However, a strike at the factory somewhat slowed the disc down, so I hear, or it would certainly have roared into the Top Twenty as their other records have done!

Again of course, the group have had quite a few changes in line-up, which, judging by the fans' screams when I went to see them on a recent one-nighter are all for the better! Certainly the new boys have enthused a new and decidedly violent stream of fresh beat-laden music into the theatres, and the screams that are echoing for them on the Billy Fury package show currently on the road are some of the loudest and most prolonged since Telstar rocketed them from being merely Bill Fury's backing group to hitmakers in their own right!

Two of the original Tornados remain, Alan Caddy and Clem Cattini. No-one could imagine The Tornados without Clem actually, for if ever a more helpful drummer appears on a onenighter it will be difficult to find him, especially if he's anywhere near as especially it ne's anywhere hear as experienced as Clem is! Certainly the only people left to blame for The Tornados not being in the news are OURSELVES! By ourselves I don't only mean "Pop Weekly" but all the other musical magazines that have simply not bothered about the talented bombshells unless they happen to be in the Top Five.

For those who think The Tornados are finished or anywhere near it—forget it mate! Take a trot down to see them on the latest Billy Fury tour, and listen (not that you'll have to) at the fantastic screaming that goes on from beginning to end of their show. Plus the fact that their new EP, LP, and their new single *Dragonfly* are really swingin' not for sound only (who said the Mersey sound is original?) but on sales they are knocking up! In America they are one of the few groups from Britain whom you can mention and the recordbuying public know instantly who you are talking about.

When the Liverpool barrage dies down to the extent that only the cream are left, one of the instrumental groups to remain on the scene, even to the extent of notching up a few consecutive No. 1's, will be The Tornados. I believe it—their fans believe it—and if you don't already believe it, do what I suggest. Take a trip to see them. It'll be worth it. We certainly won't need any reminders from their fans that it's about time their faces appeared in "Pop Weekly!"



DISCussion

There's a fairly wide selection of styles and moods among the releases this week, including another reminder that Christmas is but four weeks away! Doesn't time go by, eh? The first disc is not a seasonal one but it has certainly come full circle in the shortness of time and you'll see what I mean when I say that:

Brian Poole and The Tremeloes open their new Decca disc, "I Can Dance" exactly, but exactly, the same way as they did Do You Love Me?; thereafter, I Can Dance is exactly the same as Do You Love Me? The only difference is the lyric, which doesn't seem to fit quite so well this time! But also exactly the same is the very exciting sound and powerful drive Brian and the boys achieved with Do You Love Me? A very good disc with bags of impact, yes, but I deplore the "playing-TOO-safe" attitude that hopes for a carbon-copy hit-in the long run it's not fair on the boys, really. I find I might just as well re-spin Do You Love Me? and this will make the NEXT disc choice even more difficult for them.

I like The Gamblers' Decca version of the slow, plodding "You've Really Got A Hold On Me." At first I thought "this sounds a bit of a drag" and then it got a hold on ME! There is a certain hypnotic fascination in the slow, deliberate beat AND in the way the lead tocal really clings to the lyric. A well-balanced piece of group-work, too, and the whole thing makes for an unusual and satisfying disc.

*** BOUQUET ****** Duane Eddy is back on the top of his form as a solo guitarist with R.C.A. Victor's Guitar'd And Feathered! For much too long now Duane has been nothing but an incidental guitarist amidst orchestra and chorus. This one brings him back into his own and he handles his composition with a virtuoso dexterity. Here is the true Eddy sound, beautifully balanced with contrasts galore. The disc moves along at a fair pace and, on this occasion, Duane receives excellent BACKING from piano, sax and rhythm section. polished instrumental throughout; an exciting sound; a successful platter. I only hope it will be a

And another disc I'm right partial to right now is the new H.M.V. one from John Leyton. Carter-Lewis have made a bold and interesting up-tempo arrangement of Stephen Foster's beautiful song "Beautiful Dreamer" and John accepts the challenge of something new like a shot in the arm. He handles it with great assurance and tremendous appeal. Together with Alan Tew's backing and discreet chorus John swings along, giving one of his best disc performances for some time. Quite recently, each of his discs has been better than ever and I'd say he deserves a dirty great hit with this "dreamer."

Christmas is coming and we'll have some nuts! Also, of course, we'll have lots of festive platters. Some have appeared already and, this week there are a few more. One of the most successful of these, in my book, is the one from Decca which gives us "Go Tell It On The Mountain" by The Classmates. A modern treatment of The Christmas Story with a slow beat, done with both taste AND pop appeal. A strong melody and good group-work should make this one acceptable to many ears.

Another festive offering comes from The Four Seasons, on Stateside. "Santa Claus Is Coming To Town" is full of hand-claps and the strong beat we expect from this group. The falsetto voice of the group has full play countered by a bass voice and this makes for interest if not impact. I find the rhythm of the disc acceptable but the overall treatment of the song is a little too "busy" for me. As an example of The Four Seasons work it is good but they've done better.

Mary Wells has changed labels to Stateside with her much up-tempo "You Lost The Sweetest Boy" and shows she can handle this type of song with great drive and effect. The strong backing never lets up and goes a long way to make this one very acceptable. It never lets up until the unfortunate fade-out at the end and I can see it being a popular dance disc.

I promise you faithfully that it is sheer coincidence and NOT deliberate that my comment 'I can't stand it' must apply to I Can't Stand It by The Sinners, on Columbia. By any standards the monotonous repetition of the title would drive me up the wall, but this time there is little consistent melody to carry it through anyway. A strong, repetitive beat accompanies the uninteresting monotone of the lead vocal and it all adds up to lack of warmth, charm or any kind of appeal. The root cause of it all is the composition itself which doesn't give an aboveaverage group much chance. The label says it was written by Del Hidden. No comment.

The Ramblers come up on Decca with a really driving, powerful treatment of "Dodge City." The disc achieves a clean-cut sound which allows us to appreciate the solos and is one of the best instrumentals, of this particular style, to come our way for quite a spell.



And The TOP 4 L.P.s

BILLY J. KRAMER. "LISTEN" PARLOPHONE PMC. 1209

This selection of varying styles of song is admirably suited as a showcase for Billy J.'s talent. His up-tempo numbers have bite and life and The Dakotas are in fine form with these; on his slow ballads Billy shows a nice warmth and control and, for my money, he is at his most effective in slower style. A neatly produced album. Among some of the old favourites are The Twelfth Of Never. Beautiful Dreamer; Great Balls Of Fire and Da-Doo-Ron-Ron. This LP is good to me—and you!

CHUBBY CHECKER. "TWISTIN ROUND THE WORLD" PYE GOLDEN GUINEA GGL. 0236

As the title suggests, this album contains songs of international titles or origins all set to varying degrees of Chubby's famous Twist. And the lyrics are sung in varying degrees of fluent-sounding languages. An interesting LP and one which might well find a useful place on the party shelf, but by no means the best to come from cheerful Chubby because so many of the songs are not suited to either his voice or his style.

MIKI AND GRIFF. "I WANT TO STAY HERE"

PYE GOLDEN GUINEA GGL. 0230

Another LP in that fabulous series of "Golden Guineas" is most definitely suited to the combined styles of Miki and Griff. This selection is beautifully handled and a pleasure to listen to in those quieter moments. This is a folksy collection, of course, including the duo's well-known versions of I Want To Stay Here; A Little Bitty Tear; Tears Break Out On Me and Rick (then Ricky) Nelson's There'll Never Be Anyone Else But You.

BOBBY VEE. "BOBBY VEE MEETS THE VENTURES" LIBERTY LBY, 1147

This is a very polished bit of work—with Bobby at his best with some good old favourites like Walk Right Back; Honeycomb; Goodnight Irene; and his new alliance with that excellent group The Ventures gives the tracks an added bite and interest. Highly successful.

Golden Hitster!

Rare it is for "Pop Weekly" to receive any complaints from the Cliff fans, for Britain's Golden Hitmaker gives just about every hour of his day towards providing pleasure for his fans, from cutting discs to making screen epics like "The Young Ones" and "Summer Holiday." Indeed the few letters we have had in about the question posed aren't exactly complaints. But some of the Cliff fans have posed the interesting query, "Is Cliff trying to become an all-round entertainer too fast?" On recent TV appearances, so these fans say, he seemed to be trying to appeal more to the older people than to the vounger fans.

No longer do we hear Cliff singing the faster numbers, I will admit. But is Cliff taking it too fast? Is he heading for the career that swept Tommy Steele into musicals and straighter acting parts, and at the same time caused his once-permanent name to disappear from the current Top Ten? Now Tommy is one of the familiar names mentioned whenever Command Performances or big musicals are mentioned. Already Cliff has professed his strong desire for the musicals, the stage for acting instead of singing, and it's highly likely that the end of next year will see this wish

Personally, I believe this is the way Cliff is looking at his future now. With so many new and different trends cropping up almost every week, and show biz getting tougher and tougher. Cliff, established artiste tho' he already is, is taking no chances at all on letting any mistakes be made. So far, cabaret is one of the show biz things he still has to do. A straight play is probably on the cards for some future date. If there are still Cliff fans who want to see Cliff as he used to appear, wearing flashy suits and with long sideburns, I'm afraid they haven't much chance of ever seeing him like that again!

One movie I would like to see Cliff in is a personal story of his life. How he started, his hopes, his failures, the knowledge that suddenly comes to him that he is a No. 1 star. Although just about everybody knows the story of Cliff and The Shadows, from Move It onwards, I'll still bet here and now that the film would be a much, much bigger success than anything he's done now. Not every one of his hits could be included, but the bigger ones should be, with smaller hits popping up every so often. I know this is one film the Cliff fans have wanted for a long, long time by the number of letters that shower into us after every new Cliff film is announced.

Point is of course, that Cliff could easily make a film lasting one and a half hours of his life. In fact, the big, big difficulty would be keeping his hits down to the minimum and trying to include all his many fantastic successes!—which are so many, I can't remember half of them. That's fan worship of the highest order! Filmwise, I hear production troubles are holding up their debut,

but it is also widely rumoured that they have been offered a much, much bigger film contract to follow the one they already have!

Discwise, they are all set to take the charts to pieces, for the boys believe in recording as often as they can. Certainly, with TV, radio, films, and discs, the boys have carved themselves a big solid future in less time than it takes to tell. Fluke? Definitely not. What other group can boast of setting such a style and trend without being in the Hit Parade? They know the future in show biz is quite difficult, I won't say very because of their enormous popularity, but they have no fears of the next five or ten years. My car broke down and left me stranded miles away from civilisation. I ended up, with the help of the Army, in a tiny village which didn't boast even one hotel.

"I spent the night in the outhouse of a tiny shack and then couldn't get to sleep because of howling dogs kicking up a row outside." Still Mark also had his good times, with lotsa swimming and sunbathing.

He said: "I listened to some of the pop singers out there in Casablanca. They just wailed. Couldn't make head nor tail of it and it certainly wasn't Hit Parade material. But I did manage to find an EP by Tommy Steele hidden away in one of the stores, there. You just can't get away from the good old pop business..."

THIRD SMASH HIT!

They've done it again! There, firmly planted at the top of the charts for the last three weeks, is their latest You'll Never Walk Alone. Whose latest? Gerry and The Pacemakers, as if you didn't already know. And the signs are, that before this one has finally slipped out of the hit parade, it will already have been passed by the next one on the way up to the top. In other words Gerry and the boys have joined that select band of hit parade "residents," headed nowadays by the fabulous Beatles.

But could it be that in the future Gerry and his backing group could take over the position held by The Beatles as the most popular of today's top chartsters. Although Beatles' fans will hotly deny this, followers of Gerry with the wide grin will certainly agree that it could happen. Don't forget that although they have a head start on the Pacemakers, the latter have now hit the No. 1 slot three resounding times with their first tree platters. A feat which I can't remember anyone else doing. So look out Beatles!

What is the secret of their fantastic success? What is it that has enabled Gerry to hit the top again, not with a brand new number, but with one that is almost a "standard?" As you know, Gerry was hotly criticised for waxing this number in the first place by people who thought that it had already been given every "treatment" possible. He smashed back at his critics with a zoom through the charts, straight to the top, without looking back! What is the secret of this success? In the case of this disc, a fabulous new rendering of You'll Never Walk Alone, what the critics said couldn't be done, a completely new and terrifically commercial treatment of the oldie.

That explains part of the story, but applies to this one disc only. What is the rest of the story? Of course the Pacemakers are "with it", that is with the latest trend in sounds, up to the minute with their stage presentation. But possibly their greatest asset is their bubbling personalities, their terrific good-humour and possibly their greatest asset, that instantly recognisable wide grin of Gerry himself. Their happiness and enthusiasm are so infectious that no audience can help being caught up with it and carried away on the tide of the boys' sound.

Apart from the possibility of a fourth smash hit, what does the future hold in store for the Pacemakers? So far as the eye can see a succession of tours, one-nighters, T.V. and radio spots. Then there is the often rumoured film still to come, although there is no confirmation so far. It does seem almost certain that the New Year will bring a definite offer in this direction.
