



SHADS AT PEAK

Naming the top instrumental group can lead one into a lotta trouble. So many fans think that their favourite group is the best that the situation ends in a free fight. However, I don't think anyone will dispute the fact that The Shadows are this country's most popular and most successful group. In fact, they are a bit too successful—for the question now arises, "Where can they go from here?" Already they can snap their fingers and appear on almost any programme they want to on TV, the same applies to radio. On disc they turn out potential charttoppers with every release. On stage shows they don't need anyone else on the bill to fill a hall.

So where, but where do they go from here? Films? A possibility, yes. But they already appear in films with their boss, Cliff, and rumours reach me that Cliff may give them more acting in his next film. Of course, they could do their own film, but it would be a bit difficult to cast them in roles that would still make the acting good. Again, they could have their own TV show. But they are already big enough to top the Palladium in their own right, so why have one, because they can appear on TV whenever they want to. No! The situation is that the Shadows have reached their peak. Now the only thing they have to do is try to hold on to the crown that gives them the right to be the top instrumental group in the country.

Of course, they could do more tours abroad, or even have their own TV shows abroad, televised to about ten countries, but that is where the popularity begins to get a bit over-done. The only thing the Shadows can do or is left for them to do is their own TV show, and their own film, all of which present big problems. First, the musical. This would mean that Cliff would be without the Shadows backing him on his shows. The same thing again if they were doing a film, which means enough problems finding the right kind of script.

The same again for their TV show, tho' admitted they could record this in advance. What should they do? For with many, many more bigger and more polished instrumental groups hitting the road and the charts, competition is getting worse. Personally, I'd like to see the Shadows do a half hour TV show of their own plus a "short" feature film, about twenty minutes long, of a typical day in the life of the Shadows.

The ideal set-up from my point of view, would be a weekly half hour TV show, a weekly radio programme, a new disc every eight to ten weeks, with an album every three months, and a tenweek tour of Great Britain every year, making sure that all the venues were announced well in advance in time for the fans to make their own plans, plus two big Fan Club parties every year.

But of course, the Shadows are the Shadows, so whatever happens you can bet that the boys will make sure that the fans get their money's worth.

Plans For Billy's

T seems certain that Billy's big musical that everyone is talking about only needs a few more details before scenes are arranged for shooting for the beginning of February.

Definite facts so far are-that it will be a wide-screen film, that it will be studded with at least ten or twelve songs. three or four beat numbers and seven or eight ballads. It will be released through the Rank circuit. Also the first hint of a story line was that the scenes will be shot mostly in Britain but with some of the scenes in France, and as the film is on the lines of a colourful musical, it may have Billy in the role of a British tourist visiting France, and singing to the teenagers there.

However, no full details will be released until December.

EW SOUNDS FR EXPERIMENTS ON FUTURE DISCS

THE SHADOWS' well-known and much-copied guitar sound is likely to be much less copied with their future releases. Reason? They will add more strings, French horns, choirs and other "backing" sounds on their next platters.

Will this destroy the boys' influence on the hit parade? Said top A & R man Norrie Paramor (who also records Cliff, Helen and Frank Ifield) "Not in the least. I think the boys should change as time goes on, and so do they. They are all keen to experiment with a new number or new sounds. Their lead guitar work will still be the same sound, only augmented by trumpets and various other instruments. We did it with Atlantis and we tried a French horn on Wonderful Land and they were hits.

SEARCH FOR NEW GROUPS

THE hunt for groups has now outgrown both Liverpool and Manchester. London, Birmingham, Wales, even Scotland, are being scoured for vocal/ instrumental groups who may be record-worthy.

EMI, Decca, Pye, Philips, Oriole, all the top five labels in this country are going all out to secure groups. Top A & R men such as Norrie Paramor of EMI are recording almost day and night. But the London groups are still having difficulty in making the grade. Many of them are spending upwards of £50 on cutting their own discs, but so far no London group has yet managed to pierce the Top Twenty.

Break for

T is rumoured that Elvis Presley plans to go ahead with his earlier schedule, and cut down on films after "Mister Will You Marry Me?" has been finished. So far, two Elvis films have still to be seen in this country; "Fun In Acapulco" and "Vive Las Vegas" (which is expected to have a title change shortly). Then Elvis will finish shooting on "Mister Will You Marry Me?" and by the beginning of 1964 should have a clear schedule for the next six months, except for the records he hopes to cut.

OR STATES ?

STAGGERING rumour that A Mitch Murray, the songwriter who put the Pacemakers to the top of the charts with How Do You Do It? and I Like It, and is also composer of many current Top Fifty hits may go to the United States to live and work came to light a few days ago. Murray, who was not available for comment at time of going to press, is known to think highly of the American music scene, and that he does not think that the music scene here affords him much scope.

Britain would lose one of her newest and most hit parade-worthy composers if Murray did leave this country. He is reputed to have at least another six songs, all of which have the same musical "catchiness" as How Do You Do It?

Tremeloes Annoyed

BRIAN POOLE and The Tremeloes reported as being annoyed at accusations of cashing-in on Beatles' success with their hit disc Twist And Shout. They point out, rightly enough, that their platter is entirely different to the other versions of this number in the charts.

The boys have a full programme of stage and TV dates lined up for the future and another L.P. on wax which is expected to prove a big seller.



Setting off next month, Kenny Ball and his Jazzmen are making another tour of the United States. Their trip will take in two concerts in the cradle of jazz, New Orleans.

DISCussion

Off to a spinning start this week with a disc for which so many people have been waiting-the new one from

Freddie and the Dreamers. The new title on Columbia, "I'm Telling You Now" is much in the idiom of their first smash hit and I have no doubt it will meet with a big wave of approval. If you're particularly fussy about your discs you might find this one a little laboured to the extent of becoming monotonous through the constant neverchanging rhythm and lack-lustre lyric. I don't think it lives up to expectations, although it IS a good disc of its type.

The shapely form of brunette Susan Maugham declares "The Verdict Is Guilty" on her new Philips platter. It is a strong ballad with a performance of power from Susan and a really heavy, driving beat backing Wally Stott and his orchestra. But this medium-paced composition lacks the attraction of any memorable melodic line. For my money, it is a whole host of talent wasted on mediocre material—that is to say, Hit-wise!

*** BOUQUET ******

Once again for MY money, Cameo-Parkway come up with a disc that deserves my top award in every department. By no means the least is Bobby Rydell who gives a lyrical and beaty interpretation of It's Time We Parted. This is not only good Rydell, but also very "POP" Rydell! The beat and the melody combine to make it an infectious, romantic ballad. The orchestration is clean-cut and the whole thing has an atmosphere of "we know what we're doing". and WHAT they are all doing is X of the best. A very satisfying offering.

Another disc that pleases me this week is **The Spotniks'** new Oriole release; an instrumental revival of the Pomus/ Shuman composition "Save the Lass Dance For Me"—"**Valentina**." The Swedes really swing and drive into space with this one, giving the well-known notes a completely fresh sound. But if I may be allowed to be REALLY fussy, I think an even stronger beat would have made it even more successful. As it is, however, it is an excitting sound.

The Rooftop Singers walk right into the hopeful chart stakes with "Mama Don't Allow," on Fontana, but I find this far less attractive than their earlier big-smasher. There is exactly the same flavour about this one, but despite the novelty of the recurrent guitar themes (well-done, too!), I find it gets a little boring half way through. Make no mistake, though, it's a neat, professional bit of work and one which might well

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catch the imagination of many. It falls short of catching mine, I'm afraid.

If you were one of the many thousands who liked *Little Band Of Gold*, then it's more than on the cards that you will like **James** (now called JIMMY) Gilreath's **Lollpops**, Lace and Lipstick' on the Pye International label. With a distinctive similarity of backing, the new one also has an undeniable charm despite the child-like simplicity of the lyric (the title will give you a clue to THAT!) But let us not be dismayed the disc HAS much appeal for all that.

-BRICKBAT-

Oh dear, Oh dear, Oh dear! What HAS come over Paul Anka of late? In the past he has proved himself to be such a good artist. with a certain amount of versatility, but on recent discs he seems to have deserted singing for either plain shouting or declaiming! His new R.C.A. Victor release called Hello Jim is no exception. Written by Paul himself, this dramatic ballad has an insistent, slow beat but nothing else. Paul half-speaks, half-shouts the words with little or no recognition to the world of melody. Some might say it is an effective piece of "acting"-but this is a "pop" disc and I doubt its "popularity." For me, no charm, no attraction, no nothing!

Iain Gregory comes from the world of chain-mail into that of echo-chambers to give us his version of the title-song from the film "Yellow Teddy Bear." The Malcolm Mitchell composition, on Columbia, moves along with a lively beat, but Iain's performance is one of those hard to really assess through a haze of echo and double-tracking. But then, I suppose the overall "Sound" is what really matters in these cases. So, in THAT case, it can be summed up by saying "Well, yes, it's O.K.—but we've heard it before!" It's one of the discs you either love or hate. So I'm going to be a right coward (??) and say "I'll meet it half-way!!" What's happened to Aldersley, then? Must have a touch of the sun!

I like Brian Hyland's new H.M.V. release—"I'm Afraid To Go Home" which gives him the chance to get away from the rather wailing, lonely-heart sound we've heard on the last couple of dises or so. There's lots of attraction in this medium-paced ballad and I think this is Brian's best dise performance for some time.

What now? Well, see you at the top of the next column for the L.P. spot?



And The TOP 4 L.P.s

JUNE CHRISTY. "JUST A-SWINGIN" AND A-ROCKIN' BIG BAND SPECIALS'' CAPITOL T. 1845

This is a "pip" for lovers of the Big Band and the star Big Band Singer! June covers the waterfront in a range of songs covering Duke Ellington's *Prelude To A Kiss*, Charlie Barnett's famous *Skyline*: to Dizzie Gillespie's *Night In Tunisia*. There is vocal versatility here; there is the shade of "yesterday's" big swing coupled with contemporary interpretation. An L.P. that holds the interest all the way.

AL JOLSON. "MEMORIES" BRUNSWICK LAT. 8536

Our mother and father will have vivid memories of one of the greatest entertainers of their time; and all the memories are here on yet another collection of Jolson hits. Apart from a medley of Stephen Foster melodies, there are songs like Kol Nidre, Remember Mother's Day and In Our House—all very sentimental and all sung with Jolson's unabashed emotion which causes lots of folk today to label him "ham." I admit he's not everyone's cup of tea at present, but at the same time, i will go as far as to say there are those singers nowadays who still try to emulate him.

CHARLES AZNAVOUR. "SINGS POUR VOUS MESDAMES" LONDON GLB. 1003

For you, ladies, here is France's bestselling hit writer singing twelve of his own compositions, nearly all of them in English; but for all of you who have a working knowledge of the Armenian tongue, Mr. Aznavour obliges during a short passage on one track. There is a certain romantic flavour about the performance. Hardly what you might call a "beat album"! But, why worry? There's a place for everything and I think lots of folk will find a place for Charles Aznavour's warmth and humour.

EYDIE GORME. "BLAME IT ON THE BOSSA NOVA" C.B.S. BPG, 62136

Here's an excellent L.P. which will cut across two sections of the public; those who are fans of Eydie will have a feast of her talent; and those who want to do the bossa nova will find that rhythm a-plenty. Both vocals and orchestrations are first class and combine to make this an exciting experience. You can blame it on Eydie Gorme for making it so.

FANTASTIC FOUR

Only four guys but do they kick up a storm? Their brief tour of this country earlier in the year showed that they have a mass of fans in this country. In fact, only four guys like the Four Seasons could have kicked up such a fantastic sound on-stage. Now they are back in the States, but letters still pour into "Pop Weekly" asking when they are coming back and whether they can join their Fan Club over here. In the States they have a double-sided smash that looks as if it intends to do the same here. I spoke to the boys before they flew back to their own country. "What was your best impressions of the music scene over here?" I asked them.

Their answer was that although we didn't have so many types of music here that had a big following such as spirituals etc., they thought our music front was one of the best they had ever been around. As for our teenagers, they thought we had some of the most swingin' cool cats on the scene, "They know more about their idols than the teenagers in the States do" one of the crew told me. "Except for the American Elvis fans" said someone with a laugh, "Well, that guy is the greatest" added one of the other members. What was the size of their Fan Club in the States? "About 20,000 I reckon" said one of the boys casually! Then he added, just as casually, "At least, that's for New York. I don't know about our Fan Clubs in the other States."

What did they dislike about this country? The boys looked at each other. "Well, there was only one guy we didn't like. You see, we were on our way to Brighton, and we were a bit late, so we hired a car and started off. Well, we were about five miles I guess from this Brighton place, and we stopped for a coffee. We got back in the automobile, and I forgot we were in Britain, and I started driving on the right-hand side of the road. Then these guys in a blue car, with some little blue light on top waved us back to the other side. Well, we changed over O.K. then this guy kept on following us in this car, and kept waving. Well, we thought he was a fan or something so we waved back and I tod on the gas 'cause we were late."

Suddenly the Four Seasons almost collapsed with laughing. "What's the matter?" I asked. The member telling the story stopped laughing, and added, "This guy was a cop' Boy! Did he go mad when he caught us? Did he! Anyway, we told him we were sorry, and then he took out this book. We thought we were gonna get booked or somethin" like that. But he let us off, and asked for our autographs!! Were we glad. Still, apart from that we didn't like him 'cause he said all pop singers were pretty bad and that he only wanted the autographs for his daughter."

Any other bad points? "Yep! said one of the crew. "The girls here were so nice that we didn't have a chance to talk to them enough. That was a shame!"



FIRST-TIME HITSTERS—HOLLIES

They are some of the swinglest guys to make up a group at any time. Their manager, Tommy Sanderson (who is, incidentally, also manager of Shane Fenton) thought they were terrific when he saw them, and promptly rushed them into a recording studio for their first platter, which also turned out to be their first hit, a swingy chunk of wax titled Ain't That Just Like Me. It burst into the inns and disc bars alike and established for itself a firm position in the Top Thirty, where it sold the odd few thousand and gave the boys their big breaks on TV, radio and many tours. Now the offers are still coming in and manager Tommy Sanderson is rumoured to have another hit up his sleeve.

The five lads, Tony Hicks, lead guitar and vocals, Allan Clarke, singer, drummer Don Rathbone, bass guitarist Eric Haydock, and rhythm guitar Graham Nash who also handles vocals have been catching up on their own song-writing efforts too. In fact, it's quite likely that some of their future platters will be their own compositions. They have already just finished a part in the Frankie Vaughan film 'lt's All Over Town'' and have decided that if they ever really make the grade that filming could be one of their main ambitions, next to meeting fans and appearing "live'!

Said Graham Nash, "We aim to turn out as many bright and bouncy numbers as we can. I think people are sick to death of hearing sad numbers. Everyone wants to be happy at one time or another, so we aim to try and keep them that way," which is a nice thought, and their first effort on wax seems to prove that the Hollies are right in their thinking. The group are pleased too: that they are one of the "other groups." Welre Manchester and proud of it." Four of the boys (leave out Tony Hicks) were together and known as the Deltas. Then they split up, met Tony, and it all started happening. A few personal notes on the guys themselves.

There's lead singer Allan Clarke, who has had so many jobs it's just not true! He is fairly tall, with black hair and brown eyes. Tony Hicks, lead guitar and vocals too, is blue-eyed enough to flip the chicks, and has dark brown hair —"and a dark brown voice" he added.

Bass guitarist Eric has black hair, brown eyes, and handles the extremely difficult instrument—a six-string bass guitar. He's yet another cool cat who the girls flip over.

Graham Nash, tall at 5 ft. 11 ins. has brown hair, blue eyes, and both those blue eyes are keen on spotting girls!

Last but not least is Don Rathbone, who breaks drumsticks and his wrists nearly every night. He's tall, wellmannered and has black hair and brown eyes. One thing they all have in common. Talent—and we're likely to see plenty of it!



NEW TO YOU * THE OVERLANDERS *

There's an awful lot of rehearsal behind the disc debut of Pye's fabulous folksters, The Overlanders. In fact, they've been working and working on their sound for the best part of a year until they got just the right sort of blend. And, just to gain more on the authenticity side, lead guitarist Paul Arnold has spent a lot of time in America, crossing the States and Canada, talking to folk singers, learning new material.

If you've got a spark of enthusiasm for either folk or C & W do give the Overlanders a spin on their Summer Skies and Golden Sands and Call Of The Wild. Their aim is to do a Peter, Paul and Mary sort of performance, status-wise, here in Britain.

When they finally turned up in the Pye studios, Tony Hatch was so impressed by the first play-back that he called in some of the Pye top brass to hear just what was going on. And Tony, though still very young, is not the sort of bloke to shout around about nothing. He also suggested that the boys should write a song tied up with the idea of a "rainbow." They went away. A day later, they returned... with a song called "Rainbow." And it's more than likely that it will be their second release.

Manager Harry Hammond really "created" this group. The three boys came from different parts of Britain but were introduced purely and simply because Harry, very experienced in the ways of show business, felt they would be "right" for each other.

The boys, individually, are goodlookers. Added together, they must rank as one of the best-looking trios in the whole of the business. Let's meet 'em, individually...

Laurie Mason: He's 23, lead singer, though he also tackles snare drums from time to time. He admits to being a Carroll Levis discovery when he was in his early teens, then left school to join the Inland Revenue department in London. "Then I tried selling typewriters, but I knew singing was the main thing in life for me."

Peter Bartholomew: He's 22, plays rhythm guitar and sings. Went to a public school near Reading and is an expert on piano and clarinet as well as vocals and guitar. Once worked in a music-publishing office in London, which he says was marvellous experience.

Paul Arnold: 23 again. Real name is Paul Arnold Friswell, and he's another public schoolboy. Likes writing poetry in his spare time. And he is an expert photographer, as well as playing organ, accordian and banjo.

The trio's own tastes in music run from Dinah Washington to Johnny Cash, taking in Andy Williams, Chet Atkins, Ray Charles and Hank Locklin.

One of the most refreshing new outfits to hit the scene in a long, long time.

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New books turned out on Billy Fury scream, "Exclusive"—"the inside story on Fury"—"what Billy is really like" etc., etc. Most of the writers have never met the guy, or probably just said "Hello" to him at one time or another. Most of the features are the same old stuff dished up with a new twist. How many of the writers do KNOW Billy Fury? Not one. is my bet. Billy just doesn't want to be dissected for the public to see. Many say he is moody, others say he is the nicest guy around. Of course, sometimes he is moody, who isn't at times? Of course he gets bored with his life sometimes. You try going to the pictures every single night for seven or eight weeks.

After a time, you'll begin to realise what being on tour can be like. Just standing on-stage drives some singers to tears. Just a sea of faces every night. none of whom you know, and are hardly ever likely to meet. What of the future? What does a top artiste like Billy see? More films, more TV shows, more cramped dressing-rooms on stage shows. more radio programmes in the same old studio. Watching discs go into the charts, come out again, and waiting anxiously for the next platter to the top Five. Many of the people who were just too old to enjoy beat music when it really caught on seven or eight years ago sneer at the life of pop singers. When they hear Billy earns £100,000 a year, they smile knowingly and think it all goes on swank hotels and easy living.

How many of them would honestly try being a pop singer for a few weeks? Not more than one or two, and I bet they wouldn't stick it for long. For that is one of the most endearing qualities of Billy Fury. Stickability. Never has he refused to appear at a show if he is ill. It is only on his manager's and doctor's orders that he ever misses a personal appearance. I have seen him come off a stage covered in perspiration, and sit for a solid two hours, not moving, not talking, just holding his head. His physical frame, although strong-looking, is weakened by a sensitive stomach. Many times he has been warned not to go on-stage, and to slow down, but his answer is always the same. "Never mind, it's only something I've eaten. I'll be all right."

This attitude has persisted for many years. In October he starts on the longest-ever one-nighter tour this country has ever seen. The show finishes on December 16. Billy has Christmas off, then the whole of January is taken up with a four week tour of other countries, where they are screaming to see Billy. Then back again just in time to start another film, then a spring tour, summer season, and the usual rush of TV and radio dates. Maybe the popularity reaches a higher level, but does that compensate for all the work. To an artiste it does. Whatever one might say, there's no doubt that Billy is an artiste.

One this country should be very proud of.
