Top artistes remain top artistes, or so the saying goes. But take someone like Tommy Steele. Although still a fave of many of today's teenagers, he is essentially an all-round likeable character. Starring in such musicals as "Half A Sixpence" may improve his standing with many more thousands of people but his "cloak" of golden secrecy that comes from being a pop idol is automatically ripped off. Now to the point in this feature. Is the same happening to Cliff? Although his platters still hit the charts with almost unusual ease, his career seems to be heading towards one that artistes like Tommy have carved for themselves, Take Cliff's show at Blackpool. Instead of just coming on, and then disappearing after singing about ten numbers, he is on-stage throughout most of the production.

Surely, the main climax to any show is when the star gives a last fabulous rendering and then disappears from the scene, leaving his fans wanting more? But now Cliff is giving all of himself. Soon, he will start work in another film, plus pouring out radio shows, TV appearances, records, his summer show a hit-and still ringing in the ears of his fans-at the same time making numerous

stage appearances.

Can an artiste give too much of himself? I say Cliff is, and that he ought to cut down on all appearances, especially in shows like the current Blackpool season. Too much of an artiste can be worse than not enough, and I think Cliff is over-doing it.

Now, before his next film starts he should be on his way to the Canary Islands or somewhere like that. Otherwise, he may fall into the idea of too many films, but over-do it more so by trying to cram TV, radio, discs and stage shows in at the same time. What do fans think? Cast aside your personal hopes at seeing Cliff in person, and think of it from Cliff's career point of view. His last disc Lucky Lips didn't reach the No. 1 slot. Some of the reason for that could probably be due to the fact that Cliff is too much of a household word. Mention the name Cliff to anyone and they KNOW it couldn't be anyone else but Cliff Richard.

Again, ask some older people who they think is most popular here or whom they know in the pop world and the answer is certain to be Cliff. Anyway, let me hear your views. Do you think that Cliff should cut down on all his many activities (apart from single disc releases obviously) or do you think that he should carry on making as many films, as many shows, as many LP's, and as many radio and TV spots?

DISCussion

Whether you're spinning off somewhere for the August Bank Holiday week-end or just staying at home, I hope you have a swinging time; and to help you along the way here are a few of the recent releases.

Oriole gives us "How Long Can This Last?" which is a Tom Springfield composition of note. Rey Anton gives a lively performance of the lyric and the disc bounces along with lots of life. In my book, this is Rey's best disc to date and one which should win him many friends. I hope so.

Terry Lightfoot's Jazzmen give their own particular treatment to "If I Ruled The World," one of the tunes from Harry Secombe's smash hit London stage show "Pickwick." It drives along and makes for exciting listening. This well-played, well-performed piece would be an ideal "warmer-upper" for your holiday party.

But party spirit or no, I'm afraid I've got a

-BRICKBAT-

I fling it with rather mixed feelings this week—and I'll tell you why. When I listened to my first spin of the C.B.S. platter, Be Careful Of Stones That You Throw, (Cor! that's a mouthful of a title, isn't it, eh?), I muttered to myself — "Can this really be Dion? . . ." Mainly because this is NOT one of his trade-marked hand-clapping fast beat numbers; for the first time, on a single release, here is Dion singing slowly, with a certain amount of feeling. I was delighted! But then, I heard the song itself!! I don't hesitate to point out that I think Dion makes a good job of the song BUT . . . the song itself is one of those nauseating, sob-throbbing sagas which points a moral. This kind of thing, including the soulfully spoken passage, usually goes down well in the States but seldom, if ever, in our country. It's a pity that Dion should have to make his change of style with such a disc. The title refers, of course, to that adage about people living in glass houses . . . and goes on and on about the wicked gossip of neigh-bours, the "bad" girl of the street and "the crushed, broken body..." Oh no!! Not on a pop record, however tastefully it may be done! There's a time and a place for everything-but not now or here for this one. I wonder what your feelings are?

The Five Du-Tones, on Stateside, "Shake A Tail Feather" and make a lot of noise doing so. It is one of those really driving, throbbing, beat group numbers that never seem to let up. This one is well done and has lots of impact. Personally, I don't care for it—but then I don't usually go for this type of group; however, I'm the first to admit that this

is a good example and one which will find many willing ears, deservedly so.

Just for a change, how about going all Italian? I was most interested to receive the R.C.A. Victor release of Italy's No. 1 "pop" songstress, Rita Pavone. Are you interested in hearing how another country's "pop" idols work? Well, "Curore" ("Heart") opens slowly and quietly and gradually builds up to a driving climax (even though Italian A & R men seem to have caught the bug of "fading out" the end!!). Rita gives a striking performance, full of warmth and heart (excuse the pun!) and the pounding beat throughout the disc makes it acceptable in any language. It is a good song, well orchestrated and well-sung. A special little Bouquet, in the foreign dept!

Do you feel dreamy and romantie? Well, Michael Holliday's both "Between Hello And Goodbye" on Columbia. A gentle ballad, this—with a subtle chorus in the background and a predominant rhythm accompaniment. It hink the melody itself a bit uninspired, but if you like a velvet-smooth voice, Michael's will charm you.

*** BOUQUET ****

Of this week's selection, I've turned to a bit of light comedy—perhaps it's the breath of the oncoming holiday spirit, eh? A very simple little ditty called Don't Blow Us Up on Decca, gives Clay Morton a chance to reveal a very ordinary but acceptable style of Cockney humour. It is a lively arrangement with an infectious bounce and the whole thing is well recorded. The Cockney sense of humour, which always bursts into lovable optimism at the time of tragedy and adversity, is captured here. ... "Don't light the blue touch paper,

... there's not enough room for the lot of us on top of a dirty great mushroom! . . ." Hardly a work of art, but an irresistible, infectious rhythm and atmosphere.

Little Richard sticks with his fastmoving versions of gospel songs on the new London release. This one is "Travellin' Shoes" and it moves at a really breath-taking pace. I like this one, because Little R. doesn't scream the lyric but gives a restrained performance that gains much for all that. The rapid, insistent beat is almost hypnotic and soon moves one to join in the hand-clapping and foot-stamping. Strong and effective.

Lets go to the top of the next column and see what the L.P.s have in store.

JOHNNY MATHIS. NEWEST HITS" C.B.S. BPG, 62147

Although the charts have eluded him in this country, Johnny has had many hits in the States, of course, and this is the latest collection. We all know most of them, even though they have not been universally successful here, chartwise; songs like Gina, What Will My Mary Say, Sweet Thursday, Unaccustomed As I Am. Each one has the polish and depth of interpretation we expect of Johnny and the L.P. makes excellent listening. So, if you're feeling romantic you could do far worse than grab a copy of this disc.

BOB HOPE. "HOPE IN RUSSIA— AND ONE OTHER PLACE." BRUNSWICK. LAT 8539

How about a spot of comedy for a change? And if you like Bob Hope, then you're in for a side-splitting time; he is at his gagging best with a "live" audience. The Russian track was recorded at the American Embassy in Moscow and "the other place" is the University of Notre Dame. Topical, local and quick-fire gags roll out left, right and centre, making this a Big Must for all Hope-fuls! But if you prefer Jack Benny—well, Bob Hopes you'll still buy "Hope In Russia"!

THE LETTERMEN. "COLLEGE STANDARDS."

The very distinctive style of this talented trio brings new interest to good old songs like *Dream, The Party's Over, The Whiffenpoof Song* and *No Other Love.* The boys always show integrity and still give their own "free-style" interpretation of a lyric; this makes for good listening, with the attention held very firmly. A satisfying collection.

BUDDY GRECO. "BUDDY'S BACK IN TOWN."

Beat, drive, humour, sure-fire talent.

Yet, with TV, radio, stage shows, discs, and many other fields open to him he still doesn't seem to have achieved the hit parade status that he should have done. Why? I put the question to Mark. "It's a bit difficult to say why, Dave" he told me. "One moment I'm not quite sure where the disc has slipped too. Some of my numbers like Venus In Blue Jeans have of course, been good songs, and catchy enough to make the Top Three.

"But other times I don't always think it's the fault of the songs. Now and then I'll have a few minutes spare, invite some of my fans around to point out what's wrong but they say they all buy the disc. The only thing I can think of is that my fans just take their

time over buying my discs.'

He grinned happily when I told him that I was still receiving marvellous reports from his appearance in the big summer show at Great Yarmouth. "Yes, we've had a good time there" he added. "Mind you, I've had Rolf Harris and Joe Brown to have a ball with. Both are fantastic performers, and two of my best friends.

"I only wish there were more people like that among some of the stars today" he continued, "for if you want two guys who are completely free from being bigheaded, and are two of the funniest blokes for having a good time, you couldn't meet two better guys than Joe and Rolf. By the way, could you pass on a message to my fans. I've been receiving a lot of letters from them at the theatre in Yarmouth, and I haven't had time to reply to them all. I'm hoping to get around to answering the mail soon, but there's quite a lot I've still got to get around to." He leaned casually back, stretched his long legs, and then proceeded to tell me what he hopes to do soon. "I'm definitely going to have a big gathering of the clans, or should I say fans" he laughed.

"Seriously, it's about time the fans heard from me personally, and having a big party saves them all writing to me when they know they may not get an

answer for weeks.

"Then there's the professional side of interested in doing some more film work after 'Just For Fun' which I enjoyed tremendously. It didn't give me much opportunity to act, but I enjoyed it."

I ended the conversation as any Mark Wynter fan would have done. "And I enjoyed watching it Mark!"

ALWAYS YOURS

It's here! It can be yours-"Always Yes! It's the new bright bouncy and entirely delightful L.P. from John Leyton, film star, pop idol, TV actor, the lot all rolled into one. In fact, that's what they ought to have called this disc, "The Lot" for it's got the lot and more in everyone of the twelve tracks. Why is this the best L.P. that has appeared on the market in recent months? I'll tell you. For every one of the tracks on the album were all going to be picked as singles! Which obviously means they're all with it, and are about the best chunk of beat and ballad numbers that John has ever turned his hand (or should it be voice?) to! Nine of the numbers are on the beaty side, the other three are beaut ballads. I must say that the title is appropriate in one way. Even John, who is usually pretty critical of many of the numbers that he waxes, agreed with me that it was the best recorded work of his since the start of his career. The front cover of John is also enough to make the many thousands of Leyton fans rush out for, before even hearing any of the tracks from this masterpiece. Said Robert Stigwood, manager of John Leyton. "Although John's album sold well, I think it suffered from some minor bad recording. This has been eliminated completely on this album. I am very pleased with the result of this L.P." Judging by the requests that have poured in from Leyton fans, so has John Leyton! He told me, "Usually there is something I like or dislike about every disc I make. Usually, it's something I think could be done better, but by the time I think of another style the record is in the shops. But on this album, I think it's one of the best I've made.

John recently has needed something to cheer him up, as for the last few weeks he has been plagued with colds and mild 'flu. "Still, I'm about getting over it now, and I'm soon off to the States, I think for news about another film, and about my discs over there, so I shall manage to catch up with some sun if I get there at the right time. It's still a strong possibility that I may be able to get down on a Western film, tho' I know I've got one film for certain but they won't let me release any details of it yet. Still, with the way things are going I doubt whether I'll be able to start work on it straight away, as I've got a Christmas pantomime to do plus another tour, and all this has got to be done before the New Year.

Well, busy or not, that didn't stop me hearing later in the day that John had slipped off to visit one of his fans in hospital.

NEW TO YOU TOMMY QUICE

If ever a disc looks like moving quickly, then it's On The Tip Of My Tongue, on Pye—and not just because the singer on this debut recording is one Tommy QUICKLY, of Liverpool. It's a Beaties' number, penned by Paul

It's a Beatles' number, penned by Paul McCartney and John Lennon; a gay, light-heartedly swingin' number. And the eyes of the whole of the pop industry are firmly on Tommy, a brown-haired, blue-eyed lad of 18, who stands sturdily at 5 ft. 9 in.

For Tommy is the first SOLO performer to be signed by Brian Epstein, the Northern star-booster whose stable already includes The Beatles, Gerry and the Pacemakers, Billy J. Kramer and the Dakotas and the Big Three. In the past few weeks, it's all been happening OUICKLY for Tommy . . .

He used to operate, singing ordinary pops, with a group called The Challengers. One evening they were auditioning, which really means "filling in" at a dance run in Widnes by Brian Epstein. He turned up earlier than expected and was very impressed with the vocal style of Tommy.

He booked Tom and the group to appear at the famed Cavern, Liverpool, along with B. Bumble and the Stingers. In June, Tommy signed with Brian.

Soon after that he was handed a demo disc of On The Tip Of My Tongue, originally intended for Joe Brown, and liked it immediately. In no time at all, he was in the Pye studios, fronting a session group and singing out with all the confidence in the world.

Tommy's home ground is Norris Green, Liverpool, and instrumentally speaking he can cope only with some self-taught chords on guitar. His first public appearance was at the Liverpool Civil Service Club in May, 1962.

Said Tommy: "At school, I couldn't get on with most of the subjects. I can remember singing in various choirs right

from the time I was eight or nine—and I used to like woodwork and gymnastics.

"When I left school, I became an apprentice with the Automatic Telephone Company and I must say I was really very interested in the work. I didn't really want to give it up, but I was persuaded that singing could become a worthwhile career for me."

The Challengers were not so brave and decided to stay semi-pro in the Liverpool area. Now Tommy works purely and simply on his own.

Though he still includes a fair percentage of pops in his stage act, he also leans now towards the Rhythm 'n' Blues field. And he stirs up a fair whack of excitement when he does so.

Pye executives are knocked out by Tommy's debut disc. They're giving it the full fireworks and treatment. Brian Epstein says quietly: "Tommy has everything needed to become a big name quickly, if you'll pardon the pun."

And with Brian's recent record of huge success, who on earth is going to argue with him?


