






## MODS DIG The Tremeloes

### **Overseas Dates For Searchers** LIVERPOOL PARTY FOR FANS

L IVERPOOL'S rivals of The Beatles (chartwise that is, because really they're the greatest of friends), The Searchers, are heading for strings of dates next year. In fact, they're likely to visit the Far East, America, France, Sweden, almost every European country and every big record-buying country will be seeing the Golden Lads from Liverpool. Australia, New Zealand and Scandinavia are definitely on the schedules.

The Searchers haven't forgotten the fans from Britain who put them where they are, however. They're holding a special party at Liverpool's Iron Door Club on December 29, and all fans will be welcome.

Looks like the Liverpool police are going to have their hands full. Roger Stinton, publicity agent for the boys confirmed that the boys are selling fantastically well on disc. It seems that only The Beatles are holding them off from breaking all chart records.



BEATLEMANIA goes on and on and ON! Letters are piling into "Pop Weekly" from fans who have seen, not seen and are hoping to see the fabulous boys themselves.

East Ham, a few miles out of London, suffered most it seems. Over 5,000 fans rushed the cinema (capacity sell-out 2,500) and tried to get in. After realising that it was almost impossible to break the heavy police cordon hundreds waited in silence outside to hear The Beatles start singing. As soon as they did girls inside and out screamed, fainted and just went plain crazy. It took 200 police two and a half hours to clear fans away -and that was after The Beatles had left!!

The situation has grown so bad now that police are automatically closing all roads, and making certain that enough police will be on duty to cope with crowds ranging from five to fifteen thousand. Said an East Ham policeman, "I've never seen anything like it. I'd heard about girls going mad, but boys as well?"

No Beatle **Break-Up** 

RUMOURS that George Harrison of The Beatles was to leave the group are untrue

Fans, many of whom are travelling over 100 miles to see the boys, appear to have somehow heard that George is leaving. Who spread the word? No one knows, but it's becoming quite a habit for Beatles' fans to call every musical and national newspaper to make sure that the rumours aren't true.

### Rolf Having A

**R**OLF HARRIS, in America for a series of radio, TV and cabaret engagements is "having a ball" he says! Currently playing at the Blue Angel Club, Harris, who smashed the best-sellers with his re-released hit Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport in the American Hot 100, may also be appearing in a stage musical. No confirmation had been received about the musical at time of going to Press, but Harris's impact on the American scene has been so tremendous that he is almost certain to return there some time in the New Year.

Tie Me Kangaroo Down Sport was one of the most unusual hits of the year in the United States. The platter had already been released some time before, and did not make any impression at all on the American charts. Then suddenly, a year later, after someone requested it on a radio programme, the disc became an overnight hit, hitting the Top Ten inside four weeks.

### **DISC**ussion

Well, among others this week, THEY are here; yes, THE BEATLES and what better start to any page than by DISCussing them first ?

"I Want To Hold Your Hand" is vet another composition by John and Paul on Parlophone and once more The Beatles give us that sound which so many groups have tried to copy, albeit unsuccessfully! This is another good example of the perfect teamwork John. George, Paul and Ringo have achieved but it lacks the explosive quality of She Loves You, being much more restrained. I find the melody grows on me the more I spin it, although on FIRST hearing the disc didn't make the immediate impact of the boys' other ones. Nevertheless, all this is purely relative and as I Want to Hold Your Hand will have so many successful spins there'll be plenty of time for the tune to grow on the slowest of ears!

On Decca, The Chimes "Say It Again" in very high-pitched tones against a pounding backing and the result is not totally unimpressive. The composition has a certain charm about it but I would have been a lot happier had those voices been pitched just that much lower. I quite like the disc, actually, but those voices come perilously close to setting my teeth on edge.

\*\*\* BOUQUET \*\*\*\*\*\* Some may say Dominique by The Singing Nun on Philips is not POP music but, let's face it, any disc which proves to be popular with the public must be, therefore, ★ "pop"—and I have a sneaking ★ ★ suspicion that this exceedingly ★ well-produced offering will have a very popular reception by countless ears. The Nun is Sister Sourire of ★ \* the Dominican Convent at Fichermont in Belgium and her voice has ★ great simplicity and warmth that \* commands the attention even if the language eludes you. The song **★** has an insistently haunting melody; **★** tone which compels two or three t one which compets two of the re-re-spins on the spot! It is an  $\bigstar$  admirable piece of work all round  $\bigstar$  and here's a second bouquet for  $\bigstar$  those who had the foresight to give  $\bigstar$ us something so refreshingly different. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Hank has written "Geronimo" which is Columbia's new one from The Shadows. It is full of the boys' usual expertise and, once again, very polished. The Norrie Paramor Strings are there to help things along, too—to say nothing of a bit of occasional brass! The result is a gentle, melodious offering but very much the mixture-as-before.

In their way, **The Orchids** make a good enough job of Decca's "Love Hit Me." It pounds along at a fair pace and with a heavy beat but this group is yet another determined to jump on the bandwagon of The Crystals. The style is identical but lacks the ultimate drive and impact of the originals. No marks from me at all for endeavouring to copy; if every single recording artiste and group copied another—however successfully, for a time—the result would be total and utter stagnation and nobody would get anywhere! The idea of making an odd penny through being a "fair copy" is an extremely short-term policy. Let's TRY for originality even if we don't succed!

After a big, brassy opening, Brian Hyland gives H.M.V.'s "Let Us Make Our Own Mistakes" the benefit of his gentle and appealing tones against a very well orchestrated backing that moves along very easily. The weakness of the disc lies in the lack of melodic appeal; there is little to stick in the mind even after half a dozen spins and, mainly because of this, I doubt whether this disc will be putting Brian back in our charts.

"It's Shaking Time," on Decca, gives Freddie Starr and The Midnighters the chance to really let rip and they take it with much hand-clapping and drive; despite all that I think the disc loses a lot of impact through being a little too high-pitched throughout. The strength of a composition of this nature lies in a nice round, fat bass response which gives body to the proceedings; these particular proceedings seem a little thin and far-away; hence loss of presence and impact, despite good performances in the idom.

#### -BRICKBAT-

Fontana records give us Ian and Sylvia with a folksy-sounding Four Strong Winds and, as much as I like Folk songs, I consider this disc falls between quite a few stools! The song itself has a folksy charm about it but none of the charm comes through the somewhat stiff and rather square treatment given by this couple who sound as if they're British trying to sound American in a half-hearted fashion! At times, Ian seems to find difficulty in scanning the lyric which makes for a jolt on the ear. This is what I call "phoney-folk"—and I don't like it. This kind of disc should have much more warmth and nostalgic appeal, which can come only from the personalities of the artistes themselves.

On Cameo-Parkway, Bobby Rydell has a happy little bouncer with "Since We Fell In Love." Although it lacks the drive of Bobby's much earlier hits there is sufficient appeal here to warrant a warm welcome, even if an overdose of the "lah-lah-lahs" starts to irritate.



And The TOP 4 L.P.s

COLUMBIA 335X, 1577 Sub-titled "The Two Faces Of Freddie," this selection of 14 tracks does, indeed, show two sides of Freddie -his up-tempo and his ballad-style sides and it will be a most popular album for all his many fans. Apart from their big hit, If You Gotta Make A Fool Of Somebody, the group give original treatments to such old favourites as Somebody Else's Girl; Zip-A-Dee-Doo-Dah; Sally Ann and Kansas Ciry. There is contrast and life and you can almost sense Freddie's more than tongue-incheek comedy on most tracks.

"HITSVILLE!" Vol. 2

The Solution SUINEA GGL. 0233 The second album in this popular Golden Guinea series to give us unnamed artistes reviving the latest smash hit songs. This collection includes She Loves You; Bad To Me; If I Had A Hammer; I'll Never Get Over You; Then He Kissed Me; I'm Telling You Now; I's All In The Game; In Summer; Wonderful Wonderful; Forget Him; Do You Love Me; Wipe Out; Judy's You To Cry and Legior's Last Patrol. An exciting get-together of songs but although they are extremely well-done. Tve often wondered why anyone should want such versions when the originals are still so fresh in the mind.

COLUMBIA 33SX. 1561

This is it! The LP Helen recorded in that Mecca of the Pop World— Nashville. The result is clean-cut and is greatly enhanced by the presence of THE JORDANAIRES. Helen sings with all her usual enthusiasm and apart from her two "singles" Not Responsible and Woe Is Me includes lesser-known songs like Here Today And Gone Tomorrow; I'm Tickled Pink and Sweeter Than Sweet, which are my three favourites of the lot.

JOE BROWN. "HERE COMES JOE" PYE GOLDEN GUINEA GGL. 0231



### Buddy's Magic Still Lives On

The weeks go by. The years go on, and so does the name of Buddy Holly. The star with the horn-rimmed glasses, the lilt in his voice, and the cheerful smile for all those people who worshipped his discs, died as we all know, in one of the most tragic air crashes ever. Buddy Holly. The name still appears in the hit parade in this country, bobbing in and out, and no one has to ask or tell the Holly fans that things are just the same as when Buddy was alive. Naturally, we all miss Buddy, and I don't think there is a pop music lover who either didn't buy Buddy's records or wasn't shocked by his tragic death. Strange also, that Buddy's disc after his death should be I Guess It Doesn't Matter Any More.

His last chart entry Wishin' only a month or so ago, was just one indication that the Holly fans hach't forgotten and that Buddy's inimitable style was still as up-to-date and as exciting as that of three years ago. But sometime soon, the record company will shake their heads, and moodily say, "We've no more Holly tapes left." Then maybe a few tracks issued from LPs and the name of Holly will disappear from the charts altogether. To the Holly fans, this is a sad thought, one that many of them have already thought over time and time again.

In this country alone are thousands of Buddy Holly fans, who still run a very active Fan Club, and one that will continue to exist for some length of time. Surely, someone, somewhere should or could promote a "Buddy Holly Night"? But maybe, in a way that might seem a bit too morbid. Although Buddy intended to make his mark on the disc scene from the start of his career and did so, surely he would have liked it better if he'd known that although his records still hit the charts, they would also become collectors' pieces as they have already done?

To Buddy, the musical world owes a big debt. For giving us styles and arrangements that are being used to this very day on disc. For giving us some of the best numbers ever (undoubtably proved by their chart entry years after taping) and for giving so many artistes the inspiration never to give up in the fight to make their name in the hard world of show biz. To Buddy we owe a debt indeed. The sad fact remains that how it's to late to repay that debt.

## EL WILL HIT THE TOP AGAIN

Can Elvis get back to his No. 1 form? That's the question that the younger Elvis fans are asking rather anxiously. The older members of course just don't worry. They've been buying records for years with the magic EP initials on them, and will continue to do so for many, many years yet. Certainly the younger fans are bothered, as they watch *Bossa Nova Baby* roar in and out of the charts in almost no time at all. Is this, they must be wondering, an indication that Elvis is having his main triumph stolen by groups from Liverpool and the new singers who have hit the scene in the last year or two?

Well, let's take a closer look at the Elvis Presley of Today. Is he so very different? Answer No. Sure, he takes his songs a bit slower, but would he have any success belting out numbers like Hound Dog now? I'm not so sure. For Elvis, whatever they may say, still remains King in almost every recordbuying country. Pick up the world-wide trade papers when Elvis has a disc released and you'll find he's in the Top Five if not No. 1. Why did Bossa prove a comparative flop Elvis-wise? My personal opinion was that it was too fast to dance to, and that the disc company had plumped for the wrong side. The 'B' side Witchcraft is a great, but great rendering, and much more dancableand singable!

Try singing *Bossa Nova Baby* and unless you've got an attack of hiccups you'll never keep up the pace!!

Plus, of course, El's song material just isn't up to standard. Mainly because Elvis has drained his favourite composers dry. I still feel that with the best in song material, a good dancable beat and average publicity, Elvis can bring out a smash seller, one that will rock everyone from The Beatles downwards to the roots of their boots!! Surely one of El's films can be held back to allow him time to put in the can about twenty or thirty songs.

There also remains the big factor that Elvis King of Pops has never appeared in this country. Eight long years have passed in which time Elvis has had some fifty hits. Not one of those hit has been preceded by any more publicity than The Beatles are currently capturing, yet the fans have rushed the disc shops in crowds to get El's Latest and Greatest as his Fan Club puts it. To keep up with all the fuss over The Beatles every artiste, big or small, has taken a beating, yet Elvis of course gets the biggest caning.

Well, last minute news says that *Kiss Me Quick* will be El's next single. Let's hope it kisses the top of the charts very quick!!

### YOU BERN ELLIOTT & THE FENMEN

Look out for a swingin' new outfit hitting the charts with all the punch of Billy Walker and Johnny Prescott combined. Bern Elliott and The Fennen are the boys concerned. *Money* is the disc top-side. Decca the label.

And the astonishing thing is that they've got the field to themselves on this R & B standard... as a SINGLE. For this number is featured non-stop by most of the groups in the business. It was first recorded by Barratt Strong, the American R & B king, and is now unobtainable in this country.

Bern and his merry quartet come from Kent. They've been doing huge business in the dance-halls of the south of England for a long time now. In fact, they made demonstration discs for Decca a long time ago... and had to wait around for nine months before precisely the right material for them was found.

However, now you should hear the

Kentish sound all over the place, judging by the Dee-Jays' attitude to the Fermen release. It features lead singer Bern; rhythm guitarist Wally Allen; bassist Eric Willmer; drummer Jon Povey and lead guitar star Alan Judge. They all sing, in various permutations. And they all swing ... like crazy!

The Fenmen, along with our Bernie, were a wow at the Star Club in Hamburg —breeding place for talent on the bigbeat lines from all over the world. Tis the place that the fabulous Beatles finally found their feet and their approach to riotous beat-creating.

Says Bern: "Our stay there persuaded us to make music our full-time job. I was originally planning a career in insurance and for a while operated as a claims representative. But musicmaking has a whole lot more enjoyment to it. You can hear those fans out front enjoying themselves ... and that's a lot more satisfying than sorting out insurance matters." Said Bern: "We're tickled pink at the reception our first disc has caused. Money is a marvellous number for any group to use. It swings but it also had that deep-down bluesy approach. It's made all of us feel that it really was worthwhile going into what they call the dodgy business of show business."

A Decca spokesman went further. "We were knocked out by the way this group approached the business of recording. They operated with complete efficiency. They have a wild sort of sound but that doesn't stop them being thoroughly professional. We're staking a lot on them doing well in the charts."

The boys, hearing all this, went suitably bashful. "We get a great kick out of entertaining people," said Bern. "Maybe that's the answer. We never believe show business can be a bore."

That's the spirit. That's why Bern Elliott and The Fenmen are in such a strong position. They really live for their work. And there's no doubt that *Money* will soon be culling a huge amount of "Money" for the boys.

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## There's No Stopping The Ho

Someone said "Stay" but these lads aren't stopping. Not The Hollies, certainly! With two sure-fire chart riders in succession Ain't That Just Like Me and Searchin' the boys have now started to blast the charts with Stay a sure-fire big-seller if ever I heard one. Big problem is that both of the earlier two singles proved to be quite rewarding chartwise, but even more rewarding saleswise, whenever the boys appeared on TV. So much so that the dates for releasing their discs had to be gauged to allow the earlier platters to slow down on sales, and even now, the group are pushing sales of Searchin' up to the limit by playing the number on their successful ballroom dates.

These boys are with-it in every conceivable way. Hair-styles, clothes, looks, music, they're different and delightful. Behind the boys is that driving force in show biz, Tommy Sanderson, one of the brightest and ablest guys to hit the scene ever. Tommy records the boys, but on talking to him after their first hit Ain't That Just Like Me, I found he wasn't too surprised about the disc. "They're a good group and they turn out some great material musicwise" explains Tommy, 'so I was never really bothered about them hitting the charts. So far they've chosen some great numbers, ones that have suited their style very well. Their latest, Stay, is a really good recording, one that will give them a much bigger hit, I hope, than the other two."

The boys, Eric Haydock bass guitarist, Don Rathbone drummer, Tony Hicks lead vocal and lead guitar, Allan Clarke lead singer and Graham Nash rhythm guitar, have found that their reception on their big ballroom tour has been great. "It's been wonderful" they told me. "It's the first time that anyone's ever done a really big ballroom tour and we were stunned by the crowds and the applause we got." The boys are some of the coolest customers when appearing before large crowds, but confess that whenever some of the fans get too near the stage, they do tend to get butterflies. Last thing they want, so I gathered, was to get any of their fans hurt in the rush.

The tag of "just one more group" certainly doesn't apply to these lads, for with three discs they've proved that they can have three hits. With the fantastic number of new group names on the scene, it's rare for anyone to give a group disc a chance for the Top Twenty. Now, however, they're certainly giving the go-ahead to The Hollies.

The public say "holly" at Christmas gives just the right touch. Point with The Hollies is that they've already found the right touch!!





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
