Proof of their success is the fact that other artistes spend their time talking about Freddie and The Dreamers to anyone who will listen. Freddie himself has no worries about going down well.

"We've had some not-so-good audiences earlier on in our career told me, "but that was years and years ago. Since we've changed our style of singing and playing it's getting to be really fantastic. We had some worries about coming down to London for dates, but the fans down here have been the same as those in the North, really great."

Discwise, the boys are having some problems. They have so many dates to fulfil, so many TV and radio spots lined up that they are having a hard job finding time to get near any new songs.

This will soon be remedied however, for in a very short while the fans, and there are many, many thousands of them, all over the country, are really going to start screaming for more EP's and LP's. Knowing the likely lads, they'll be only too happy to oblige them with another helping of some of the most up to date beat singing we've heard since The Beatles hit the market! !

EVERYBODY

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TOP GROUPS STILL BOOM

IT'S all happening still for the groups who have caused the biggest stir in pop music since, Elvis, Cliff and Billy,

Firstly, The Beatles. They are certainly over the million mark for She Loves You and are likely to collect not only a Gold Disc but a Silver Disc as well. Their first LP "Please Please Me" has already been lined up for a Silver Disc. Their two EP's Twist And Shout and The Beatles' Hits are selling fantastically, and Twist And Shout is already in the 200,000 region.

Almost every record-buying country is asking for The Beatles' records. She Loves You will be the first Beatles disc to get the full treatment abroad, although some of their earlier hits have been released in certain countries. In the United States, Israel, Canada, Australia, Holland, Denmark, Sweden and Finland the disc will be given full promotion.

Other big groups in the news are Freddie and The Dreamers, and Billy J. Kramer and The Dakotas.

Freddie and The Dreamers are being lined up for dates for three weeks in Australia, and for another week or two in Europe, probably Scandinavia and Holland, with a possibility of dates in Finland and Denmark. Freddie and The Dreamers' latest disc, issued on November 1st, a Mitch Murray composi-tion called "You Were Made For Me."

Billy J. Kramer, yet another Liver-poplian, makes headlines this week. He is lined up for a film being made by his manager Brian Epstein and film producer James Pennington. The film will be skedded for early February and will include some Beatles compositions for Billy J. There is a strong possibility that other artistes under Brian Epstein's management may appear in the film.

Albert Hand, President of the Elvis Fan Club for Britain and the Commonwealth said, "I have received many letters from Elvis fans in this country trying to get Kiss Me Quick released as a single here. If any other Elvis fans who want the record released would write to me, I might be able to tell the record company how many really do want the Elvis record issued here and whether it would be worth it." 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DISCussion

Hello, then! This is one of the most exciting weeks for releases for some timethe selection is star-studded and there'll be a battle-royal for the top bracket in no time at all! Hit or miss, let's take a look at them:

Joe Brown, with his Bruvvers, of course, comes up with his most successful disc for some time. Piccadilly's "Little Ukelele" is the kind of fast-moving comedy song that brings out the best in Joe. He sparks into life and bubbles over with fun and the result is totally infectious. I like his sudden turns of phrase when he lapses into a different dialect, neatly done—and I like fast tempo of the rhythm. The whole thing is neatly done in the true traditions of the old comedy song, plus modern appeal.

"You Were Made For Me" say Freddie and the Dreamers, on Columbia, and I'm quite sure all the girls are going to say the same to Freddie! There is lots of appeal in this bouncy, melodic little song and only a fool would say it won't be a hit! Through four or five spins I was conscious of the pitch of Freddie's voice which appears to be higher than ever! It is, at least, strikingly individual.

You know, the current predominance of groups in this country makes things doubly hard for the solo artiste. We're all so pre-occupied with the group "sound" and the like, that we're liable to overlook quite a few "solos" which might well make impact in more discriminating days and this is why I have picked the next disc for my

It is, *\times without doubt, the strongest song *\times he has had in this field and one with an equally strong and appealing melody line. A particularly good lyric gives Mark the opportunity to give an interpreta-tion of depth and his individuality is stamped all over it. The disc is given added strength by the addition of a tasteful chorus on the catchy title line and there is the much to be said for the use of the piano and guitar in the midst of th ★ much to be a much to be plane and guitar in the midst of ★ a good orchestration by Tony ★ Hatch. The pleasant ballad jogs ★ along most appealingly because of ★ all this; it is a well-produced and ★ beautifully performed disc in all ★ departments. I hope, for Mark's ★ sake, that the general appeal will ★ be strong enough for the disc to ★ register through the front-line of ★ the group-sound. ******

On the other hand, although Cliff Richard gives his usual polished performance of Columbia's "Don't Talk To Him," I am a little disappointed with the style of song he's chosen. Make no mistake, Cliff gives his best and his basic appeal is ever-present, but I find the song itself unexciting. It offers little different from the type of composition he made famous in the past. It is pleasant enough but lacks the bite to make me really sit up and take notice, because I've heard this sort of thing so many times before. Only Cliff could make a hit of it—and I hope he does; but I WOULD like to see him go forward in choice of material.

Ah! What a week this is, eh? Another British top-liner now-Billy J. Kramer. His new Parlophone disc is a promise to you as he says "I'll Keep You Satisfied" and I'm sure he will! It is a mediumbouncer with the same kind of appeal as Bad To Me and I like Billy's own delivery of the lyric which maintains the early promises of him becoming established as one of our leading vocalists. It satisfies me, even if I could have been a little happier from time to time with less backing and more Billy.

One man to stop this selection from being all-British is Bobby Vee who comes up on Liberty with "Stranger In Your Arms." The drive and "feel" of this one is typically Vee and is the kind of thing Bobby does very well. A powerful disc but lacking in any individual melody. The song starts with a bang and then seems to fade away without getting anywhere. And talking of fading away—it DOES at the end which is completely out of touch with the driving kind of treatment it receives.

There is little charm in the raucous delivery of the lyric and there seems to be no shape or form to the instrumental interpreta-I think it must be tion. remembered that some melodies do not lend themselves to some treatments. The gentle, nostalgic Greensleeves certainly does not lend itself to this noisy and beaty treatment; it goes against the grain of the music and it loses everything; even the melody gets a bit lost at times. The result, for me, is totally unappealing.

Chuck, "On Stage", has the benefit of the atmosphere of a "live" audience and the impact with such numbers as Maybelline; Sweet Little Sixteen and Memphis Tennessee, is electric, to say nothing of Brown Eyed Handsome Man and Chuck's famous Go, Go, Go. You'll like the drive and atmosphere of this one even if you're not yet an R & B addict.

BRIAN POOLE & THE TREMELOES "TWIST AND SHOUT" DECCA. LK. 4550.

Apart from his now famous version of "Twist And Shout," Brian enlists the aid of The Tremeloes to give their own particular life to no less than 15 other numbers. It is very interesting to hear their own versions of famous numbers like If You Gotta Make A Fool Of Somebody; Alley-Oop; Baby Workout; Over The Mountain Across The Sea; Da Doo Ron Ron and Keep On Dancing. It is a well-contrasted L.P. and will, doubtless, be in tremendous demand.

KYU SAKAMOTO. "SUKIYAKI . . . and other hits'

The personable Japanese hit-parader, who made history by visiting our Charts, brings a very appealing selection of songs to us via this album. Sukiyaki is included, of course, together with three of his solid Japanese Hit Parade residents like Tsun Tsun Bushi; Hitorbocchi No Futari and (pronounce it if you dare—) Goodbye Joe. On every track there is that same charm of personality which conquered us with Sukiyaki and, once again, it seems as though the lyrics don't matter-such is the warmth of the whole thing.

BEATLE PHENOMENON!!

Well, it's happened! For the first time in the history of pop music, a group, not a teenage idol, but a group, have culled so much success inside one year that they have topped the Palladium, covered the whole country with smash tours, sent the audience ratings on TV soaring and had promoters begging for dates for the next three years. National newspapers, usually only concerned about pop singers when they are caught speeding, have covered The Beatles (who else?) in almost as much detail as the musical weeklies.

It is, in fact, impossible not to walk around any town without seeing something about The Beatles. There are Beatle suits in the tailors, Beatle shoes in the shoe shops, Beatle haircuts (for both guys and dolls) at the hairdressers, Beatle shirts in the outfit shops, Beatle badges, Beatle ties, Beatle photographs and, of course, hundreds of thousands of Beatle records. The boys have already earned themselves one Gold Disc, and assuming they continue at this rate, they should be on the way to collecting a heck of a lot more. Apart from this, The Beatles have done a lot for show biz. Everyone who has any connection with the beat side of things is very happy with the stimulated business.

Funnily enough, with all that they

have done, the boys are still one of the nicest teams I have ever met. Likewise their manager Brian Epstein. With offers for The Beatles absolutely snowing in, and a full-time staff operating a lotta telephones to keep up with the terrific influx of calls, both The Beatles and their manager take it all calmly. The Beatles are, I'm sure, still trying to get over the initial shock of finding that every promoter, every radio, TV and film company wants to do something for them.

Can this pace last? Answer. Yes! If The Beatles can continue writing songs for years of the same high standard of their current big-sellers nothing on earth can prevent them from becoming the world's biggest group in less than another year!! Already there is a Fan Club in Great Britain, about 20,000 members strong, or maybe more, and more and more hundreds of letters to join flow in every day.

Soon, we'll be having music played by The International Beatles!! 'Cos, believe me, it's gonna happen!!



THE TERRIFIC TWOSOME!

Their latest platter is The Girl Sang the Blues but these two lads aren't singing the Blues by a long, long chalk. For a start they're really raving over their tour with The Rolling Stones. The boys? Is there any need for me to mention their names? Answer must be No—but just for the odd bod, who else but that fabulous American duo, The Everly Brothers. After that ill-fated tour last year, no-one was quite sure what to expect from the boys this time, but gathering from one of their one-nighters which I managed to see, the boys are as popular now as when they smashed the singles market with Bird Dog, Poor Jenny, All I Have To Do Is Dream, etc., etc.!

After a lengthy absence from the Top Five, one may have wondered at the boys' pulling power over here but the first night appears to have convinced everyone. Certainly, things are getting to the point where The Everly Brothers don't HAVE to worry about hitting the charts here, for their popularity whilst on this current one-nighter tour has been nothing short of fantastic. The two swingin' guys, Don and Phil, have also showed that it's entirely untrue that when a pop singer gets married he will lose all his fans. Both the boys are married, and many of The Everly Brothers' fans met the boys and their wives, and "had a ball!!!"

Their latest platter, to change subjects for a while, isn't smashing to the top with their one-time ease, but their appearance over here has stimulated the sales of *The Girl Sang The Blues* to a big extent and many of the people in the know are hinting that it could be a "sleeper" and break the charts at any time. This did, in fact happen when

American vocalist Johnny Tillotson was over here. He finished his tour, went back to the States, and found that he had left a big chart entry in Britain after his departure.

However, The Everly Brothers' fans can rest assured that they will be seeing the boys again, for it seems certain that after their reception here, the boys will be back in the New Year. But discwise, it would be nice if the boys could come back here to a nice solid chartbuster, one that really moves along on both sides of the Atlantic. For although it's obvious that the boys don't need a hit to keep them in the public eye and in the public ear, it would be great for the many thousands of Everly fans who just can't wait to see the boys' platters high in the Top Ten.



TO PAMELA BLUE

Blue is her name—Pamela Blue to give it in full. But this seventeen-year-old from Purfleet, in Surrey, is far from blue. Bright red with excitement, more like, for her debut disc is out right now on the Decca label. Title is My Friend Bobby, a rather sad-type set of lyrics with a mid-tempo. And to say that Pamela Blue is lucky in the talents gathered round her for this first stab at the charts is to put it mildly. Joe Meek handled the session. Top musicians are behind her. And the song was written by that outstanding composer Geoff Goddard, himself a disc artiste in his own right.

Pamela, blonde and curvey, bubbled over thus. "It's all marvellous. It all started really when I met up with Screamin' Lord Sutch at a show. I sang for him and he was very nice and complimentary. Offered to give me Joe Meek's telephone number. I rang through, got an audition . . . and well, that's that. Now we just have to wait and see how the record goes down."

Singing comes as second nature to Pamela. She's been at it, as they say, since she was a mere toddler of five. "Dad used to play piano in a working men's club at the weekends and I used to go along and sing to the customers. I did numbers like Don't Laugh At Me; I Don't Know Why and Who's Sorry Now. It got so it was very hard for me to see a stage without wanting to get up and do a song."

Pamela went to school near Dagenham, left at 15 and first of all trained to be a machinist. Later she joined a firm making those very expensive Christmas crackers which'll soon be decorating the shops. "Afterwards I went on with my singing. All round the pubs and clubs and at one time I had my own group—all boys. We had to part company later on because they were all still at school and it was difficult keeping things going. I understand there are plans to get some more boys together to form a new group to work with me."

Hobby-wise, Pamela still likes machining and she also digs swimming. "One day I want to drive a car of my own—but we'll have to wait and see about that. Also I've never tasted Chinese food, but I'll put that right just as soon as I can." Musical tastes? Pamela has a patriotic streak, going for British stars John Leyton and Heinz.

Said Pamela: "Actually I gave up my job about six months ago, with the idea of concentrating on a singing career. But Joe Meek was determined not to rush into things and we simply had to wait until the right song came along. Maybe I'm biased—but I think Geoff Goddard did a wonderful job with My Friend Bobby.

Pamela, resolutely determined to make er way in the pop business, knows about the difficulties of girls getting away in the charts. But many good judges have said already that her disc deserves to make it in a big way.
