Commented Bruce, "If you eat much more we'll never get any dancing done!"
Brian interrupted to say, "So what? Have you ever seen Liquorice dance, anyway?" Hank, noisily eating a stick of Blackpool rock, commented, "Oh! I thought Liquorice was quite a good dancer. When I take my glasses off he looks quite good, anyway. Help!"

Liquorice, grinning madly, advanced on Hank with HIS stick of rock. In two minutes the peaceful scene was full of the boys' shouts and yells as they held a mock swordfight with sticks of rock.



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

THE SEARCHERS, smash hitmakers with Sweets For My Sweet, have TV, radio and disc dates lined up for them all over the country!

Their next disc will be released on September 17, and at the time of going to Press, it was odds-on whether or not the disc would be a composition by Mitch Murray or Johnny Worth. On September 14, the boys guest on "Lucky Stars"... and on September 16 they will be seen in "Mark Time," Mark Wynter's show.

They are appearing on Friday, August 23 on "Go Man Go." On September 5 they will appear on Rolf Harris' BBC TV show "A Swingin' Time," and on September 16 they are also to be heard on "Side By Side."

Disc titles still remain a close secret but sales figures of 500-700 per day of the group's LP "Meet The Searchers" have confirmed Pye's assurances that the group is selling almost as fast as any other group or artiste in the country.

Also on the LP recorded live at the Granada, Edmonton, is Don Spencer who sings his big waxing "Fireball" plus one other number. If you want to recapture moments when you've been to a onenighter then head for your local diskery.

STAR-STUDDED POP MOVIE

JOHN LEYTON, Mike Sarne and actor-singer Iain Gregory will be starred in a colour musical titled "Three Boys In A Boat." At the time of going to Press it was understood that the title may be changed at a later stage. The film will be shot in and around St. Tropez, one of the exclusive night life towns in France.

Manager Robert Stigwood also confirmed that Grazina will appear in the film, and that a strong possibility was Billie Davis. Shooting will start in October and will last for five or six weeks. No indication of the number of songs has been given but it is expected to be around 12 to 16. Stigwood will head production, and arrange skeds to fit in with the various artistes' engagements.

The tracks are being re-released "because of the tremendous demand" said a company spokesman. "Evidently Eddie is going to be around for some time, and we're forever getting enquiries from fans."

DISCussion

Here we go again, then—a selection of the latest releases for your consideration; and I may as well say that, on my own part, I have enjoyed MY consideration of them!

Just see if we agree on our views, eh?

Steve Lawrence, who has made one or two solo attempts to hit the jackpot in this Country, now joins forces with his wife, the talented Eydie Gorme, on a new C.B.S. disc called "I Want To Stay Here." This is a very pleasant duet (and could the idea of the song have been inspired by the style of those from Paul and Paula?) which has a rather lazy beat and a simple melody. Steve and Eydie do a great job here. It all sounds so easy and relaxed—the earmark of polished performances by polished performers. Very pleasant.

I really don't know what R.C.A. Victor is doing to Duane Eddy!! Apart from one, all-too-short and striking, solo spot the brilliant solo guitarist is once again reduced to being 'a member of the band' backing a chorus of voices which tells us "Your Baby's Gone Surfing." Now, let me make it quite plain that I think the atmosphere and rhythm of the disc is first rate; it could easily eatch on; but with a frontline chorus and a very predominant sax., I really fail to see the necessity of Duane Eddy. Let's have some discs from Duane which really give him the chance to show his prowess.

*** BOUQUET *****

The top award this week gives me a double pleasure. (And I hope it doubles YOUR'S!!) It pleases me to think that Mark

pleases me to think that Mark Wynter has Big Success within his grasp this time: and it also pleases me to find that his new Pye release, Running To You, gives him the chance to exert a little positive, decisive romance as opposed to the rather wistful, appealing approach of Go Away, Little Girl, Shy Girl, etc. This very definite approach is likely to fire the imagination of you girls much more and, perhaps, this will be the last feather to turn the scales fully to Mark's benefit. The song itself is strong and appealing: the orchestration is clean-cut with a pounding beat, and Mark's own performance is striking in its power and warmth. I don't go overboard about the composition itself. It is very simple, even ordinary-but the success of it comes through the arrangement and performance: top marks! And let's hope you give them to him!!

"Mr. Bass Man" Johnny Cymbal comes up with another novelty on his new London release. "Dum Dum Dee Dum" has much to commend it. A medium-paced romancer telling the

story that Johnny's girl hums the Wedding March—'Dum Dum Dee Dum'—when he tries to hug or kiss her. The whole thing moves along very easily, with lots of appeal.



Chris Montez invites you to "let's dance" again on London's "My Baby Loves To Dance." Much in the idiom of his original hit, this one sums up all the dance hits of recent times and the result is a rather breathless tempo, nicely balanced; despite the fact that we've heard it all before, there is much impact and a great demand on those feet that want to tap!

Capitol presents Earl Sinks and "Looking For Love" and it sounds a bit like a touch of the Buddy Hollies! Even so, I like the sound of this fast mover, which has some natty guitar work in the background and an infectious rhythm overall . . . neatly effective.

-BRICKBAT-

London's Two Silhouettes makes me feel I'm being taken for a ride by Del Shannon who, as we all know, had a big, big hit with Little Town Flirt AND with Two Kinds Of Teardrops. Now both those songs were very much the "mixture as before"; the new one is, melodiously, virtually the Different words and different title, yes—but the striking similarity remains in the music. I consider this naughty, lazy and an insult to the faith and trust of his fans. As a disc, Two Silhouettes is no better and no worse than either of the others but WHY does an artist of Del Shannon's calibre have to rely on re-hashes? Anyone can take "the mixture-as-before" TOO far. There is a limit to the extent of flogging your luck—and for my money, Del has reached that limit this time. After Swiss Maid, he shouldn't be afraid of giving us something fresh and different! A big black mark from me for lack of enterprise and lots of cheek!! Cor! And Peter's cheeky with it, as well! I know!! But let's face

THE SEARCHERS. "MEET THE SEARCHERS"

After only one successful single release this all-British group has come up with an L.P! And a very good one it is too. The hit song Sweets For My Sweet is included in a selection of other artists' hit titles—Twist And Shout—Da Doo Ron Ron and the like. The Searchers show a neat bit of versatility on tracks like Where Have All The Flowers Gone and, on the whole, the album is well worth listening to and

makes for a very creditable 33\(\frac{1}{2}\) debut.

TOMMY STEELE, "IT'S ALL HAPPENING"

COLUMBIA. 33SX 1537

This collection of tracks from the film of the same name makes for exhilarating listening; everything is bright and breezy and the whole atmosphere is infectious. Tommy himself is his bubbling, effervescent self and well-up-to-individual-standard performances come from artists like Johnny de Little, Danny Williams, Dick Kallman, Shane Fenton and Russ Conway, to mention a handful!!

THE LIMELITERS. "FOLK MATINEE"

RCA VICTOR. RD. 7538

This talented group always gives us value for money—in arrangements and performance versatility. Lots of famous folk tunes on this one but most of them with a difference. The boys make us laugh at some sad songs—they tell us stories about others. This variety of treatment gives lots of light and shade and every track is thoroughly enjoyable. A big hit, this, for those who like something a little out of the rut.

THE CHALLENGERS, "SURFBEAT" STATESIDE. SL. 10030

Will the Surf craze catch on in this country as it has done in the States? Judging by The Challengers' offering on this platter it should—but then the expert sounds and beat here are reminiscent of Liverpool. For my money, I forget "The Surf" and just let the excitement of the music carry me along. I think you'll like this whether you're dancing or only listening.

Everything, but everything, was against the disc, INCLUDING the group who actually made it, Brian Poole and The Tremeloes, "I thought it was a bit of a mess" quoted Brian. Well, that bit of a mess was Twist And Shout which rocketed into the Top Five with the speed and certainty of a Presley disc. Now, groups the country over have Twist And Shout as their big hit when playing ballroom dates, and Brian is only too happy to hear them playing it. "If it's possible to get a good beaty vocal number away" he said, "Then you're certain of some sales by the fact that nearly every group in the country will buy it."

But what about Twist And Shout? "Well, we didn't expect it to really jump into the Top Ten or the Top Five" said Brian. "It's a marvellous twist number, and one that really gets the

group having a ball, but even then we have a hard job sometimes to do the number. It takes all the energy out of one belting that song out every night, but apart from that it's pretty good. We're not moaning anyway. Our Fan Club has gone up a heck of a lot, our fans take a new sort of interest in us, and everything's swingin'!!"

Are all their future releases going to be big beat stuff? "Not really, said Brian. "You see, I like dancing discs, and obviously records that people can twist or do the Bird to, they all want to know about. But finding ones with the right kind of sound that we want is getting harder and harder. Anybody can make a fairly decent twist or beat disc. It's getting one that's out of the rut that we want. I think luck is on the way with our next disc, tho'. We've got a number that hasn't been titled

yet, but it sounds great. At least" he laughed, "We can understand it more than we can Twist And Shout."

What did Brian think of the rhythm and blues scene? "Well, there's a lot more interest in it in this country now, but it's not strictly rhythm and blues material. I mean, most of it is based on a strict commercial pop kick. I don't think the authentic rhythm and blues will ever catch on big. Some of the numbers are marvellous, but don't forget, there's not always that catchiness that one gets in pop discs." Now all the Tremeloes and Brian wait for is the immediate future when their new platter is let loose on the market, and to see what their fans' reaction is. My reaction? If it's anything like Twist And Shout, they've definitely got another hit on their hands! !



BIG BEAT — BIG THREE

With the group scene stretched to the limits, it didn't seem possible that yet another group could make the grade and still pull out a big seller. But The Big Three have. Why are they called The Big Three? Well, the northern fans are so knocked out by the "big" sound that the trio manage to get up that they are really flipping over their latest platter, the pounding catchy big seller, By The Way. The boys, John Hutchinson, Brian Griffiths and Johnny Gustafson were "overjoyed" when composer Mitch Murray wrote them a special number. Mitch of course, is the guy who wrote, I Like It and How Do You Do It? and his By The Way is written in the same appealing manner of the other two hits. Since their appearance on "Thank

Since their appearance on "Thank Your Lucky Stars" the sales of By The Way have received yet another boost, and the boys are just waiting to see

what's going to happen before they start to make plans for featuring their second disc in their BIG stage act. In fact, try and get this disc, and listen to the flip-side. You'll hear a waxing titled Cavern Stomp a number specially suited for the BIG sound that the boys get when they play the famous Cavern Club, home of The Beatles, Pacemakers, Dreamers and just about every group on the 'Pool scene.

Now appearing all over the country, the Big Three are hoping that they too can emulate the success of their "brothers" from Liverpool, and see their name at the top of the charts. "It's a bit difficult" said Brian. "You see, this number isn't easy to perform on disc. On-stage it's done slightly differently, a bit more beat, but we didn't want anyone to think that we had churned out just another beat number

in the same idiom. Anyway, I think we're gonna be D.K. with our next release, but this one still keeps selling in spurts and the disc company gets ready to release or fix a release date for our second one, when bang! we suddenly find that we we sold another couple of thousand. Still, it's nice to know that the people in the south like our kinda music as well. It gives us a bigger thrill than with the northern fans really because we knew they always liked it, but when we see London people also going mad, then we know that everything's O.K. All we know is that the London guys and girls are just as with it as any we have up north."

The answer to that one of course, is that with a BIG BEAT such as the Big Three produce, who could be anything else than not with it!!



NEW FROM-

HE INNOCENTS

Stand by for The Innocents, a group which has garnered so much praise from artists they've backed that it's a marvel their hat-sizes are precisely the same as when they were formed. It's a slightly complicated story as to how The Innocents actually became The Innocents. Let's try and bring it down to the simplest of terms...

Don Groom worked with The

Don Groom worked with The Outlaws, the original group which backed Mike Berry. The other three Innocents were with The Tuxedos, the outfit which went on tour with Bobby Angelo.

So... Mike Berry, hit-maker, parted company with The Outlaws. But Don Groom stayed on. He toured with Mike, laying down the beat, even when it meant sitting in with other groups and replacing their own drummers. It could have led to embarrassment—but Don is one of those cool, quiet characters who can make the most complex things uncomplicated.

Then, after three months of touring just with Don, Mike decided that he wanted a new backing group. He heard The Tuxedos might like a change . . . and he remembered that they'd impres-

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sed him mightily when he saw them work with Bobby Angelo. So the Berry battalion, or beatalion, was joined by 19-year-old Colin Giffin, on saxophone and rhythm guitar; Roger Brown (19), on lead guitar, general spokesman of the outift; and David Brown (no relation), a 20-year-old, who plays bass guitar.

The seeds were sown for a very successful beat-business career. A career which now has the boys out on their first solo disc, Stepping Stones, on the Columbia label. A disc which has them handling vocal work as well as the instrumental side. A disc which has the EMI folk roaring about all over the place, suggesting that here is someone to compare with The Shadows, The Dakotas and The Tornados.

But the thing is that The Innocents have been so hotly hailed by people other than Mike Berry. The Four Seasons, for instance. Now the Seasons are all musicians and expect musicianly performances around them. The Innocents backed them on tour and had the American foursome raving about their abilities. The Innocents have also backed Mike Sarne, John Leyton, Don Spencer too—and all these artists have poured out their praises.

The Innocents made their radio debut with the Four Seasons on "Saturday Club," and earned a few more merit marks. Billie Davis is another chart entrant who likes them very much. "They get such a big, fat sound, with so many variations," say these artistes. One of the main reasons for that big, fat sound is the work of Colin Giffin and his variations between saxophone and rhythm guitar.

If you want to hear the way these Innocents cope with the dodgy job of doing backings, then listen to Columbia's new album "One Night Stand." On that, you can hear them behind Messrs. Leyton and Sarne, two of the most individual popsters in the business.

Says Mike Berry: "For various reasons, I've worked with a lot of different groups during my career. But I can't think of any who manage to produce such togetherness as these boys. I was knocked out when I heard they were going to produce Stepping Stones as their first solo recording. I can only hope it sells as well as it deserves to. They've all been of enormous value to me and I'm looking forward to seeing them up there in the charts."

Stepping Stones is a good title for a single. Let's all hope that it proves a stepping-stone for four talented, beathappy young men who make such a good job of working together.
