

Hi there!



Outside one theatre where they played recently, over 5,000 people were estimated to have gathered, shouting "We want the Beatles"!

Although lacking the tremendous number of beat clubs that flourish in the North, Birmingham's 500 odd groups find ready audiences in the city's pubs and dance-halls every night and many of these colourful combos are well worth a place in the hit parade.

SUSAN SINGER who claims a number of top-line artistes in her fan-club, headed by Helen Shapiro as President, is featuring a Scottish item as part of her act in her current show. For this Susan wears complete Scottish national dress and according to all reports has had a very successful summer season.

## **DISCussion**

A very warm welcome to the fifty-second DISCussion in the fifty-second edition of this swingin' mag, of ours! I really have appreciated your kind attention over the past year and look forward to the next 52 issues with eagerness! And I hope you can say the same! So, here's to US, eh?

It's fitting that this celebration week should coincide with the release of a new disc from the established leader of the British pop world.

Cliff Richard, whose double-sided "A" titles give excellent value for money. On one side we have a revival of the old pop hit "It's All In The Game" which gives Cliff the opportunity to exploit his lower registers to great effect. The result is a gentle, lilting romancer with a nicely balanced string accompaniment from the Norrie Paramor Orchestra. Within his own vocal range, Cliff makes this a side with great appeal. The flipside, written by Hank Marvin, sweeps up the tempo somewhat with the well-known sound of the Shadows, themselves. "Your Eyes Tell On You" is a not-out-of-the-ordinary bouncer which Cliff handles with the easy style we have come to expect. Yes, this double-sider makes for contrasted performances and, of the two. I much prefer this particular Cliff in the slower mood of It's All In The Game.

R.C.A. Victor bring us a new Neil Sedaka disc called "The Dreamer" and it is one of those vocals almost swallowed up by the backing chorus; on this occasion the chorus repeats "hush-a-bye"—hush-a-bye" over and over again until I thought the disc should have been titled "Hush-a-Bye"!! That comment apart, it is a happy enough disc. It is Neil's best for some time. But it IS the kind of thing we've heard many times before.

#### \*\*\* BOUQUET \*\*\*\*\*

Sam Cooke's new one, on R.C.A. Victor, is a revival of that almost legendary couple, Frankie and Johnny. It is a revival right bang slap-up-to-date, with a powerful beat. Beautifully orchestrated, most effective use is made of an occasional piano tinkle-sometimes just audible-in the midst of driving brass. From the start of a gentle, insistent beat the whole thing builds up to a driving, pounding climax that sweeps you along with it. (But for the life of me I cannot see why the end had to be faded-a big let down! But the whole thing is such a good example of studied and effective teamwork that I can't allow my own prejudice against fading-out to belittle just praise). Same Cooke really comes into his own on this one with a very much modernised "with it" re-write of the lyric. A commanding disc, this-really excellent, to-boot! And I'd like to boot it-right into the Charts!

\*\*\*\*\*

Mike Berry says "It Really Doesn't Matter," on H.M.V. But it DOES, really! This light-hearted little ditty moves along at a carefree pace with Mike delivering the goods with ease and assurance. It's the kind of disc I can play two or three times, still enjoy it, but which doesn't stick in my mind melodically—which might be its one failing.

One of the many groups recorded by Oriole, Eddie Curtis and the Hellions, gives us a crisp, clean sound on "Leavin' Town." Some effective guitar work creates much added interest to a slightly-above-average composition and I like Eddie's own style of vocal which is straightforward but authoritative.

Both instrumentalising AND vocalising The Outlaws make a good job of H.M.V's "That Set The Wild West Free." A quick tempo offering with an infectious rhythm, the boys drive it along with great ease, but it is one of those discs that grow on you the more you hear it.

#### -BRICKBAT-

The Darlene Love version of Wait 'Til My Bobby Gets Home, on London, is the type of recording that drives ME up the wall. The muzzy, slightly distorted sound is the one that always makes me think it was recorded under water! I don't regard this as a good recording by any standards, even if it is done as a deliberate gimmick. I consider it totally unfair to the artist and musiciansto say nothing of irritating to the ear! Through the jumbled haze on this disc, I think it can be detected that Darlene Love gives a lively performance of a basically attractive song. This style of recording will always get a nil rating from yours truly, here. Don't YOU like to hear your singer and/or musicians clearly? This one most certainly is not for me. How about you, then?

"True Love Never Runs Smooth" (and you can say that again, eh?—Yes!) is the title of Gene Pitney's United Artist release and it is an interesting disc if not one of universal appeal. Gene's distinctive tones add much to a fascinating, medium-paced ballad which I would call a dramatic love song rather than a melodious one. It catches my imagination, however, and I like the atmosphere of the whole thing.

And, except for the top four L.P.s in the next column, that's the completion of one year's DISCussion. I hope, very sincerely, that you'll pop around every week for the second year.

These two albums are totally representative of that sound we've come to recognize as The Liverpool soundor The Mersey Beat. When I first saw the mass of material I thought it might drag a bit when I spun the discs, through sheer force of repetition. But top marks to John Schroeder and Oriole. This massive showcase of talent is excitingly successful. I think Volume two is better than the first, mainly because there is a little more varietybut that is but a niggling point. Quite a few of the groups will be familiar names to you, but many will be completely fresh. After a bit of a struggle to make up my mind, I single out EARL PRESTON AND THE T.Ts, FARON'S FLAMINGOS and RORY STORM AND THE HURRICANES: and I shouldn't be at all surprised if one or two of the groups on these albums tag themselves on to the string of their native groups already in Chartsville. If you're an addict of the Mersey Beat, this is the biggest tribute to the sound so far.

SAMMY DAVIS, JNR. "SAMMY DAVIS SALUTES THE LONDON PALLADIUM"

REPRISE. R. 6095.

Sammy sings songs associated with many great artistes who have appeared at the London Palladium. In his own inimitable style he salutes MATT MONRO, DANNY KAYE, JUDY GARLAND, JOHHNY RAY, FRANK VAUGHAN, NAT 'KING' COLE and a host of others. A beautifully produced platter this and a must for those who like their ballads sung with power and depth.

#### LAVERN BAKER. "SEE SEE RIDER" LONDON, HA-K 8074.

A little known name to a lot of "popsters" in this Country but I think that could be remedied if this powerful L.P. could gain a very big ear from lots of folk. Lavern possesses an interesting voice and her style gives each song great impact; all this combined with a healthy, hefty beat makes this a must!



## THE CHART TOPPING COMBINATION

Whether apart or together they are hits—Hits—HITS! Who? Who but Cliff and that wonderful instrumental team, The Shadows? The only singer and group in the world to have an international record hit market-and they're British! Everyone abroad knows Cliff and the Shadows. Those who don't just ain't heard of record-players. In almost every country, there is a bigselling Cliff or Shadows disc. Go to France, Italy, Belgium, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, South Africa, Australia, the Philippines, Israel, anywhere almost for a holiday and you'll find that Cliff and the Shadows are already there. If not reposing in the Hit Parade, then certainly somewhere near it!

In this country, it doesn't seem conceivable not to see Cliff or the Shadows in the Top Ten. Any promoter who wants sell-out houses automatically thinks of the Shadows or

Cliff. Why not? But the chance of getting Cliff or the Shadows is very remote, for half of their time in the near future is likely to be spent out of the country. With over 50 discs by different artistes being released here every week, you'll realise just how big Cliff and the Shads are when you appreciate that when a Cliff disc is released it has to be released in about eighteen countries.

Not for Cliff and the Shadows, the usual look at Britain's Top Thirty. For they have to keep their eye on about ten or twenty countries. Not for them the exciting pleasure of saying "We're No. 1." For some weeks they are No. 1 in more than two or three countries, plus being in the Top Five in some ten others! At one time Britain and Cliff Richard were just Britain and Cliff Richard. Now it's Great Britainmade great by Cliff and the Shads!

By the way Cliff is hitting the charts abroad, together with the Shads. It

seems certain that next year will be the most hectic that Cliff or the group have had to date, with probably six months being spent abroad, and the rest of the time Cliff will spend on either a stage musical or another film—or, knowing the tremendous working powers of the five, they'll probably be doing both a stage musical and a film, plus a tou here, and the rest of the time devoted to their own pleasures—like song-writing, recording, and TV and radio.

One thing's certain. Both Cliff and the Shadows have had to pack more and bigger dates in the shortest time possible and yet no-one has heard one squeak from them about overworking! In a few weeks it doesn't need a magician to tell you that both Cliff and the Shads will be in the Top Ten—but that's where they will be!

What's more they come from the Brian Epstein-headed stable of stars in Liverpool and this week come out with their debut disc, Hello Little Girl, on the Parlophone label. This number was written by John Lennon and Paul McCartney-and it was sung and played by the Beatles in Liverpool's Cavern long before the Beatles ever got

themselves on records.

Those who've seen the Fourmost in action rave about them. They've got an uninhibited approach to their music which is refreshingly different. They're all mad keen on music and never stop studying. And they've had experience with other groups before really getting together under the present set-up. The swingin' quartet all contribute an equal share to the group's successes. So the 24/8/63 best thing is to get off straight away and meet the boys individually . .

Billy Hatton: bass-guitarist. started out with a C and W group called the "Drifters," then formed the Fourmost with Brian O'Hara in 1958. Hank Williams and Jerry Lee Lewis are his personal favourites. He's 5 ft. 11 in. tall, with brown hair and brown eyes. Originally fancied joining the Royal Artillery-but his auntie had bought him a Spanish-style guitar when he was eleven as a Christmas present and he thoroughly enjoyed his music studies. Brian O'Hara: lead guitar. Also

plays harmonica, violin. Has black hair, hazel eyes, is 5 ft. 9 in. tall. Started out by joining the Sailors' Chapel band on triangle, then on cymbals. Says he's interested in body-building—"though it doesn't yet show!"

Mike Millwood: rhythm guitar. At 6 ft. 4 in., towers above the rest of the group. Provides the falsetto voice at the start of the disc Hello Little Girl. Became interested in music during the skiffle era and was given his first guitar at the age of 14. Maybe because of his height was planning a career in the police force.

Dave Lovelady: drummer. Also plays trumpet and piano. Red-haired, blue-eyed. Used to work with Ian and the Zodiacs and with Kingsize Taylor and the Dominoes. Had two brothers both of whom played drums and bought his own first set at the age of 12 by saving his pocket money. Originally studied to become an architect. He played two months in Hamburg's Star Club with the Dominoes.

These, then, add up to the Fourmost. A lively, ambitious, enthusiastic, talented group. They feature a wide variety of numbers in their sensational stage act . . . . ach as, September In The Rain; He's So Fine; Girls, Girls, Girls; Baby Sittin' Boogie; Happy Talk.

The Fourmost are FOREmost. But do please + and get their name spelled and red correctly. It's all one word .
