

There is no doubt in my mind that during the past few years some of the best discs from our girl vocalists have been far superior to many group offerings which have beaten them chartwise. There is no doubt that the charts are, or should I say were, a man's world.

Hello, then! Welcome to a very interesting selection of discs from which, I feel quite sure, you will be able to extract two or three for your own decided pleasure, without any doubts. And that's the way I like to see it!

First off, there's the new one from Mark Wynter, on Pye. "The Boy You're Kissing" is an exceptionally attractive song with a pleasant, liliting melody. The orchestration, which features some fascinating piano-work, adds greatly to the overall effect while Mark gives warmth and added strength to the lyric. Speaking purely personally, I could have done with less double-tracking on Mark's voice which would have gived his performance even greater warmth and presence. As much as I like this dust, however, I wouldn't like to bet it's quite the right type of song with which to follow up It's Almost Tomorrow; it will depend on how faithful are the fans of that one. So, go on! Be more than faithful and make this one an even bigger hit! You won't regret it. Nor will Mark, ch?

There are three other lads who need not regret anything on their new Decca disc; those talented Dublin bhoys, The Bachelors! They've come up with a beautifully polished and consistent performance of "Diane" and there's a great deal of charm about it. The strong melody plus the infectious beat will make this one acceptable to all kinds of ears. I think I like it even better than their Charmaine—and that's saying something!

I am a little disappointed over the new Nino Tempo and April Stevens disc from London. (The label, that is, not the city!) It's a revival of the time-honoured rather weather-beaten "Whispering"—but I don't think it comes off! Mainly because the overall treatment is a bit

too busy. It has quite an attractive beat and Nino Tempo's performance is wholly effective; but I find April Stevens's spoken whispers go against the grain of the general style of presentation. It may well be a little gimmick to lift the song out of the rut, but I think Nino and the rhythm do that very thing anyway. No. This is a half-and-half disc for me!

The next one is one-plus-one for me, though! Pye's "Needles And Pins" is the best disc to come from The Searchers to-date! A clean-cut recording and performance of an interesting composition. The boys clearly stamp their own mark and make this one of the outstandingly pleasant and commanding group discs. There appears to be an almost calculated restraint in their treatment of this medium-paced number -but out of that restraint comes a commanding strength. (A lesson many groups would do well to learn, instead of blasting-off, indiscriminately, in all directions at once!)

I welcome Tony Meehan's first "solo" disc, on Decca, but had it not been for the writing on the label you could have fooled me! "Song Of Mexico" is an instrumental of orchestral proportions at times; at others, it sounds as though Jet Harris is back, so prominently featured is a Jet-type guitar! For the most part, Tony is decidedly the orchestral drummer having only the briefest of "breaks" to himself at the very beginning and end of the disc. However, if you concentrate hard you can recognize the old Meehan touchbut it only frustrates you in your desire to hear more. The Lordan composition has melodic appeal and the disc is very good as instrumentals go, even though the sound and the "feel" of it all is the same as some of the Harris/Meehan hits. wish Tony the world's luck plus, because it's so tricky to present a solodrummer on disc.

Stateside's Quicksand by Martha and The Vandellas thumps its way through on a heavy drum beat which, far from being infectious, becomes desperately monotonous. There is little melody in the rather disjointed lyric, of which the cardinal word is repeatedly impressed on the ear as being "quicksand," and Martha's high-pitched delivery makes it difficult to understand the rest of it. I do not consider this disc to be a good example of this type of American group-work and I fail to see why it should be expected to catch on in our own current market.

SAMMY DAVIS Jnr. "A TREASURY OF GOLDEN HITS" REPRISE R. 6096

Here is a varied programme of good, solid songs all of which have been associated with Sammy Davis Jnr. at one time or another. All newly recorded for this album, some take on an added strength. The singer is in fine form and the music, arranged and conducted by Morty Stevens, is always exciting. Sammy's now so-famous Birth Of The Blues is a highlight and other tracks which call for added attention are And This Is My Beloved; Stand Up And Fight; That Old Black Magic and Hey There.

BO DIDDLEY. "BO DIDDLEY RIDES AGAIN". PYE INTER-NATIONAL. R. & B. SERIES. NPL. 28029

This is a striking collection of R 'n' B tracks from Bo. All of them extend to us the warmth of his personality and, in some cases, a strong sense of humour. No doubt his many fans in this Country will revel in tracks like Bo Diddley Is Losse; Down Home Train; Dearest Darling; Cops And Robbers and You Don't Love Me (You Don't Care).

CHUBBY CHECKER AND BOBBY RYDELL. "GOLDEN HITS" CAMEO PARKWAY. C. 1063

Two stars for the price of one on this L.P. with Chubby on one side and Bobby on the other. At last we can now have Bobby's early big hits in one basket—hits like Volare; Sway; Kissin' Time and Wild One. This is the really swinging Rydell and having heard these hits again it only makes me wonder more and more why Bobby has not done others like them in the recent past. Chubby's hits on this album are from times not quite so distant; The Twist; Let's Twist Again; Slow Twistin'; Pony Time; Limbo Rock and Birdland.

JO STAFFORD. "GETTING SENTI-MENTAL OVER TOMMY DORSEY" REPRISE. R. 6090

With arrangements by "Greats" like son Riddle, Billy May and Benny Carter, Jo Stafford gives her best to a wonderful selection of sentimental songs from the days when she was associated with Tommy Dorsey. Numbers like I'll Never Smile Again; Oh! Look At Me Now and Let's Get Away From It All will bring back many happy memories for those who remember those days.

Although The Fourmost's latest waxing I'm In Love didn't exactly smash the charts into tiny pieces, mainly because of their fellow rivals. The Beatles and Gerry, the platter did create enough interest to make fans throughout the length and breadth of the country try to get to see these four handsome and talented foursome, or fourmost rather!!

The four boys, Mike Millward, Billy A. Hatton, Brian O'Hara and Dave Lovelady (that's a ginchy name!) are going all-out this year to prove that although people may be getting slightly fed up with the Merseybeat that they won't be fed up with The Fourmost's

particular style of music. I thought it a great pity that I'm In Love didn't do what it was predicted to do by many platter reviewers, smash the No. I slot, but so strong were The Beatles at that period of release, with five waxings in the chart, that The Fourmost like everyone else suffered, too.

Plans for films, radio and TV are being pushed around for the coming months with the lads, and it's certain that if anything is going to break really big with these four swinging guys then it will be when they have a new disc ready to hit the market, and the TV companies and radio firms latch onto it in strength instead of the almost continuous plugging of The Beatles. Beatles or not however, The Fourmost have gathered together a great string of admirers from Littlehampton to Llandudno, and of course, Liverpool, and I wouldn't be the first feature writer

to admit that this group have certainly got a sound, the like of which is being copied by many other groups who haven't got half as much skill as The Fourmost.

Of course the boys are very lucky masmuch that their manager is Brian Epstein who, as we all should know by now, handles The Beatles, Gerry and The Pacemakers, Billy J. Kramer and The Dakotas and Cilla Black. That's enough for anyone to handle!! But Brian has a knack of picking singers and groups whom he thinks have that little extra something which will keep them in the public's eye—and I believe that he's done it once again with The Fourmost. Just take a listen to I'm In Love and try and catch the lads on tour. Then you'll know why in Liverpool they're known as not only The Fourmost but the Most!!

EVERYBOD LOVES TOM

I don't know about you, but one of my fave platters played all over Christmas at swinging parties was a little number known as Everybody. You know the number of course, it was that great swinging number that Tommy Roe (the guy who looks like a fab film star) released way back in September and which suddenly zoomed into the charts with some of the biggest sales ever culled by an American performer!! The great gimmick about the disc was of course that one could join the rousing chorus, "Everybody"!! I know I did, and I know that it is still proving to be a very good seller, even tho' another disc has been scheduled for release very soon.

It made Tommy very happy too. Not only because the disc was such a biggie both sides of the Atlantic but because it made Holly fans over here forget those rumours that Tommy was trying to copy Buddy Holly on disc. Buddy never made a disc like Everybody (more's the pity) but it has at last dispelled those rumours that Roe was going to continue to copy Buddy's style for as long as he himself had hits with that kind of material. Exciting rumours have also been heard that Roe is likely to make a big return here in the next few months, and if his tour proves half as successful as the last trio he made, it's likely that he will become, like Bobby Vee and Del Shannon, one of our many twice-a-year hit-makers who manage to do at least two tours for the sake of their thousands of English fans.

I must admit that I was slightly sceptical of Tommy's talents when he made his appearance over here last time. Looking at him I remember thinking to myself that he was just another "handsome American idol." However after seeing a completely exciting stage performance, and watching Roe handle a bevy of reporters and looking completely at ease, I soon changed my opinion. Later I saw Roe rehearsing for a TV show, and many British stars appearing on the same show were as impressed as I was at his almost Perry

Como relaxability.
I'm convinced that one more tour here, plus also the fact whether he can get as many good numbers as Everybody will see this top Stateside performer really hitting the high spots where the British teenagers are concerned. The funny thing was that Roe, so at ease on TV and with British Pressmen was more scared of the British teenagers. It wasn't until a great British roar of approval came from about three thousand female fans at a packed theatre greeted him that he admitted, "I guess I feel a lot better after all."

For Roe, Britain looks like being as easily conquered as the United States was when Tommy first hit the big beat scene!!

Helen hits back . . . with a walloping great punch. Her new release Fever, one of her best yet in a hit-strewn career, looks like being THE one to whip her right back to the charts summit. And Miss Shapiro, still only seventeen, says of the disc: "It's never easy finding the right material. But we felt pretty confident about this because I've been doing it in my stage act and it's always been well received.

"Sure I've been disappointed that my recent singles haven't made it big. But that's how it is in the pop business. It's just not possible to have hits all the way along the line. Trends change. All you can do is keep on hammering away and

just hoping . . .

But her manager, Alan Paramor, says: "When I first started I was a plain, straightforward fan of Helen. But I'm getting too old for that sort of thing now! Now I simply admire her for her talent, As the years go by, it's fascinating to watch her develop into a truly great star. On stage, now, she is a wonderful performer. She's matured so much it's fantastic. If you think I may be a trifle biassed, well . . . you should have heard the studio musicians applauding her on her recent disc sessions.

If Helen sings well on records, you ought to hear her tackle the jazz material at informal parties. She'll just pick up a guitar, cajole recording manager Norrie Paramor (Alan's brother) to sit in on piano-and she really sings the blues.

Rhythm 'n' Blues, too.

True, her popularity appears to have slipped slightly in the recent polls. But those polls frequently reflect simply what there is in the charts at that time. But teenager Helen continues to draw offers from all over the world. There aren't many British stars who are truly international. Helen joined that select band long before her seventeenth birthday. Says Alan: "The only trouble is sorting out all the offers .

"However I do think Helen feels a little bit out of the pop field just at the moment. But she's a great worker and she'll be right back there before long. Certainly, we've had a whole lot of letters asking if Fever is available on disc . . . so that should chalk up a lot of

sales right away."
Said Helen: "I'm just keeping my fingers crossed for Fever. I had them crossed the other day when I took my driving test . . . and I passed with flying colours. First time-boy, that was a thrill. But I reckon I was more nervous there with the examiner than I was when I first walked on the stage of the London Palladium.

When you get a gal with the talent of Helen Shapiro you just can't keep her down. And it's an odds-on certainty that she'll make up in a big way for those months when she turned out fine discs . but just couldn't make headway in the group-dominated charts.

HEINZ Lives It Up'

One of the most outstanding stage, TV and film stars to emerge in the last year has been Heinz. On recent tours he has had thousands of beat-crazed fans literally throwing themselves onto the stage just in the hope that they might be able to hold or touch the blond agile performer as he stands in the midst of his backing group The Saints, like a blond devil in white exhorting his black-garbed henchmen to play louder and "dance" faster, adding to the already ear-shattering beat by jumping onto the piano and in beautifully timed sequences his Saints throw themselves almost into the audience.

This is Heinz ON-STAGE—capable of whipping the audience into a frenzy, and of showing that this New Year is likely to see him achieving yet another of his ambitions, headlining his own bill! Then of course there is the Heinz of record fame. His latest, Country Boy, has slid in and out of the charts on four different occasions, and has remained a big-seller despite frantic attacks on the charts by the boys from Beat City-Liverpool! Country Boy is actually NOT his latest release. On the market now is a new EP which has pleased recording manager Joe Meek and Heinz's record company Decca so much, that they are promoting it as a single more or less.

After hearing the EP I'm inclined to agree that it could well nip smartly into the Top Thirty of the singles charts. Two of the songs however are from two of Heinz's feature films, "Live It Up" and "Farewell Performance" both of which are doing great business on the main cinema circuits. The "Live It Up" film however has only recently hit the market and has proved to many people that Heinz is not only a great stage performer and singer but can also act, although the film is so beat-filled that he doesn't get too much opportunity to do so. Tracks on this fabulous EP which incidentally has a fab shot of Heinz in colour on the front, are Live It Up, the title song from the film (as if you didn't know) and another swinger titled When Your Love Goes Wrong which is from "Farewell Performance." The other two are Don't You Understand from "Live It Up" and Dreams Do Come True from "Farewell Performance."

All are meaty-beaty numbers well with the extra few bob that you might have spent on a single. This EP could well be another stepping-stone in the march that Heinz has made towards his many ambitions. True, for someone so new Heinz has racked up a terrific stand against fierce competition. But he's certainly happy enough with this EP and I can't say I blame him in the least!
