As most of you are aware, some pretty bad things have been printed about Elvis lately. Two National newspapers wrote some fairly critical pieces about him—I say fairly critical because some Elvis fans actually agreed with some of the tans actually agreed with some of the criticism. How things change! But let's look at things squarely. Is Elvis slipping? By the sales of his own magazine, Elvis Monthly, the answer is No! No! No! No! But, by the sales of his platter, One Broken Heart For Sale, he IS slippin'. Mind you, about a million other artistes wish they were slippin' like Elvis is slippin'! But first let me do away with two rather silly ideas the Elvis fans seem to have.

One. That it is a national disgrace if Elvis doesn't get into the charts in *one* leap every time! I say, and I'll stick to this, that it doesn't matter a darn whether Elvis gets into the charts or not! As long as his record sales maintain a good average, (which it is obvious they will), I repeat, there is no reason why one should have to bother about what other should have to bother about what other people say. After all, you buy an Elvis waxing for your enjoyment, or you should do—not for other people's enjoyment! Once upon a time dear old Frank Sinatra was heading the charts at every turn in show biz. Today, his platters don't reach the best-sellers very often, but they do sell.

The second point where Elvis fans seem to go wrong is that they regard me as an Elvis-hater. As Albert Hand, Editor of the Elvis Monthly will tell you, no-one sticks *more* to Presley discs than I do. I think if Elvis fans can find any bad write-ups that I have given in Pop Weekly I shall be very surprised. Even on a feature a few weeks ago I slammed the platter One Broken Heart For Sale-I wasn't slamming Elvis in point of fact, but his backing team for not giving us enough of Elvis! May I also add that quite a few letters arrived from Elvis fans who were completely on my side! No! Where Elvis is concerned I am amazed and entirely astonished at his fantastic run of success.

I sincerely hope his name doesn't disappear from the charts, and that he will always be there, not only as a figurehead for his fans all over the world, but as a guiding light to pop singers who are struggling to find stardom. Where Elvis is concerned we can all take a few lessons. But first Elvis lovers-Please, don't start slamming people simply because Elvis is not in the charts. Remember what the line in that old song says? "What Will Be, Will Be."

A second Liverpool combination, Gerry and the Pacemakers now looks like repeating the triumph of the Beatles, and amongst the vocal groups, the Springfields have at last come into the position they have long deserved.

To me, this proves one thing, that provided a disc is really first-rate, it will make the charts irrespective of the type, be it ballad, group, C 'n' W or what you will. And those 'experts' who say that you can't make it with this or the other type of material are talking through their hats. If it's good it will make it!

Karl, a world-traveller and a man who's seen life all over the world, took the situation manfully. But clearly he was wondering if his run of bad luck would never end-for he was also worried that his singles were no longer the automatic entries into the best-sellers.

Said Karl: "I don't mind telling you it was a big relief when 'Pop Weekly' told me that I was in the thirty. It's made up for a lot of disappointments in the past year . . .

Quite frankly, it couldn't happen to a more amiable, live-wire character.



He said: "I used to have a trad group, called the Noel Walker Stompers. Once, we were on the same bill as the Big Three. I heard their king-sized sound from my dressing-room and went into the wings expecting to see at least five musicians on stage.

"That only three men could pound out such solid vocal and instrumental excitement seemed uncanny. When the Stompers broke up, and I went to Decca, I just had to make a disc with them. They play dynamic, uninhibited rhythm 'n' blues with a vigour which just doesn't exist in this country except on Merseyside.

Their debut disc: Some Other Guy. Their name? At 2 a.m. in the Jacaranda Club, they read a political headline "The Big Three Get Together"-and it just seemed to suit their big-sound style of playing.

TRAD BOOMS DOWN UNDER

MR. ACKER BILK has triumphed so far on his tour down under. From newspapers in Auckland, Zealand, come rave notices in which each of the musicians have been singled out for high praise.

A coupla years ago, Sandra turned semi-professional. She joined the Boyfriends, who'd dug her song-stylings. They're still her backing group-lining up as Tony Farrow (lead guitar), Paul McGrath (drums), Dusty Rhodes (rhythm guitar) and Brian Sinclair (bass guitar).

Said Sandra: "We became so busy that in September, 1961, we decided to take a chance and turn full professional. Honestly, we were swamped with work in the clubs, and on one-night stands round Yorkshire. Last year, we spent the summer at a Filey holiday camp."

That camp proved the luckiest thing they'd done. Bandleader Gary Brown was also playing there and liked them so much he set the wheels in motion for them to take a recording test. This they passed with flying colours.

Said Sandra: "Now we're hoping things will really happen for us. Everybody at EMI has been very kind to us and very encouraging. My own ambition is to top the bill at the London Palladium. All right, I know that's pretty high thinking-but you've got to aim high, haven't you. Sandra's real name is Sandra Norgen.

She has a real live-wire personality and is a dab hand on the skating rinks.

Said Sandra: "Not for a moment do I regret making that change over from the classics. There's so much fun in the pop field and we really have a ball."

Now, By Hook Or By Crook, Sandra is steadying herself for that chance to get on the stage at the London Palladium. Good luck to her!

Says their manager Brian Epstein, "It's all go for the boys at the moment. They have their hands full with TV and radio dates, aside from their normal one-nighters, and frankly I've never seen a group who really do love working so much! They seem to be able to work 24 hours a day and still come up for more! I only wish someone could work out how much sleep they've had time for in the last few weeks!

My guess is that they haven't had more than five or six hours a day-at the most! The really amazing thing is however, that instead of sleeping when they get the chance they start back again by doing new stage routines and writing new songs. They're magnificent!" should imagine that's what everyone will be saying about the Beatles for they certainly deserve their success-and from the rumours I hear the Beatles may be lined up for special guest appearances in a couple of pop films due out very soon. I'm bettin' that like their performance on record—they'll come off just as brilliantly on films!

Forgotten all about your Easter Holidays by now? Shockin' isn't it? Back to the hard slog until Whitsun. But we have got discs to brighten our doldrums, haven't we? And here is another selection of recent releases to keep the old pot boiling.

And as a bonus, let us consider a particularly outstanding E.P. Well, it makes a change, doesn't it, eh? Yes! From the soundtrack of that really fabulous pop-music-package-show-on celluloid, "Just For Fun" Pye have released two tracks from Mark Wynter and two from Joe Brown. And all four tracks are full of fun, too. Mark's virtual theme song from the film, "Vote For Me", starts off the proceedings in a bright mood and he completes a polished duo of songs with a tender, sincere "Happy With You." On side two, Joe gives the carbon copy of his film performance of "What's The Name Of The Game?" and "Let Her Go. Both tracks are full of his irrepressible personality and exude warmth from every part of the one continuous groove of each song. A wonderful bargain

On Decca, Tony Newley makes a long awaited comeback to singles with "There's No Such Thing As Love" which has a neat, original lyric. Tony puts his individual stamp on it, with a polish and assurance that is a pleasure to hear, but I'm afraid it is a disc with limited "pop" appeal, on current trends—but it is an appealing song, performance and arrangement.

On Stateside we have The Rocky Fellers (who sound more like The Rocky GALS!!) with Killer Joe. This doesn't appeal to me for the simple reason that I find it dully monotonous, even though I admit the strong beat may well attract many ears-but it has little else to save it from the has little else to save in from being earmarked as "one of so many unidentifiable group-work discs." I find the lyric hard to follow and there is no distinguishing melody-so what's left? A pretty healthy beat—and it just depends on whether YOU like a beat well enough to prevent this one being sent to the limbo of

On the other hand The Emotions give a natty piece of group work with "L.O.V.E.", on London. A well-balanced performance this, combining good harmony with a gentle beat. There is a fairly distinctive melody and some interesting solo voices. For my money, the important thing in all group work is contrast—and The Emotions give us plenty-both in mood and tempo. "L.O.V.E." catches the attention from the start and holds it right through to its neat, clean end.

"The Lonely Bull" Tijuana Brass of Herb Alpert is now "Marching Thru' Madrid," on Stateside. It is full of Spanish atmosphere and is in much the same vein as that little bull on his ownsome, but it lacks the drive and melodic attraction to repeat the success. Nevertheless, the mood is well captured and appeals to me for a bit of imaginative

From her many successes in the Theatre Shani Wallis now appears on Ritz in the full "pop" idiom with a fast moving beat ballad called "My Heart Cries For You." She makes a good job of it too, bringing all her experience to mingle with the arrangement and electronic "mysteries" of the "pop" gimmick in a mixture that could well capture many ears. It is lively and has much impact.

BRING BACK, BRING BACK, O BRING BACK OUR BOBBY TO

A letter from a reader some time ago mentioned the fact that American artistes seem to be disappearing from our charts with amazing speed. Just two weeks ago one U.S. paper carried a large feature on the fact that once they had had at least ten of Britain's Top Twenty taken by American artistes, and yet lately only a few were hittin' the charts. What is the reason for this? I don't know—but I am very sad indeed to see that one of the most versatile actors, comedians, dancers and certainly one of the most consistent chart-riding Americans has disappeared from our best-sellers! Why? Again—I don't know. What's that? His name? Well, who else but-Bobby Darin!

His single You're The Reason I'm Livin', slid from the top regions of the American best-sellers, BUT did not as was usual, hit the Top over here. Instead, it plunged dismally into the black bottom of nowhere-and hasn't been seen since! Bobby, like the rest of the American once-consistent pop singers must be asking himself—WHY? WHY? WHY? The answer seems to be that Britain is producing more and better singers of her own, tho' I don't think the time will ever come when only British singers will be top of the charts, or that only British popular vocalists will make up the entire chart.

But I think that one of the main reasons that Bobby's last disc never made it was because of the fact that it was almost a straight copy of the Ray Charles treatment of I Can't Stop Loving You. Too many artistes, among them the "King" Nat Cole, have copied Charles' style of "Loving You" on their own numbers. I think that was one of the biggest slips Bobby ever made. Let's hope that he doesn't go on making more like them, for he has, until this recent lapse, provided much of the entertainment we have enjoyed lately. Films, discs, and due to his songwriting efforts other singers have been able to give us some great chart entries. So, come on, Bobby-Let's see you back into the charts!

TO CLIFF CREDIT

A musical paper recently carried the following paragraph. "EMI, Cliff Richard's record company, is understood to feel that he (Cliff) is bigger than Presley on the world market." Whatever the word "understood" means, I'm not quite sure, but it's certain that many Presley followers are going to be biting their lips in rage at that statement! Actually, at that time Elvis had more discs in prominent positions in the world charts than Cliff did!

Still, back to Cliff and-What's Happening? As you probably know, Cliff has won an award recently for NOT singing, but composing! The number, if you didn't already guess, was the swingy Bachelor Boy which he penned with Shadow, Bruce Welch,

Cliff is all set to make another film after his Blackpool season. Titles and story lines are still being worked on. but I'm assured that it's going to be along the "Summer Holiday" lines, with plenty of songs, fun and, I hear, even more of the Shadows. From the rumours that are circulating the Shadows will only feature prominently in the movie if they are up to the dancing standard that is required. In my opinion I think they will be, as their summer show at Blackpool requires a fair amount of stage movement along these lines! The film starts around mid-October, and will be produced by Ken Harper, who also produced the sparkling earlier Cliff movie milestones, 'Summer Holiday" and "The Young Ones.'

This means the Australian trip we mentioned in Pop Weekly will now be put back to early in 1964. From there Cliff is lined up to do more overseas touring, although dates and places are not mentioned, tho' it is highly probable that Cliff will return to South Africa. A world trip is also in the offing, and this would of course enable Cliff to drop in on all the countries where his name registers in the charts-and man! that's quite a few countries. It may also be possible for Cliff to meet his idol Elvis, for Cliff is being promoted heavily in the States, and it's fairly certain that he'll be over there for some time if one of his singles "clicks!"

At present Cliff is concluding his tour and is having consultations regarding his next single. After the huge success of "Summer Holiday" the film, the single, and the LP, which are still selling heavily, it's fairly certain that Cliff's next chunk of hot wax will be a fast "A" side coupled with a slow "B" side. At one time I thought it impossible for Cliff to get any bigger than he was but I can't honestly see Cliff missing the No. 1 slot unless he makes a very bad number. And as Cliff fans know, he never does that, does he?

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
