



One thing I will predict about the "unpredictable" Joe Brown. That the near future will see him very, very much more popular. How can he fail? With good looks, a cheeky outlook on life, talent that still hasn't been plumbed to the depths, an irrisistable personality that has even mums and dads turning the recordplayer and telly on - I repeat -HOW CAN HE FAIL?

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

The Tornados. Last year at this time, they would have welcomed any bookings. This year, it's all they can do to keep up with their fast and fantastic schedule. With Telstar, Globetrotter and their current 45, Robot still selling and all proving that the Tornados aren't just a one-time hit, the boys are all out to prove themselves in other directions. "Our stage act still needs perfecting" said Clem Cattini, drummer, and almost unofficial leader of the group, due to the fact that he has been knocking around show biz so long. "You see, we're going all out to prove that we can be one of the most stage-worthy groups in the country, tho' it's a bit difficult to really keep moving on-stage, and of course our organist Roger LaVerne can't very well move about!

Shouted out Roger LaVerne, "I suppose I could always hang the organ around my neck, but I've not really got enough strength to keep it there after two numbers or more!" If that seems a bit-out-of-the-way remark, don't worry! When the Tornados hit town, as they will on their appearance at the Albert Hall on May 31st with Billy Fury, then *those* remarks are considered normal! Plus this, of course, the Tornados are off in a few days time to top the bill at the Paris Olympia, and this will give guitarist George Bellamy the chance of having a delayed honeymoon! George, married two weeks ago, hasn't had the chance of a honeymoon yet—and although their shows in Paris will be strenuous, he hopes to be able to get away for a few days!

Said the rest of the group in unison, "Never mind, George. We'll make sure you have a good honeymoon!" I can guess what that means! Rattling noises in the night—buckets of water on top of doors, and nobody being any the wiser as to how George's guitar was suddenly discovered at the top of the Eiffel Tower! Although their schedules call for plenty of work—the Tornados are never short of fun, which is one of the most valuable assets in show biz today! Particularly when it's fun—with the Tornados !

But, seriously, I believe that the boys will really make a great hit with French teenagers, they produce just the type of sounds that go big with continental audiences today.

# TREMENDOUS TOMMY

The handsome Tommy Roe currently exciting mass crowds throughout Britain. is now all set it seems, to smash the charts again. This time with a number specially re-released in this country, The Folk Singer. Hailed as one of the most potential star performers for many years, Tommy is being swamped by fan letters after his successful TV appearances. Talking about appearances by the way, it seems that Tommy Roe has one of those faces that are instantly recognisable to his fans. For on his shows here, he has succeeded in gettin' everybodybut everybody in hysterics by the sight of his tall figure appearing at the stage doors! After his two big hits Sheila and Susie Darlin', Tommy is goin' all out to show that he can charm his British fans into disbelieving some of the more vicious rumours about him copying the late Buddy Holly's style !!

"My new single is different from the others" claims Tommy, "and it's not in the Holly style, although personally I love Buddy Holly!" What does Tommy think of the British tenagers? "Great! and the girls over here are really swinging! I hope to be able to come back after this tour, and if everything goes well, have a real ball!" Although it is difficult to predict whether or not any artistes will be as popular in a year as they were two years ago, I'll bet that the name of Tommy Roe is well to the fore when it comes to considering who's going to be the top American stars in this country !

Just take a look at what Tommy Roe offers the British teenagers. His records are good, His stage performance is great. He is handsome, (still an asset these days) and he has enough charm and personality to have all our chicks jumpin' to their feet—and screaming their heads off, as anyone can see if they have enough time to grab a seat at the one-nighters that Tommy is playing!. Special note for the Holly fans, anyway. Tommy admits he DID copy the Holly style, but only because he wanted to get his name known before he showed people that he had his own individual style.

I think he's about one of the most honest guys in show biz anyway!

I spoke to two teenagers who had recently seen Tommy on TV. This was their combined views. "We think he is the greatest! He's so tall, and so handsome—and he twinkles his eyes like wow! We think he ought to stay in Great Britain and become a permanent singer here. After all, he says he likes British girls!" So—watch out Tommy Roe. For if the British girls start joining up—you're gonna find yourself forced to stay in this country !

# **NEW STAR-PACKED TOUR**

A whole line-up of starry names set off on a tour of one-nighters starting April 28th. A super-production, packed with stars from the charts. A dynamic presentation which should have 'em standing in the aisles and besieging the box-offices.

Another STAR. Mike Sarne. Code Of Love is running well for him, saleswise—and gives him yet another link in a chain of successive hits . . . Come Outside, Will I What, Just For Kicks. Mike's really developed, too, as a stage performer—as all you fans will be seeing ere long.

Mike, too, has been busy filming. In "Bethnal Green" which was shot, mostly, on location in ... Bethnal Green. And already studio executives are shouting about his performance and that of his leading lady, the Awardwinning Rita Tushingham. There's his novel due out soon, too.

Now the SPECIAL GUEST STARS. And what stars! Jet Harris and Tony Meehan. Two breakaway members of the Shadows who went their own separate ways, then got back together to whistle right to the top of the charts with *Diamonds*. It's a fantastic story of triumph.

Jet nipped off to go solo. Hits like Besame Mucho came his way from the off. He formed his own group The, Jetblacks—and wowed 'em on tour.

Tony became a recording executive, handling sessions like Louise Cordet's Im Just A Baby and watching the discs go to the top, though from "the other side." He also studied music . . . . d runns, especially.

Then, with a flash of "thought transference," they decided, the two of them, to make a disc together. The rest is history. Shattering history. Jet, by the way, is now fully recovered from his overwork breakdown and is fitter than ever.

Now for the GUEST STAR. Mike Berry, with his new backing group, the Innocents. One of the most popular of pop stars among other artists, Mike has hit it big with *Don't You Think It's Time* and he has become enormously in

demand for personal appearances. He's certainly got a way with him, has Mike.

Hang on—there's more to come. Now meet the stars billed under the tag "FEATURING..." Featuring, first, Billie Tell Him Davis, the orphan gal who rocketed to the top with her very first record. She's been groomed for this stardom by manager Robert Stigwood—given drama lessons, singing studies, elocution ... even a modelling course. She's all ready to set the halls alight with her vibrant personality.

And "featuring" Don "Fireball" Spencer. Here's another exciting artist who has tackled just about every sort of job in his lifetime. What's more, he's a grand all round sportsman . . . athletics, Rugby, soccer, boxing, wrestling. His "Fireball" single has been a good 'un.

Well, you'd think that was enough, in the way of big names, to be going on with. But you can add Duffy Power, the one-time rock 'n' roller who chucked the wildnesses of his past while he studied rhythm 'n' blues. He listened to records, went to R and B clubs to soak up the right atmosphere and, not long ago, launched his new career with a swingin' *Air't Necessarily So* single.

More? How's about Grazina. Frame is her second name. An experienced star, though she's only 21 and gorgeously

DUANE EDDY. "DANCE WITH THE GUITAR MAN"

R.C.A. VICTOR: RD. 7545.

Yes, and his big hit of the title is also included in this collection of twelve typical "pop" Eddy numbers! I say "typical pop" because most of the tracks are of the kind that makes Duane popular with all; there are only scant signs of Duane Eddy the straight, solo guitarist. To be quite honest, I prefer him when he is concentrating on a solo performance. But whichever way you look at him, he's good-and there's plenty of everything to please on this disc. All latest dance crazes are present including: "The Stomp"; "The Scrape;" "The Watus;" "The Twist;" "Hully Gully;" "Locomotion;" "The Mashed Potato;" "Limbo" and even (dare I say it?) "The Waltz!" Yes, a disc for the dancing party which didn't really require the talents of Duane Eddy; but as you've got him, it makes the disc double value! So "Dance (everything) With THE Guitar Man!" blonde with it. She's understudied Marion Ryan at the London Palladium —and taken over for many performances. She was in "Blitz," too, where she was raved over for her work as a blind gal (wearing a black wig!).

Add in Billy Budd. And compere Graham Dean. And the XL 5 group. Whatta fab line-up. It sets out with FOUR different artists in, or around, the charts.

The description, star-packed, certainly applies to this tour, and it is covering a very wide area in order to give everyone a chance to see it. Any other info' you want? Where and When? Just look below.

#### THE HIGHWAYMEN: "ENCORE" UNITED ARTISTS: ULP. 1019.

If you like folk songs you'll go for this L.P. If you like folk songs performed by a really slick threesome of voices, you'll go for this one hook, line and sinker. Direct to you from the boys who gave you the original Michael (Row the boat), this album of American folk songs is full of life, nostalgia and good performances. There is a "let's hear it again" feeling about the majority of tracks and I feel sure you will like, in particular, Lonesome Road Blues; El Rancho Grande and Railroad Bill. There is loads of atmosphere throughout, the five boys are dealing with a straight American folk song or a Spanish or Latin-American one along the lines of Eres Alta or Fiesta Linda. And for sheer, gentle sentiment, listen to Little Boy. There is a lot of feeling and colour packed into this platter and it's ideal for relaxed listening. Try it.

STEVE LAWRENCE: "WINNERS!" C.B.S.: BPG, 62124.

C.B.S.: BPG, 62124. And the title of this twelve-track album couldn't be more apt. "Winners!" Winners, all the way, every one of 'em. What about titles like Go Away Little Girl; All The Way; Moon River; Teach Me Tonight; Lollipops And Rosss; Volare; Cotton Fields; Misty; Around The World; Who's Sorry Now?; It's Not For Me To Say and Kansas City. Steve Lawrence's smooth vocal tones give each song a sound of its own and it's rather like hearing them afresh. Except, perhaps, for Go Away Little Girl, don't expect strictly "pop" treat-

ment of most of these old pop hits; expect, instead, a series of good songs very well sung, with no attempt to emulate the original recording. There is plenty of light and shade and you'll enjoy Steve if you can get out of your mind the impression made by the original hit makers. That's always the trouble in singing songs made famous by other people, isn't i?

FRANK CORDELL: "HEAR THIS" H.M.V. CLP. 1611.

Do you like orchestrals? Then, hear this! Frank Cordell has injected new orchestral life into some old favouritesand on some of the tracks there is a distinct jazz influence. If you know the music concerned, you're in for some pleasant surprizes-and if you don't know any of the tracks then you'll hear something very fresh. Lend a special ear to Come Rain Or Come Shine; Caravan: My Funny Valentine: June Is Busting Out All Over; and I Didn't Know What Time It Was. Cordell, although he experiments, is always within logical bounds and limits and I'm quite sure lovers of the light orchestral music will go for this L.P. The disc is completed by So In Love; Kee-Mo, Ky-Mo; My Heart Stood Still; Quiet Drive; I'm Old Fashioned and two of the featured soloists are Don Lusher and Tommy Whittle. So, as they say in the American Navy—"Hear this!"

"It is for our summer season with Cliff at Blackpool this year," said Bruce. "The whole show is being built on different lines-with, for instance, Cliff and us cropping up all over the place instead of sticking to our own acts.

"This was all very well until it was decided we'd be doing a dance routine with Cliff in one of the numbers. We realised we didn't know anything about dancing . . . so we had to pluck up nerve and go along for lessons.

"Didja know Cliff is quite an expert dancer now? Anyway, he's a lot better than we are. So far."

## **Bick Ford Explains**

HUNDREDS of pop fans have been following the fortunes of Bick Ford, alias reporter Robert Bickford, in the "Daily Mail" as he tries to establish himself as a disc star, urged on by Robert Stigwood, John Leyton, Mike Sarne and others.

But one music-biz paper has got it all wrong when they quoted Bick as saying: "I'm trying to prove that I can do anything John Leyton or Adam Faith can do."

Let Bick put his own case, fairly and squarely, for "Pop Weekly" readers. "There's enormous interest in pop music and pop singers. In order to get an accurate impression of so large and diffuse a subject, it's necessary to find out far more than can be discovered during a casual interview with a performer or his manager.

"I feel that, by living the part myself, I should be able to give readers a genuine insight into a world which has for so long fascinated many of them."

#### Not Slipping



# Unique Frankie

Elvis, they say, is unpredictable. But surely, in our own country we have someone almost as unpredictable. Frankie Vaughan. Take his still huge-selling hit Loop-de-Loon. Who would have thought it possible to have made such a big selling chart-riding platter out of a children's nursery rhyme? But-Frankie's unique style made it one of his biggest hits to date! One thing that has been circulating around show biz, and has even been printed in one paper is-Should Frankie record this song, anyway? "Isn't it childish" said one reader to me. But-think again. Take a look at Alice In Wonderland; a big seller-no chart hit-but still a big seller!

Is Loop-de-Loop childish? Personally, I view this in two ways. I know that, of all British artistes, Frankie has the biggest and hardest job of all time when it comes to picking a song. Not necessarily the right lyrics but also the perfect song for his fantastic stage performance. As 1 think that Frank's stage performance is just great, this is a very good number to use in his act. Now to the words of the song itself.

This IS a child's song, and the lyrics are childish—BUT! Mark seen on his recent visit to Tahiti


more satisfaction than his two previous biggies. For he is not, by nature, in favour of "covering" hits from the other side of the Atlantic.

Alone Am I, although I think it has a little less melodic appeal. In this case, that shouldn't matter because Brenda rivets the attention and the Brenda rivers the attention and an orchestration, which features a trumpet, is nicely balanced and in perfect sympathy. Apart from all that, the excellent lyric will strike a sentimental chord in countless hearts! Don't forget-Losing You is the title; and so long as the Charts don't lose Brenda, the 'pop" world will be a happier place! \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

Lee, this week's top tribute might well have been awarded to Mark Wynter for his new Pye release-"Aladdin's Lamp." Although the title may be out of season the song itself is not. After all, Love knows no barriers-let alone seasons! And this is a love song of which Mark gives a clean-cut, careful performance in his distinctive style. The style of the composition is also distinctive-of its composer, Johnny Worth; and it is in this department my little bit of disappointment enters into things. It is a lively, bouncy number but although I've heard the disc very many times already I find the melody a bit elusive. It hasn't stuck in my mind as did Venus . . . and . . . Little Girl. Nevertheless, there is a warm, overall atmosphere that is "just right" which should make for success. It is a well-made disc but its success, to be quite honest, will be due to " . . . the singer, not the song . . . " Go on, rub the lamp and see what the Spirit says!

John Barry with his Seven and Orchestra come up with another theme tune on Columbia. This time, it's "The Human Jungle." So far as His are concerned, I always think Theme Tunes so unpredictable, however well-played they might be. This one is played excellently, with bags of contrast. It is slow, but there's a haunting quality in the melody and great interest in John Barry's arrangement. I wouldn't like to predict what the "jungle" of human opinion might do for it though.

Back to the kindergarten. We've had Loo-be-Loo; Ring-a-Roses; now we have "Here we go round the Mulberry Bush!" On Decca, The Chucks spin round the "Mulberry Bush" with considerable success. It is ideal Twist, and the gravelvoice of the soloist adds greatly to the atmosphere and success of this partydisc. If you haven't got a party, then I shouldn't bother!

On Pye, Lonnie Donegan comes



roaring back with a real rouser called "Losing By A Hair." This is the lively Donegan, in a not-*quite-so-comical*-Donegan-song about losing his wife because of a hair of the wrong colour being on his coat. It really drives along at a fair old lick and has all the vitality you expect from Lonnie in this type of song. It is not quite so infectious as some of his comedy hits of the past, though. Its success or failure will be by a sheer hair's breadth!!

Another Pye disc. This time, I regret to say, the subject of this week's

# Get Dancin' —with Chris

The only man to make the charts dance to his command recently has been-Yen! Chris Montez! When people were still advocating that hits with fast and furious beats just couldn't make it-in came Chris with Let's Dance straight into the Top Ten! His follow-up Some Kinda Fun didn't exactly stun the charts but then to console his many newly-formed fans Chris has had a great deal of success on his many TV appearances and one-night stands in this country. In fact, his "Juke Box Jury' appearance sent many of "Pop Weekly's' readers rushing to get pens to paper to ask for more details, all of which have been passed on to Chris! One hit and one near-miss isn't bad by platter standards today, but are we likely to see Chris back in the best-sellers again?

For a look at the U.S. Hot 100 shows me that after Chris's smash hit of Let's Dance he hasn't pulled a great deal of high chart placings in that country either. But I think that through Chris, if not directly connected with him, we will be seeing waxings hittin' the Top Ten with the Let's Dance style well to the fore and very much in the dance idion !

Chris, like Chubby Checker, is puttin' more teenagers back towards the boom of 1959—the dance era! With a new dance announced almost every other day, and certainly none of them looking like the Creep—it seems that the Chris Montez kinda beat and songs are just what the teenage population have been waiting for !

Have you noticed the change in the dances these days? They've been gettin' faster and faster since the slow jive went out. As Chris said to me, "I guess, Dave, they are beginning to swing slightly more since the Bill Haley days. I'm just glad that everyone liked my disc, and the way it was recorded. I had my doubts about it at first, like I guess every singer has. But that's all part of the business I suppose. I think your British teenagers go more for my kind of sound than they do in my country, really. Still, I hope some of my new platters may be able to please both the countries, but guess we'll have to see!"

I think that it won't be long before everyone will be swingin' to the Montez sound. Certainly, the success of the future Montez platters will depend on the way Chris has rocked the British fans on his recent tour. Judging by the remarks that one girl uttered after seeing him on BBC's "Juke Box Jury" I don't think there will be any doubt about the future of Mr. Montez. She said, "Ooo, isn't he a real livin' doll!" Get dancing --you don't want to be left out-do you?
