman fantasising about running down her ex. Forget The Beatles: here they cover Amon Düül II's

glam drone 'Archangel's Thunderbird'. 'Howl At The Summit' verges on symphonic metal and highlight 'Dawn: Making An Effort' is their most heavenly moment vet, a glistening slice of shoegaze euphoria. This is prime Breeders rebooted, if you've the nerve for it. Mark Beaumont

Dead as a dodo

A rare misstep from Jennifer Lawrence




BASED ON THE BOOK BY ex-CIA agent Jason Matthews, *Red Sparrow* is a darkly sexual spy thriller chock-full of graphic nudity and violence. It follows Dominika Egorova (Jennifer Lawrence), a Russian ballerina whose career is ended by injury.

Rolling with the punches

A sensitive story of a trans woman whose every day is a fight she doesn't want to have





MARINA (DANIELA VEGA) knows who she is. She likes who she is and would like nothing more than to be left alone to live her life. Marina's identity, though, does not entirely belong to her. Almost everyone she meets feels entitled to a view on her life and how, or whether, she should exist. Sebastián Lelio's film is a sensitive, saddening, but not sentimental, story of a trans woman whose every day is a fight she doesn't want to have.

When we first meet her. Marina is relatively happy. She is a singer in a bar and has a boyfriend. He, much older than her, suffers a heart attack and dies. Marina is devastated, of course, but she's not allowed to follow the usual path of grief, propped up by the sympathy of others. She's viewed with different shades of distrust. A social worker assumes that Marina's relationship must have been an abusive one, because that so often happens to 'people like her'. Marina's boyfriend's family suspects her of being after the dead man's

money. The police circle her carefully, looking for hints that there may have been foul play. As she forges on, we see that most of life is like this for Marina, a series of battles to be overcome. The only thing she can rely on for unconditional acceptance is her ex's dog, and even that's been taken from her.

Predictions of Daniela Vega becoming the first trans woman to be nominated for a Best Actress Oscar didn't quite come to pass, but the hype was warranted. She's astonishing. Marina looks like the Hollywood femme fatale, but it's in part her armour against the world. She powers on through abuse both physical and emotional, trying not to harden against the world. Vega rolls with all the punches in a performance that's determined and vulnerable. Roles like this for a trans actor. are rare and Vega isn't about to let a moment of it go to waste. She's fully alive. Even though most of Marina's existence is brutal and mean, the film maintains a chin-up hope that tomorrow will be better, if you keep on trying. Olly Richards

YOU PROBABLY HAVEN'T heard of H.E.R., and that's just how she likes it. The 20-year-old American may be preparing for a sold-out UK run, but until her real name was finally revealed in 2017 – a whole year after debut EP 'H.E.R. Volume 1' was released I - Gabi Wilson's identity was kept deliberately under wraps. Every I Instagram picture of H.E.R. shows the singer in dark glasses, a hand over her face.

Her recent success, however, means those barriers are gradually coming down. "Eventually it had to start happening. It was impossible to avoid, but I really do live a very private life," she says. The idea behind the project is about 🛚 something far bigger than privacy, however. "I felt like I was the only person that was going through I these things. It was comforting for me to know that people could identify with the words I was saying, especially women of all ages... I feel empowered in a way," she explains. "It made sense to me to name my project H.E.R. and be a voice for women," she continues, "but learn to be honest with myself and be comfortable with my vulnerability." This vulnerability and sense of self-value shine through on twinkling ballad Losing': "My ambition is attractive / My aggression isn't passive". I

H.E.R. has picked up plenty of fans – namely Rihanna, who posted an Instagram clip of her listening to H.E.R. song 'Focus' in April 2017. "Her hair was blowing in the wind, it was just this really majestic video," she says. "I just felt like, 'Wow, I've done something special'." Now, she's dreaming of collaborations with Miguel and Stevie Wonder, and a debut album is in the works. At this rate, you'll know all about 🛭 H.E.R. sooner rather than later.




