First with a No. 1 called Diamonds then Scarlett O'Hara, a solid smash that also made some impact in many other countries, and lately with their third and to me, most appealing platter Applejack. Now they have pulled off the difficult feat of having three consecutive hits, you might assume that they would be relaxing. But no, their main concern is finding yet another tune that can land them their fourth smash. There's no denving the fact that these two are the most methodical and most brilliant duo on the record scene. Not only does Tony play his part on the actual disc, but he also A & R's the session, and together with Jet usually manages to come up with a solid "B" side on occasions.

On-stage too, they are fluent, every move timed and off-stage are reluctant to talk too much about their successes. Both Jet and Tony know full well that with their combination, they simply cannot stand still on recording. For how many numbers are written with only a bass guitar and drums in mind, and yet have a good enough tune to make it a solid smash? Probably about one out of every fifty thousand. Jet and Tony know that they have behind them a solid core of ardent fans who would buy Teddy Bears Picnic played on a comb and paper, providing that they played the comb and paper, but it still doesn't disguise the fact that even ten thousand fans can't put a disc into the Top Thirty!!

Stage shows, which the two boys were very worried about at the start of their careers together, have, happily, proved fantastically popular. So much so, that on their recent tour the boys were overwhelmed with presents from many fans who had screamed their way through the boys' act from the moment the curtain rose to the second it dropped!! Their few spare minutes are now taken up by Jet and Tony with writing "Thank You" letters to their many followers.

"Perhaps we'll relax when we've got a fourth hit" the boys told me. Somehow knowing their enthusiasm, I don't think that's very likely.

CERTIFIC Demand For Tour FURY-BROWN SHOWS LIKELY SELL-OUT

FANTASTIC sales for the tickets for the Billy Fury/Joe Brown tour are being reported from all over the country. The longest-ever one-nighter tour pulls out on October 4 at Croydon.

Already tickets for venues three and four weeks later on the tour are being reserved. At Croydon a queue nearly three-quarters of a mile long waited all night for seats at the show there. Some theatres, among them York are completely sold out. Fans who normally travel fifty or sixty miles to a theatre are having to travel up to a hundred miles for a chance of a front row seat.

The tour which also bills Freddie and The Dreamers. The Karl Denver Trio. The Ramblers, Daryl Quist, Dickie Pride and Larry Burns, covers 61 dates, ending on December 19 at the Granada. Edmonton.

Footnote, Billy Fury, Daryl Quist and The Ramblers will all have new discs released at the beginning of the tour.

TORNADOS' **FUTURE**

JOE MEEK may have some new disclosures on what is to happen about The Tornados. He told "Pop Weekly," "I can't say anything at the moment, but I can tell you that their records are going to be slightly different.

'Their single after next should put them into the charts, but I've got to make sure what's happening about the various members of the group first."

It seems fairly clear that both Alan

Caddy and Clem Cattini will still remain with the quintet, but plans for the other three members are still being discussed.

DUANE EDDY

THE Duane Eddy visit snagged time and time again by various small reasons, is uncertain still. This time it's the Musicians' Union who are causing the hitch.

Duane was supposed to have been on a co-headed bill with Gerry and The Pacemakers at the start of October.

Due to Musicians' Union rules he may have to switch to the Bobby Rydell tour which opens here on November 12. There is still a small chance that Eddy may be able to head the bill here, but it would mean leaving behind his Rebels.

New Movie for Heinz

HEINZ, still selling well with Just Like Eddie, is confirmed for another film appearance, again in a short feature movie lasting thirty minutes. He will be joined in the film by The Saints, who recently have had a fairly big seller with Wipeout. Also in the film will be The Tornados, who appeared with him in his first film "Farewell Performance" due out on November 17 on general release.

It is understood that his new film, "A Swingin' Location" will also go on general release in November. No release date has been given for the second film made by Heinz with Gene Vincent, Live It Up.

This week he is due to record a followup to his Just Like Eddie smash, likely to be released in the next two or three weeks.

SUSAN SINGER'S WINTER PLANS

This month sees the end of Susan Singer's Summer Season in Scotland, which has proved a great personal success for Susan. In addition to a date with her disc company and ballrooms and cabaret engagements in October, Susan is planning two Winter Tours, the first one starting in November.

Susan will be seventeen on 6th November and her fan club is planning a surprise present for the occasion.

BUSY HELEN

HELEN SHAPIRO, Britain's internationally known female vocalist is off on her travels again, in addition to her European tour! After her two week holiday, she starts the tour of Ireland already confirmed on October 6, and which lasts for 12 days.

Then she commences a ten day rush tour of Holland, Belgium, France and Germany from October 29, where she will star in TV and radio plus personal appearances.

Her Far East tour has been set for February (Hong Kong and Japan) and there is a strong possibility that she may record some shows for American TV on

the way back from Germany.

In October her new single is released and ardent Helen fans can see and hear her on the following programmes. "Saturday Club" September 26; "Ready Steady Go" October 4, and two days later on "Easy Beat" October 6.

DISCussion

Hello, then. There's quite a strong line-up of star singers on this week's release lists; very much something for everyone! And the first will appeal to a very large majority:

On his very latest Decca disc, "Somebody Else's Girl," Billy Fureturns to his deep-throated, romantic style of performance which has been so popular in the past. After his refreshing change of style with In Summer the new slow ballad will please many—more so! There is nothing startlingly original about the song itself; we've heard the same kind of thing before from Billy and there might be those who say it drags a bit as a result. However, Billy's strength and assurance give it that extra impact to make it totally acceptable in his field. There is a warmth in his tone and you'll like the powerful, plodding beat.

The Surfaris follow up their Wipeout hit with "Point Panic" and, in fact, start the disc with a variation of the opening gimmick. Thereafter, I find all similarity ends. There is very little memorable melody and the group work is a little bit indecisive. It is a fast-moving composition which I find marred by a lack of GROUP impact, although some individual instrumental performances are adept. Unexciting, for me!

*** BOUQUET *****

I like the new Don Spencer H.M.V. offering so much that I award it my highest mark this week. His revival of Worried Mind has a clean-cut freshness in both vocal and orchestral performance. It bounces along lightly and catchingly, with the warmth of Don's personality dominating the pro-ceedings. There is much appeal in the melody and the rhythm and it is a well-balanced recording that does full justice to a good song. Isn't it odd that, while I appreciated the success of Don's Fireball X.L.5, I didn't think it was a patch on his second disc, Busy Doing Nothing; and THIS time, I think his performance and treatment has improved yet again. But despite all these "artistic" improvements, what price the charts? Well, this one DESERVES that honour, but quality doesn't seem to be EVERYTHING nowadays, unfortunately. **************

Eden Kane's second disc on his new You' is a much better commercial bet than Tomorrow Night. As a song, I prefer the latter but there can be no doubt that this new one is a little more in the current idiom; it has fast-ish tempo, a strong rhythm accompaniment and a 3-D Eden! What's more, Eden's voice catches the light mood of the number and carries it along very nicely.

Well, here's a turn-up for the book! The Searchers seem to be following in The Beatles' footsteps by issuing an E.P. to follow up their big hit Sweets For My Sweet! This disc is made up of four tracks from their L.P. and includes Love Potion No. 9; Alright; Farmer John and Ain't Gonna Kiss Ya. These make an interesting collection; that is, if you haven't already got the L.P. and the boys are pinning their hopes Ain't Gonna Kiss Ya as the "A" track, as it were. They give this number lots of drive and life, but I wouldn't say it had the attraction of Sweets For My Sweet. Personally, I would have preferred to see a completely new song for their second "single" release.

Pat Boone turns to the big, dramatic ballad with his new London release, "I'll Find You Again." It starts fairly gently and builds up to a climax. Pat handles this type of song very well and it brings out an added strength in his performance. The orchestration is good but I doubt whether the whole thing has sufficient melodic appeal to make it an overall success.

H.M.V's "Do You Know?" gives The Swinging Blue Jeans a chance to show their individual group technique to its best advantage. I was sorry that their previous disc didn't do as well as it deserved but, although the group's performance is as good with this quicknover, I don't think the composition is quite as strong. Nevertheless, the boys do a very good job and give much life and appeal to the disc.

On the London label there is a young lady who, obviously, hides her true identity behind the name of Alice Wonderland!!! (Seen any White Rabbits lately?) He's Mine I consider her only claim to fame is that she sounds a bit like The Crystals in that the song, and her treatment of it, is reminiscent of that group's style. But that's it, for me! There, any comparison must end. I find this pseudonymic lady's delivery to be rather monotonous and, therefore, the constant repetition of the title dull to the "enth" degree. And although the musical backing is like that of The Crystals', it is a very poor imitation and lacking in that spark of originality. Dreary and dull, for me, but if sufficient people think the lady's sound is as good as The Crystals' I suppose this disc could well edge its way into the charts!

MAUREEN EVANS. "LIKE I DO" ORIOLE PS 40046

This is a winning album from one of our more talented songstresses—and the quality of her performance here only highlights the fact that her visits to the charts are not frequent enough! A good mixture of songs gives Maureen the opportunity to show the range of her talents and the result is exciting. Her hit of the album's title is included, of course, and other tracks give us refreshing revivals of What A Difference A Day Makes; Melancholy Me; My Colouring Book; Tomorrow Is Another Day and Pick The Petals.

All the ones that have been hits are ones with a title or a main line of words that are almost everyday sentences or phrases. Things like "How Do You Do It?" How many times have you said those very same words? Quite a lot I'll bet! Then there's "I like It." You must have said that phrase a dozen times if once!! That's one reason why The Big Three have such a big seller on their hands with By The Way!!

Just think of the occasions when you have started a conversation with the words "By The Way," Mind you, whatever the title of this number was I don't think it would have mattered unduly for this is a number strong enough to have burst into any charts. How could the combination of a Mitch Murray song coupled with a strong and excellent demonstration of vocal talent plus, from The Big Three ever miss? The flipside too, has been catching plenty of airplay recently, not only due to the fact that it's a good number but also, because it features the "Cavern Stomp" which is the dance featured at the famous Cavern Club in Liverpool.

The most amazing point about the trio is their sound, however. No-one, but no-one can believe that they kick up such a storm both on-stage and on disc, and yet there's only three of them! ! In fact, the favourite quote about them comes from their many Liverpool fans. "Everything's big about The Big Three except for one thing. That's their heads." Which is a perfectly true saying as I discovered from the way I watched them talking to fans, reporters, TV men. etc.

Not once did they boast about any achievements, or the fact that they were one of the most popular groups in the North even before they reached the pop world's London followers and Southern ravers!! Even their ambitions are just to be a big strong group in the popularity stakes, to play their best, to learn new moments of pleasure on-stage by trying new and different records. But their main undertaking is never to desert their ardent followers from the early days. For although some of you London and Southern readers may flip over these boys, you're way, way behind the Liverpool fans who have had the pleasure and also many chances of listening and meeting this wonderful trio many months ago!!

Now it's a struggle to get to meet them—but you can be certain that the boys themselves will do all in their power to try and make you swing—if not by meeting them—then by listening to their fabulous platters!!!



Real Gone Group!

They're nutty, zany, real gone characters who have the audience either in fits of laughing at their stage antics or because their leader Freddie is one bundle of fun on his own. And when the audiences aren't laughing, they're screaming their heads off for the songs that have raced to the top of the hit parade, and given the boys two Top Five entries in less time than it takes to say "Freddie and The Dreamers." If You Gotta Make A Fool Of Somebody was about one of the catchiest tunes for years, and the platter by Freddie and The Dreamers raced into the Top Five. But could they do it again? Already on their stage shows, they were knocking London audiences (They'd already knocked out all the teenagers in the north.) Everyone waited for another number

from Freddie and The Dreamers, and to be honest, those in show biz, who didn't know what to expect from Freddie and his group, expected a full-scale miss. But wham! Bang! Crash! Before anyone realised it, there was Freddie and The Dreamers on TV not only with yet another completely different waxing, but a different stage performance as well. Now of course, they are about as established as a normal group are with five or six hits, only they have had only two. But what a pair of golden hits. The follow-up to Fool Of Somebody, the very catchy Fm Telling You Now, is still selling at a fantastic pace, and it's very likely that Freddie will have a big seller with the EP his diskery are releasing.

Any complaints from this knockout group? "Yep!" said Freddie with a high-pitched giggle, "I'm on so many tours I'm not sure where I am half the time." He gave a chuckle, one of those special one's that only he can do, turned to one

of The Dreamers and giggled again. "Hey! Where are we tomorrow?" On being informed that he was heading towards the north he gave a quick jump in the air, and added, "Be able to go home for a couple of days!" The amazing point about this group however, and especially Freddie, is that they seem to have boundless energy even off-stage.

Fans? Freddie and the boys aren't the types to slip out of a side door. I watched them leave the theatre with an estimated crowd of about 200 to 300 screaming girls outside. All of them just walked straight into the crowd, signing autographs easily, casually, and Freddie shooting up into the air every ten minutes from a forest of waving arms and shouting "I'm not here-over there" disappearing. On the road, backstage, at home, and in their few leisure hours, Freddie and The Dreamers still remain unspoiled, happy, always looking for the funny side. But they're never better or more entertaining than when they hit that stage, and know their fans are watching!!

New from

MIKE SARNE

Twelve months ago it all started. The NEW record from the NEW Mike Sarne literally burst on the Hit Parade scene. Come Outside, he warbled in a brisk Cockney accent. And within a few weeks there could hardly be anybody anywhere in the British Isles who hadn't heard of this exciting performer.

Now there's another NEW one from another NEW Mike Sarne. Please Don't Say, already exploding sales-wise, is his first serious disc. And, like virtually everything this unorthodox artiste tackles, it's got that "success" look about it. Said Mike: "I'm the sort od bloke who gets himself into a pretty difficult situation. You see, I start off doing the Cockney discs. I feel the urge to change after a while. A lot of the fans feel they'd like me to make a change. So I change.

"Then what happens? First thing is that some critics say that I should never have left the Cockney stuff behind me. But they are the same blokes who said when I did three Cockney discs in a row that I should make a change to other things. Sometimes, you just dunno what to do for the best . . . "

Mike has a bit of a reputation for being outspoken. It's not a deliberate thing on his part to hog headlines and all that. It's just that he'd rather be honest when asked a straightforward question. Even if he's liable to offend some part of the "establishment" of show business in the process. Lotsa folk, fortunately, prefer their stars to act like stars. To speak out about things which they feel strongly about. And Mike is one of the few who will readily oblige.

He grants that show biz has been good to him. It has. But, by goodness, he, too, has been good to show business. He's created new standards, new aspects of versatility—and he's done it all in just one short year. Mike says: "I never really want to stay still. I feel there are so many things going on in show business—and I'd like to sample almost all of them. I'm fascinated by writing, for

instance. My own first novel is on the way, just getting the finishing touches—though I've had a few problems over it.

"And I'd love to try my hand at directing a big movie, or possibly a

straight play on stage."

Soon you can see Mike in his first leading role in a film—"A Place To Go," opposite Rita Tushingham. He turns in a fine performance on the acting side. Who says so this early? Rita Tushingham, that's who. And remember she's won plenty of awards for her own high standards of acting

Coming up for Mike? Pantomime in a West End of London production of "Dick Whittington," for his mate and manager, Robert Stigwood. That opens on Boxing Day. In the late spring, he starts work on a colour musical film with his friend John Leyton. It involves five weeks' location in St. Tropez.

That old term "all-rounder" gets bandied about a lot in this business. Few deserve the tag as much as the everamiable, talented Mike Sarne. Please Don't Say, meanwhile, will keep him—and his bank manager—happy.

Soon they can be seen in a film titled "It's All Over Town," but for them. things are happening all over the world!
Who but the Mike, Tom and Dusty who
make up that terrifically talented trio, The Springfields. Recently they have been cutting a nice slice of record royalties from the show biz cake in the shape of a platter titled Come On Home; particularly Tom who writes all the Springfields' numbers now, and relishes in watching other artistes jump into the Top Ten with his compositions. Frankie Vaughan recently had a hit with Hey Mama-one of Tom's numbers.

Now the songwriting bug has hit the other two members of the versatile threesome, and Dusty is starting to write numbers that have been described as "tremendous," whilst Mike is starting to write numbers in the country style. They've got a long way to go to catch Tom up tho' for he has already started to publish his own songs and now owns a company called Springfield Publishing.

However, on their own disc scene, The Springfields were only mildly disappointed when their Come On Home didn't go into the Top Ten as most of their platters usually do. Said Dusty, "It wasn't too disappointing. A lot of groups had come out with newer sounds at the time, and although we still sold as many as we usually do, we just didn't have the same selling speed. But it's only natural for us to have a slip now and again" and then she added, "as long as it's only one, I hope!" However, it seems fairly certain that what Dusty said is happening to a lot of other established stars since the new Liverpool craze hit the scene.

Not that the swinging Dusty and her two partners have any worries about the future. Two years ago, hardly anyone thought they would reach the charts, for their sound was too polished and country sounding. Now, of course, practically every waxing flips into the best-sellers in Britain, and in the States the trio have pulled off many big-selling numbers like Silver Threads And Golden Needles which zoomed into the American best-sellers away back and hit the Top Five with the same force as Elvis does over there.

This year, The Springfields can look back on as being one of their best, and with records in many charts abroad, plus about their biggest ever breakthrough here, and a successful tour with Del Shannon earlier in the year, and more still to come before the year is out, plus of course, disc sessions, TV and radio and p.a.'s it's a wonder that The Springfields have time for any relaxation.

Come to think of it, I've never seen them relax anywhere except on stage!!
