# FRANK'S FUTURE

The guy who just couldn't make it, it seemed, has made it—but made it, man! With what one can call a wham of a bang! Natch! Frank Ifield. The triple hit man I Remember You, Lovesick Blues and Wayward Wind is all set to bust not only the British charts but the American Hot 100 as well! That well-worn phrase "overnight fame" can certainly be used in Frank Ifield's case. One moment he was, not unknown, but definitely struggling—and the next? Heading towards the No. I with his Golden platter I Remember You, not only in Britain, but in the States too! What does the future hold for this esteemed figure of a man? Pop Weekly's verdict is this:

That Frank will continue to hit the best-sellers with unerring accuracy, but that one of his main appeals and where his real talent will really show, is on a stage musical! For, let's face it, Frank has no mere child's voice. He has that really swingin' vocal dynamic style that could pound its way thru' to an audience and have them bouncing-but bouncing, with excitement. As a stage performer in a colourful musical Frank is the obvious choice. Personally, I'd love to see him in a swingin' type of musical on the same style as Cliff's film, "Sum-mer Holiday." What else does the Pop Weekly predict for Frank's future. Some good albums are certainly goin' to be needed after Frank's brilliant vocalism on his debut L.P., "I Remember You" (which incidentally doesn't have that hit among the tracks.

Film-wise? Somehow I can't see Frank in a pop musical film. I don't know why, but he doesn't seem to have that kind of outlook to me. I think if and when he plays any film roles he should stick to some with fairly good stories and no light-hearted stuff. For Frank gives many of his fans the idea that he is "mature," much more so than other pop singers. Take, for example, the number of adults (over 25) who voted him as their favourite in a poll recently held by one of the Pop Weekly's most ardent readers. Nearly every adult wanted to see more of Frank, or gave Frank as their favourite star, as against other artistes like Cliff, Elvis, Adam and Billy Fury.

Yes! The future looks bright for Frank Ifield. Let's hope it always stays that way—and that Frank never has to worry about returning to his native Australia! 'Cause if he did, we'd lose some of the best talent in one bundle this country has ever seen! Just take a look at the up-and-coming singers of today? Anyone vaguely got a voice or personality like Frank's? If so, "stardom" will be tagged on to them in no time at all!

# **NEW TO YOU**

Imagine you're in the same position as Barbara Kay. You're a good singer, highly praised by fellow artists. You've built a reputation through singing with one of the leading bands in the country.

So you want to break out on your own. You've got the talent-and the songs to sing. But the record companies don't seem to want to know. What,

then, can you do?

What Barbara did was to find three friends who genuinely believed in her talents. They put up the loot-and went right ahead and recorded her, under the set-up CFP Artists Ltd. Then they played the finished product to EMI, who promptly put out Miss Kay on their Parlophone label. Hence: That Feeling, backed with Another Dancing Partner.

The "unwanted singer" had become decidedly wanted. And she is now hurrying round the major television and radio shows, exploiting her vocal style.

Let Barbara, 22, pert, auburn-haired,

tell her own story.

"I come from Bristol and remember always telling my mates at school that I'd be on the stage one day. They always laughed. But when I was 16, my mother entered me for a singing contest and I won through to the final.

"Later on, I got a job with Joe Daniels and his band at Butlins. That gave me some marvellous vocal experience before I had to go back to Weston-super-Mare for the winter.

"Then, out of the blue, Joe rang me up and suggested I should go along for an audition with the Rabin Band, led by David Ede. I didn't want to bother. I felt I'd have to sing rock 'n' roll.'

But Barbara had second thoughts. Eventually she turned up, sang her piece . . . and landed the job from around 250 other hopeful young gals. She stayed with the Rabin band for two years, breaking away on New Year's Eve last year. And after having built up a big following for herself on the fabulously successful "Go Man Go" radio series.

There is a sense of adventure and excitement in the way Sinatra takes you by surprise in his handling of what may seem to be a simple phrase-(but that's his Trademark, anyway). To accentuate this, he has Basie, whose orchestrations are just out of this world for the unusual and unpredictable. Remember My Kind Of Girl? You wait till you hear Sinatra's version of the lyric and the Basie treatment of the music! Basie doesn't BACK Sinatra. Sinatra doesn't BACK Basie, or any of those things which usually occur in popular music! Each to his own on this L.P. and what exciting listening it makes! Even if you're not a Sinatra fan, you'll love the big band arrangements of The Count and vice versa. This is a MASTERPIECE in any sense of the word, and a MUST to your collection of records.

HARRY BELAFONTE: "THE MANY MOODS OF BELAFONTE" R.C.A. Victor, R.D. 7522.

The rich, flexible voice of Belafonte does the most incredible things to most of these not-so-well-known songs. There is vibrant excitement in every phrase, and you can fully appreciate the wide scope of this artist's talent. These are mainly folk song tracks from various parts of the world and it is an excellently produced L.P. Listen particularly to Dark As A Dungeon and Zombie Jamboree, if you like folk songs; if you like Belafonte; if you like soulful, well sung songs—this is a MUST for you.

Letters are pouring in from all over the country asking about Elvis's film, "It Happened At The World's Fair." "Why haven't we got any idea about the story," they ask. So Pop Weekly Service is at your command. Here is the synopsis of MGM's "It Happened

At The World's Fair."

Mike Edwards (Elvis Presley) and his side-kick Danny Burke (Gary Lock-wood) are a couple of bush pilots who have their ups and downs financially as well as aeronautically. Mike has a weakness for three kinds of women. weakness of three kinds of wollier, blondes, brunettes, and redheads— while Danny is a compulsive gambler. Between the two "hobbies" they are usually broke. They hope to achieve solvency in the potato fields of Washington as crop-dusters. When they get their pay for a crop-dusting job they lock it in the compartment of their plane, but Danny takes it when Mike's back is turned. When they go into town that night Mike romances with a lovely girl named Dorothy (Yvonne Craig) while Danny tries his luck in a poker game. They both lose Mike escapes a few jumps ahead of Dorothy's father's shotgun, just in time to get into a battle royal as he rescues Danny from the poker game! But their troubles aren't over. Back at the airport, the sheriff serves them with a writ attaching their plane as security for bills they owe. The two of them set out forlornly to hitch-hike to look for a place to work. They get a ride from a Chinese farmer, Ling, (Kam Tong) and his little niece Sue-Lin (Vicky Tiu) who are on their way to the Seattle World's Fair. After they arrive in Seattle, little Sue-Lin breaks out in tears when she finds her uncle has too much business on hand to take her to the fair. Mike volunteers to escort the child, while Danny sets out to search for an old friend, a shady guy named Vince Bardley, who may be able to help the boys out of their financial mess. Mike and Sue-Lin go on all the rides, etc., the fair has to offer and the child samples every kind of food.



When she gets a stomach-ache, Mike takes her to the dispensary. While the child is being cared for he fakes an illness of his own to be ministered to by lovely nurse Diane Warren (Joan O'Brien). In spite of his best technique, Mike fails to "hit it off" with the nurse. When they return to the monorail station, Mike learns that Danny has promoted a station wagon and a mobile home for them to live in, winning them in a card game from the trailer park manager. The next day, job-hunting, the boys take on a sky-writing job, although neither has any experience. The results are hilariously disastrous. Mike takes another trip to the fair, hires a boy to kick him in the ankle and gets Diane to treat the injury! The re-union ends in a dinner-date and Mike is making a great time until Diane learns of the trick. # DISCussion

Wow! You Elvis fans certainly did rise to the occasion last week! A million spinning thanks for all your letters putting your side to our DISCussion on "short-measure" Elvis! When I've had a chance to wade through them ail, I'll let you know the findings. I've got a pretty fair idea what they'll be too!

And I've also got an idea that you'll like the first platter from this week's

releases:
Tony Orlando and "Shirley," on Columbia is a gentle, romantic lilter with a predominant rhythmic beat; it's the kind of song you can imagine at least half-a-dozen other singers doing and there is the eternal "heavenly" choir much in evidence. Tony Orlando gives the lyric a quality of his own, though,

much in evidence. Tony Orlando gives the lyric a quality of his own, though, which saves the disc from becoming "just another." It's a real smoothie—not exactly hit material—but one which will be enjoyed by many. Hands up all the boys who have a girl friend named Shirley, then!

Here's a turn-up for the record catalogue! There is a British cover version of an American disc that has excited me so much that I am awarding

it this week's:

\*\*\* BOUQUET \*\*\*\*

On Pye, our own group The Viscounts give a hard-hitting, solid performance of the Adam Wade original, Don't Let Me Cross Over. With each successive disc, I think The Viscounts have improved so much, and now I consider them to be one of our better all-male vocal groups. They really swing; they've got loads of "attack" and their arrangements have a freshness and clarity. This one is no exception to all that. It moves along, with no let-up, right to the end—leaving you to want to spin it again. It is a well-balanced group, disciplined—and it shows! Yes, this is for me. How about you?

And on Decca comes another British group, with a slight difference. Emil Ford's backing group, The Checkmates, long since on their own, now make a rather undisciplined attempt to inject

life and originality (and gimmick) into a little thing called "You've Got To Have A Gimmick Today." This is the old idea of giving impressions of established artists and groups; those included on this disc are Frankie Vaughan, The Shadows and Pat Boone, but they sound so forced and underrehearsed to me. The group is at its best in "the middle bits," when they perform AS a group. Their "argument" at the end is "the end!" What I call chaotic chaos, instead of organised, rehearsed chaos; this loses impact. Because of these faults it just falls short of being a most interesting disc.

The Like I Do girl, Maureen Evans, won third place in the recent "Song for Europe" contest with Oriole's "Pick The Petals," which is now on general release. A "pretty" song that falls short of the overall "pop" impact of Maureen's chart entry; nevertheless, she gives it a lot of charm and life without which I would find the number itself a bit dull. And I shall NEVER understand why ballads of this type should be faded out at the end-(and not even at the end of a chorus or a phrase!) Don't song-writers WRITE nice clean, neat endings any more? I'm sure they do! So what gives with this fading-out lark? It gives me the impression that the studios don't care and are saying "well, no one listens to a disc all the way through!" I think it sounds slip-shod and careless. Do you like YOUR ballads faded out?

Do you like the old, solid Rock? If so, then you'll welcome the revival, on London, of the now almost classic "Good Golly, Miss Molly." Jerry Lee Lewis gives out unrestrainedly, against a really driving accompaniment, and makes the whole thing quite exhausting. Of its type, this is excellent. J.L.L., as one of the original "rockers," is in good form although I must confess not being an ardent fan of frantic rock!



As you've read on this page before, I love experiments and the adventure into the unknown, as it were. The next disc is an experiment, but I'm awarding it my

#### -BRICKBAT-

Jackie Lynton's "experimental" version of the old ballad I Believe, on Pye, doesn't come off. The Brickbat isn't for that-for I believe that if you aim at the moon and hit a chimney pot SOME-THING has been achieved. In this case, I don't think the particular "experiment" should have been tried at all, because the original material is dead against it. Here we have Jackie singing the well-tried song in its original tune against a very fast moving and monotonously-the-same rhythm backing. It sounds exactly as though the tape of the singer and that of the backing had been mixed together accidentally. Only at the very end does the singer's tempo match up to the accompaniment. To me, it sounds a messand a mess that doesn't warrant reviving THAT song again. THAT I believe!

On H.M.V. there is a group called The Impressions and they do a very neat job of a slow-ish arrangement of "I'm The One Who Loves You." It is all smooth and professional, but the lyric is against them really. Most of it consists of the title words and there is little originality. I would like to hear them do something with a little more scope.

That unless Jet and Tony come up with a really hard-bitting number, then they're going to find themselves (at the best) in the lower regions of the charts!

For Jet and Tony's sake I hope they do come up with a platter strong enough to make the grade, but even then I think they will be very lucky to hit the No. 1 slot twice in succession. Still, I promise both the boys that if they do reach the Top Ten I'll devote a whole page to just saying how fabulous they are. That's if YOU didn't already know. On a serious kick now. I wish both Tony and Jet all the success in the world.
