





The Cute Caravelles

To get a platter into the Top Twenty you need plenty of luck, promotion, usually a strong following and lotsa plugs. Yet when someone who hasn't got all these things crashes the charts barrier, you know it's got to be something really different! Certainly The Caravelles have something different. Their vocal sound is about the most different tone that's hit the record counters since The Beatles came into existence with their Mersey heat.

Now comes the supreme award for the girls. They have been awarded the Silver Disc Trophy for a United States Top Twenty chart-buster, one of the very few to be given to British artistes. Only Cliff, The Tornados, Frank Ifield and a few others have ever qualified for this almost

unique prize.

To get a hit here is almost impossible. To get a double-chart success, Top Twenty that is, both sides of the Atlantic is nothing short of impossible. But The Caravelles have done just that with You Don't Have To Be A Baby To Cry, the sweet-toned, simply-sung number that is a certain hit for about another five countries. The girls, Lois and Andrea, can hardly believe their eyes and ears that with their very first record they have smashed the charts senseless. Admittedly their second waxing, I Really Don't Want To Know has not had as much success, but I feel that one of the reasons for its slow movement chartwise was the fact that You Don't Have To Be A Baby was still selling very, very strongly.

Certainly Mercury Records of America believe the girls have what it takes to become regular chart entrants. They have signed them to release another foour singles and another two LP's over there. The girls are currently going down a bomb on the Billy J. Kramer tour, were told of the news of the American Silver Disc award on their first night of the show. Said the two girls in unison, "Isn't it great! We can't believe that the disc has done so well over there." Gradually the girls have also overcome their disappointment that their second platter I Really Don't Want To Know hasn't been the big success that they had hoped.

"We can't expect miracles" they said.
We were very lucky with the disc in the first place. Please tell everyone who bought it that we thank them from the bottom of our hearts, and that we're very happy." Since the "Baby" disc smashed into the charts, the two thrushes have been working like beavers and it's pretty certain that the New Year is going to see them flying to the United States where they have become about the biggest British duo ever to hit the Stateside Hot 100.

Adam Faith whose new Parlophone disc, "We Are In Love" has force and lots of body from the chorus and beat backing. I think it is effective but lacking in the novelty and melodic attraction of The First Time. A times there is much too much chorus and I find this unbalances the disc. A disappointing follow-up to Adam's much deserved hit, mainly because it doesn't give him the same opportunities to shine through.

The second Parlophone disc this week introduces another family of the "insect" world making its appearance on the pop scene—The Ants! Their festively titled instrumental is called "Christmas Star" and it is a bright and lively offering and I like the sound of it. Although a well-known Christmas theme keeps popping its head up every now and again, I think the lack of an overall consistent melody makes it a little difficult to bear in mind.

On Decca another breakaway Tornado turns up solo with "Christmas Stocking." Having foresaken his organ, Roger La Verne turns to piano and sounds like a cross between Russ Conway and Winnie Attwell with a fast-moving breezy composition that has little individuality. Although Roger fingers the keys most effectively I'd say it was a mistake for him to turn to this style of "joanna-thumping."

- BRICKBAT -

On Decea The Redcaps are Talking About You and the lead vocal has no distinguishing quality apart from a rather hoarse, strained tone as he half shouts the lyric against a pounding backing which is so repetitive that it drives me up the wall somewhat! It wouldn't be quite so bad if the repeated chords and phrases were original—but we've heard the same kind of thing so many times. The best thing on the disc is the all-too-brief instrumental break and I can't say that I can remember even that after a few spins. I don't consider this good enough for a professional performance especially in these days of sharp competition in the group field.

I welcome Harry H. Corbett's "The the basic simplicity of the little fable about the love of a chair for a table!

I like Harry's charmingly disarming performance which is only heightened by an almost discreet rhythm backing. This is an adult-children's fable which will find a frequent place in any family's favourites.

Occasionally I highlight an E.P. on this page and that I am going to do right now when I make mention of "The Spotnicks At The Olympia, Paris." The four talented Swedes make great instrumental impact on not four but SIX tracks and on each one there is ample evidence of their versatility and musicianship. The sound is clean-cut and the whole E.P. makes for very interesting, if not chart-making, listeniate the state of the state of

Hot Toddy and Comme Ci Comme Ca.'

Tommy Bruce's backing group, The Bruisers come up with another Parlophone disc of their own and "Your Turn To Cry" is a powerful beat number with quite a lot of appeal. Well vocalised and most effectively arranged it is an above-average composition with lots of drive. The only thing is that I could have done with a little less echo which would have given a little more body, especially on the voices.

There are two versions in this week's selection of the Goffin and King song "Can't Stop Talking About You." Let's consider, first, the C.B.S. one which brings Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme together again after their two separate solo discs. There is much charm in their restrained treatment of a particularly catchy song and the rhythm of the arrangement jogs the whole thing along gently but appealingly; however, despite this I do feel that my

The Innocents praise the qualities of "A Fine, Fine Bird" (of the human species!!) on Columbia and I would like to praise the quality of the boys performance of this driving, bright and appealing little ditty. It is concise and packs a popular punch that should find many an agreeable ear.



And The TOP 4 L.P.s

THE TORNADOS. "AWAY FROM IT ALL" DECCA LK, 4552

These twelve tracks add up to a feast-day for The Tornados' fans. Predominant throughout, of course, is the sound made famous by the boys on their early hit singles but there is a variety of moods and temp. On eight of the tracks HEINZ makes his presence felt with his bass guitar and Roger La Verne is not "away from it all" on this disc, either; he is still very much with the group on this occasion and his performances are certainly a highlight. A well-recorded LP this, and devoid of the multi echoes and distortion which are usually so much a part of the group's singles.

THE SEARCHERS. "SUGAR AND SPICE"

PYE NPL. 18089

Another popular group and one which platter which is much better than their first LP. It moves along at a cracking pace—all recorded with sharply defined clarity and there is a welcome variety of moods on the twelve tracks which include the boys' hit Sugar And Spice and their lively version of Johnny Kidd's current hit Hungry For Love.

CLINTON FORD. "THE MELODY MAN"

COLUMBIA 33SX. 1560

On this collection of 14 tracks Clinton foresakes the songs of the music-hall for ballads-various from the land of Melody. With some striking orchestrations from Geoff Love there are uptempo songs, soft-lights-and-sweetmusic songs and driving, dramatic ballads like the re-run of Clinton's A Beggar In Love. A well-conceived LP with Clinton proving that he is a very neglected singer.

DOUGLAS BYNG. "DOUGLAS BYNG LOOKS BACK" ACE OF CLUBS ACL. 1155

With Alan Leigh at the piano and an excellent "of-the-period" orchestral accompaniment by Eric Rogers, Mr. Byng looks back to the days when he wowed London's swish cabaret audiences between the wars and the result is very nearly "right on the knuckle" for laughs. An ideal Christmas present for mum and dad and, who knows?—perhaps YOU might find great entertainment value for yourself. Mr. Byng is certainly the master of his craft—and art. "Bye for now.

What happens to a guy, when one club, and bingo! next moment he is appearing at the local beat club, and bingo! next moment he is wanted, known and talked about by just about everybody? In the last few months, only one star can more or less claim that he has done the lot—or is doing it all, and that's Billy J. Kramer. Sure, The Beatles found fame, but at least they had a chance to realise what it was like when their Love Me Do entered the charts slowly. Not like Kramer, his platter just zoomed to the top in less than a couple of weeks. What about Gerry and The Pacemakers, you might say? Didn't they go straight to No. 1?

Answer. Yes. But Billy J. had the added scare of being bill-topper at the Palladium almost overnight, plus being signed for a film almost immediately, plus again being rushed straight off to America. That never happened to Gerry. In fact, it didn't happen to any British star that I can remember. Not Cliff, Fury, Sarne, Wilde or anyone. It is quite understandable that Billy J. K. or B.J. as many pop singers call him should be slightly dazed by this. But NO! Apart from my own summing up, just about everyone agrees that Billy Kramer has taken it as coolly and calmly as a full professional who has been appearing at the Palladium a hundred times.

This is also one of the many almost wonderful points that all the Big Beat Boys from Liverpool seem to have in common. Don't get the idea that they know they're going to get into the charts. They're not big-headed. But, unlike London singers, they take the news of a No. 1 or a big film almost as if it was natural. This of course leads a lotta people into thinking that they're bigheaded. Not so—and in Billy J. Kramer's case, just not true! Indeed, such overnight professionalism seems to be hitting everyone just now. Back to a closer view of Billy J. anyway. His manager Brian Epstein is emphatic that Billy J. Kramer pop singer extraordinary will hit the No. 1 slot many times, or at least be a firm Top Ten favourite!

Certainly, I can't see Billy J. being anything but a whopping success in the coming years. Next year he's likely to be filmbound, plus big European tours. TV shows—the lot! How can he miss? To say that he is a nice, quiet guy who loves singing sounds very, very corny, but it is true. Mike Sarne, after a recent meeting with Billy J. commented, "He's certainly taken it all very quietly, and he certainly believes in not boasting about anything. He's a real nice guy!"

Praise indeed from one pop singer to another! Definitely a big, big future for Billy J. Kramer is assured. But then, wasn't it assured from the beginning when Do You Want To Know A Secret? slammed the No. 1 slot?

Mike's New Platter Is A Gas

With winter upon us, and the prospect of plenty of snow, ice and our usual quota of rain, I'm delighted to be able to say that at least one thing has made me feel happy, and after hearing it I'm sure you will be too. It is in fact the latest and best platter from one, Mike Sarne, the brilliant hit-maker and actor who always manages to produce something really different in the pop world. This time he's really excelled himself with a number titled Hello Lover Boy, which has the distinction of being the very first MERSEY-BEATCOMEDY RECORD! It is, as all show biz stars would agree, A GAS! And a really swingin' gas at that!

Let's get one point straight before we start. Mike is not making fun of the Mersey-beat sound! This is what he said about Hello Lover Boy and the Mersey-beat scene. "I made Hello Lover Boy because of my own enthusiasm for the Mersey-beat scene. I think the sound The Beatles and other groups get is really terrific. I've tried on this record to capture some of that sound, and I think I've succeeded. The comedy bit I did for quite a few reasons. Because everyone is so happy when listening to Mersey-beat records, and I've tried to make them happier still when they are listening to this disc.

"There is an added idea on the disc that I've flipped over. Remember Come Outside when I spoke to the 'chick' on the disc and she gave all the replies? Well, on this record, I've tried to ensure that she talks while I supply the answers. I think my fans will like it. I certainly hope so." Mike played the disc to the "Pop Weekly" staff, and everyone, but everyone just flipped over the comical lyrics and the fantastic Mersey-beat sound that he has managed to get. This could be the disc to end all hits, for it's far and away the best record that Mike's ever made. Certainly, you can dance to it, you can laugh at the lyrics, and in general you can have an old-fashioned ball! Or should I add, an up-to-date ball!

If YOU don't like the sound that top groups like The Beatles and Searchers get, if YOU don't want to have the best platter for your Christmas party, and if you don't want your friends to have a swingin' time then don't buy this disc. But believe me, this is going to be one huge, huge hit for Mike plus being one of the most out-of-the-rut waxings to come into the disc battle of late. Listen to the lyrics, have a laugh, dance to that great, great Mersey sound, and then join the ranks of the thousands who are certain to put this deck way, way up into the Top Twenty.

Hello Lover Boy looks like the disc that's going to say "Hello" to the No. I slot for Mike!!





New From The Hollies

Five blokes who wouldn't trade their jobs for anything else in the world—The Hollies. They work harder than most, travel further, go without food longer, worry more than they need. But they've tasted success in a big way. And show business is for them!

'Course, they kicked off on disc with Just Like Me. That was doing a bomb around June this year. Then they followed up with Searchin'. And now Stay is already hitting the headlines. Which adds up to a run of three revivals hitting targets right, left and centre. Just Like Me was originally a Coasters' hit. Searchin' was also by The Coasters — a million-seller for them. And Stay is a number which hit the top in the States—and was a sizable hit here—for Maurice Williams and The Zodiacs.

This trend doesn't mean The Hollies are sticking with oldies. They have plans for producing original material in the near future. Meanwhile, their career goes hurrying on and on, with enormous successes on their personal appearances.

Lead singer Allan Clarke said:
"Naturally we're knocked out at the
way Stay is going for us. But we can
remember when things weren't so good
so we're certainly not counting chickens
and all that stuff."

There surely can't be five more amiable blokes in the business than The Hollies. Fame doesn't change them. They still dig strange hobbies like target shooting.

Allan, bass guitarist Eric Haydock and rhythm guitar-star Graham Nash were the original Hollies. They played around in Manchester clubs with an outfit then called The Deltas. Then came Tony Hicks, currently on lead guitar. Latest to join was Bobby Elliott, a "townie" mate of Tony, on drums. He took over behind the kit when Don Rathbone left.

Graham is the man who upset the local council by wanting a pet in his house. Fact that the pet he wanted was a snake might have had something to do with it . . .

Eric, really, is the biggest fan of shooting. He bought an elephant gun but found few elephants around the Manchester area. But he talked the others into taking up ordinary shooting as a pastime.

Life never stands still for these boys. There's always something happening and they nurture some of the best practical jokes in the business. Even so, they also manage to find time to try a little song-writing, with everybody chipping in ideas. Maybe they'll provide material of their own for some of their future releases.

But the main thing is that The Hollies just don't dig the pretty-pretty sound of the ballad-mongers. They go for emotion, earthiness, meaty-beaty singing and playing. It's a kind of no-holds-barred sort of music which gets the feet a-tapping and the nerves jangling.

Stay is a good example. It swings and it's sometimes rough-edged. But it's the roughness that counts.

And they don't knock the Liverpool sound just because THEY come from Manchester. They've mates in all the top groups from Mersey-side. And Bill Fury is an extra-special pal. He digs that crazy excitement, too.
