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

GIVE IT SOME LIFE !!!

Recently "Soapbox" shouted about the stupid "panellists?" on BBC TV's "Juke Box Jury." There is also another programme now out on TV called "Top Of The Pops." Only artistes in the Top 20 are allowed to appear on the programme. That's a good idea, except for the fact that half of the artistes in the Top 20 are not only presented so badly but are also shown alongside photographs of themselves and various other efforts to try and convince teenage watchers that this sort of programme is "all top of the pops." The whole programme to my mind, is one that looks exactly like a chaotic "Ready Steady Go."

Now "Ready Steady Go" I like. It has impact, punch, and the artistes are always at ease, even new ones. But "Top Of The Pops"? Forgive me while I look away. The teenage audience in the studio are shown cine shots of various stars, the dee-jays are never quite sure what is going on, and the whole programme looks as if it was in the middle of rehearsals. Having teenagers in the studio is a good thing, if one follows some kind of pattern. "Ready Steady Go" is practically ruled by "Mods" which again is a good thing. They wear different "gear" and at least one can see that everything is "different." Even the teenage audiences on the "Top Of The Pops" programme look as if they are all looking for directions.

Please, whoever plans the programme, grab hold of a bunch of teenagers, ask them what THEY want and let them be the guide. If the programme is designed for teenagers (which I assume it is) then they should have a say in what happens. "Juke Box Jury" is bad enough, but now and again there is some life in it. Even if it is usually people disagreeing with each other, but "Top Of The Pops" has to my mind, no life. And what good is a pop programme with no life. Why not get two different groups to listen to three records and say what they think? Something along those lines.

Get the teenagers to nominate two teenagers, a girl and a boy who have some life in them and let them do the latest dances.

In other words, let someone do something. Certainly a programme like "Top Of The Pops" will get quite a large audience watching BUT only because they want to see their favourite stars. If the programme can go one better and make them watch without their favourite stars being on, then everyone will know the programme is succeeding.



And who's your Valentine, I wonder? Perhaps one of the stars in this week's selection, eh? Anyway, whatever your choice, I hope this 14th February brings you much happiness-of-the-heart! The first Valentine Day release comes from:

Kathy Kirby with an equally powerful follow-up to her Secret Love hit. This time, Decca gives her another "oldie" to "pop"-up and it's "Let Me Go Lover." The same driving treatment as before, which will please those who became addicted to Kathy's Secret Love; in other words, the mixture-as-before with just as much impact.

As a well-informed friend of mine said, and I agreed with him, Dusty Springfield's new Philips release, "Stay Awhile," is a bit cacophonous! Here we have all Dusty's gusto but without any striking melodic content and full of a mass of orchestral backing that doesn't mean very much-to my ears, anyway! I have long been a great admirer of Dusty, but I find this one lacking in any attraction at all, musically.

I like, too, the rather slow, ponderous song from talented Skeeter Davis on R.C.A. "He Says The Same Things" has as much warmth as Skeeter's *The End Of The World* and, while I don't think it will have universal appeal, it is well worth a close listen.

There is just a little of *Blue Bayou* to be recognized in **Roy Orbison's** new London recording of "Borne On The Wind." Same style. Same feeling. Yet one can hardly accuse him of copying his previous hit. There is the same atmosphere and, perhaps, a reminiscent phrase or two—but the whole thing is effective with Roy giving of his best.

Columbia have come up with a new one from Freddie And The Dreamers, which will please many thousands! "Over You" is a lively offering with an infectious rhythm, without being quite as striking as Freddie's past hits. The composition itself lacks individuality but none can deny that Freddie puts his own stamp on the whole proceedings.

Jim Reeves is back with us, on R.C.A. with a smooth version, in his own inimitable style, of Elvis's "I Love You Because." Nicely warm and appealing in Jim's sincere and straightforward manner; on this occasion, let's forget Elvis and not make comparisons, eh? Two different approaches and both equally successful.

On Warner Brothers Freddy Cannon attempts a come-back with "Abigail Beecher," a fast moving offering which will leave you pretty breathless if you try dancing to it! Unfortunately, Freddy seems secondary to the instrumental side of the business and the composition and arrangement offer very little originality to make the disc stick in the mind.

- BRICKBAT-

By this time I would have thought recording companies and A and R men would have realised that discs beseeching us to do all the various dances to one indefinable noise are "OUT!" Not one has ever clicked on this side of the Atlantic, and yet the Stateside label have still issued I Gotta Dance To Keep From Crying by The Miracles. To the accompaniment of a very noisy, rather undisciplined orches-tration, the unmusical voices of The Miracles ask us to do the Twist and the Bird etc. to one of the most uninspired compositions I've heard in quite a few hundred spins! It lacks individuality, melody, charm, warmth or any of the other universal qualities that go towards making a disc generally popular.

Blue Beat has already come to a certain section of the record-buying public and I wouldn't be at all surprised if it caught on nationally! The Blue Beat label is the first in the field to specialise in this West Indian dance craze and, of recent releases, I applaud the overall effect of "Tom Hark" by Mickey Finn and The Blue Beat Men. This is the old Kwela number which now is adapted very well to Blue Beat rhythm—and rhythm plus melody makes it an outstandingly acceptable offering in the idiom. Certainly a "Mod" craze at the moment—and how long before Blue Beat catches on with the others?

Just for the record, no pun intended (!!), there is a new Dave Clark Five disc released by Columbia this week but it hadn't reached me by the time your favourite mag, went to the printers so watch for a DISCussion on "Bits And Pieces" next week!



And The TOP 4 L.P.s

MARK WYNTER.

GOLDEN GUINEA. GGL. 0250. Pve gave Mark a Golden Guinea for his 21st birthday a little over two weeks ago! In return Mark gives you encores of all his Pye hit "singles." They are all here—Shy Girl; Running To You; Aladdin's Lamp; It's Almost Tomorrow laced with his lesser known Don't Cry; I'm A Lucky Guy; I Can't Remember Her Name: To Love And Be Loved and others. This is a polished L.P. with Mark at his up-tempo and romantic best. Lend a special ear to his Music To Midnight for a particularly striking performance of a more sophisticated type of song.

THE KIRBY STONE FOUR. "WOW!" WARNER BROTHERS. WM, 8134.

And the title of this album amplifies the impact made by this powerful vocal group. A collection of arrangements to please all who like group vocalising; their comedy is as effective as their big sound and the whole varied selection makes for exciting listening. One track, particularly, is as striking as it's title and sets the standard for all the rest—*The New Ashmolean Marching Society And Students' Conservatory Band*"!! Wow!

PAUL AND PAULA. "HOLIDAY FOR TEENS."

PHILIPS. BL. 7587. Lyric-wise there is no sign of the courting, engaged or married Paul and Paula on this platter; the happy couple are on holiday and that is the spirit of all the tracks—all kinds of holiday music from Holiday For Teens, through various Christmas songs like Jinele Bell

Rock and White Christmas to A New Year For A New Ring. The result is pleasant enough and should make for interesting listening in the odd moment.

MICHAEL FLANDERS AND DONALD SWANN. "AT THE DROP OF ANOTHER HAT." *PARLOPHONE PMC*, 1216.

This is the album of Flanders' and Swann's second smash-hit two-man show recorded "live" at London's Haymarket Theatre. The inimitable style of comedy is here once again and many of the couple's jibes at some of our institutions are hilarious but nonetheless accurately aimed. There's many a constant chuckle here—get it and be happy! Bye for now.

Another Searchers Smash!!

To get into the charts these days requires a disc that is so completely different that many one-time hitmakers have despaired of ever reaching the best-sellers for the next year or so. After all, who would have thought that the Singing Nun would have reached the Being from Liverpool Top Ten? doesn't really count any more either. So many record-buyers have admitted that to see or hear the words "a Liverpool group" about a new disc, is enough to put them off buying the disc for good. But one Liverpool group who have not only hit the charts but smashed them into solid puffs of Cloud No. 9 have been The Searchers with their fantastic platter, Needles And Pins.

This r & b styled waxing has sold over half a million in less time than it takes to cut an LP and the boys are so knocked out with their success that they are on "needles and pins" waiting for their next release. For their next release was the disc that was supposed to be better than *Needles And Pins*. Said Tony, "Sure, things are swinging, and we're having a ball! Actually, there's only one problem about having a No. 1. You always assume that the next record has got to get there too. With luck and if we rush around all the record shops and buy a quarter of a million we should make it."

But although The Searchers joke and are naturally "knocked out" by their success, they are also worried by the fact that everyone is assuming that they are fighting to knock The Beatles out of the pop market. As the boys told me, "It's not true," but still the rumours persist and the more the boys hit the charts, and the more big hits they rack up the more people are going to watch their progress and hope for some kind of "battle" between these two top groups. Said Chris, "I can't imagine what everyone expects of us. We get to No. I and people think we're automatically trying to get The Beatles out of the pop field. In actual fact, they're some of our best friends. We did invite them to a big party we had before Christmas, but unfortunately they couldn't be with us. But they're a gear crowd." It's interesting to note that although The Searchers do smash the hit parade with their singles, their albums don't sell as strongly as some of the other groups. Personally, I don't like listening to The Searchers on albums. They seem to lack the terrific excitement, fire and beat that one finds on their singles.

But you never know with The Searchers. So big is their success now that even if they released a track from an album, they'd probably hit the No. 1 slot! !

5-4-3-2-1 MANFRED BLASTS OFF

A long time ago, a lot of people said that rhythm and blues was "the coming sound." A lot of people said they were wrong. I included myself in the latter category. Now quite a few groups have made their name on r and b music and it is undoubtedly popular. One of the groups, Manfred Mann, have certainly made the grade with their r and b styled waxing, "5-4-3-2-1"! It's the first time I remember a disc reaching so high in the charts with numbers for a tild instead of letters! To be honest, however, I wouldn't call this disc pure r and b or even ordinary r and b. It's basic beat has a r and b feel, but overall, it's success with the number.

Not only is the number different however, it also has the added support that the "B" side is pure rhythm and blues which should please the many ardent followers of this style of music. This will be the Manfred Mann's policy throughout on singles. To keep the "A" side as commercial as possible without losing too much of the basic r and b sound, and to make the "B" side pure rhythm and blues. As far as Manfred Mann (the group that is) is concerned, they will stick to this policy as long as they can continue making hits.

The members of the group, Mike Hugg, Paul Jones, Manfred Mann, Tom McGuiness and Mike Vickers, also have The Rolling Stones' temperament for wearing absolutely out of place gear. Although they do all wear the same things at the same time (or are supposed to) they wear fantastic "gear" as they call it whenever they can. "As long as the clothes we like are liked by our followers" explained Manfred, "we don't mind." Manfred Mann followers indeed are well catered for. In the next few days they are to have the pleasure of a new EP, and a new LP is on the way so we hear. The group will probably compose about half of the tracks on the album.

Their composing abilities have already been seen by the rapid rise of the platter "5-4-3-2-1" and the "B" side Without You, which is a rhythm and blues follower's dream come true. Says their manager Kenneth Pitt, "The boys have something different. Their music is off-beat, different and yet commercial enough to hit the charts." Certainly they have proved to the public that their style and sound is readily acceptable. What will happen when they try to turn their sound more r & b which looks inevitable I certainly don't know. But I'd guess that the Manfred Mann have a big future awaiting them!!



THE ALL STARS '64 TOUR

Robert Stigwood has done it again! His new, starry, pop-packed show with a list of names that reads like a pop "Who's Who''—and a show that has a great "special interest" content.

Special interest? Well, there's Jet Harris, back in the business after his breakdown. And Bille Davis—surely one of the most talented girl singers in the business. That Jet does well, and so does Billie, goes almost without saying. But the important thing is that "All Stars '64" goes the veritable bomb all the way through. You'll see a list of the dates right next door to this article ... so do make sure you don't miss out when it comes to your part of the world.

How do you start to report a show of this kind? So many highlights and so many individual performances of real merit... but let's start with the last on the bill. John Leyton. This fair-haired charmer, who so capably adds acting ability to singing prowess, puts on a bill-closer of an act which builds well all the way. His Make Love To Me, his latest single, is surely one of the best performances even he has given.

At Leicester, second date on the tour, John really wowed a packed house. But then there is also Mike Sarne . . . unpredictable, gangly, sometimes outrageous. Mike closed the first half with a swingin' session of oldies and newies and proved that he has the sort of stage presence to guarantee a long, long time at the top.

The 'Swinging Blue Jeans are "occasional" guests on the bill. They were there at Leicoster. The boys who'd taken Merseybeat music to the deep south before The Beatles or any others did a show of great foot-tapping power. Their Hippy Hippy Shake had everybody joining in. But in a show of this surprise content, it's not fair to give away everybody's songs... for some of them will really get the eyebrows raised in amazement.

boy's great personality and the ultraviolent power of the backing group add up to another highlight. Again, he deserves to make the top of the charts with On My Mind, his latest single.

with On My Mind, his fatest single. Get the message? That it's a list of stars with big appeal? But the list hasn't ended yet. Those hairy ones of the pop scene, The Rolling Stones, occupy a dominant part in the second half. And this R & B outfit, who make no concessions where their music is concerned, gets the hands a-clapping and the feet a-tapping. It's a music-riot section, this.

a-tapping. It's a music-riot section, this, More? Well, what about Jet Harris. The pale, tousle-haired guitar-star, backed here by The Innocents, once threatened to give up the business. Hear him work his rumbustious way through a collection of numbers and you'll be glad he didn't take up his threat. Still one of the big personalities of the business... and now back with a fresh new outlook on the scene.

More yet? Well, you're just greedy, that's all. But there's Billie Davis, dark-haired and vixacious, only girl on the bill, and singing as if her jaw had never been busted in that car accident. *That Boy John*, her latest, is a highspotonce again, one can imagine people leaping out of the theatre to buy copies.

It's not over yet. Early in the show you have an in-succession appearance by Billy Boyle, the bouncy Hootin' In The Kitchen lad from Ireland and the Fireball expert, Don Spencer. They got their fair share of the screams and the whoops of delight. And it's interesting to note how both have improved.

At the very start of this starry night out are The Le Roys, who figured in the first "Give-A-Disc" publication, playing on the give-away record Swingin' On A Star and Money. Should be something big happening on the disc scene for this group 'ere long.

A fast show, a clever production. Miss this one when it hits your part of the world and you'll be kicking yourself from now until the next Stigwood tour hits the road.

The Rockin

The Ronettes. Not exactly a name that is likely to keep you awake at nights. But their SOUND is something else again. Although the sound was "created" by brilliant A & R man Phil Spector, it's also The Ronettes who manage to get a fantastic rhythm that no-one else has managed to get. To see them, as most of you probably have, you will notice that from the first note struck the girls are away, swaying, chanting, their minds, bodies and voices fitting together in perfect combination to make an overall sound that really has one's feet tapping and one's head shaking.

Certainly it looks as if it's going to be some time before anyone can manage to get such a terrific sound and before anybody has any possible idea of what will be happening to the now outdated slow ballads, The Ronettes will probabably have taken them and re-shaped them into some more hits as they have done so effectively with their new records.

Their latest release, Baby I Love You, has had the country's record-buyers flipping and although not such a chart shattering smash as Be My Baby, it certainly proved that trying the same sound again on a follow-up certainly hasn't made the record a smaller seller.

The Ronettes themselves don't brag here about their successes "back home in the United States. Like most of the artistes under Phil Spector they have complete faith in his new styled discs and their own ability to make them into even bigger and better sounding commercial hits. Watching them on TV is exciting but nothing like as exciting as seeing them on a one-nighter. Then, with their tight slit skirts and their swaying figures literally making the audience sway they leap into their fantastic songs ranging from their latest Baby I Love You and Be My Baby, to the sensational and swinging r and b number which I heard them sing but couldn't get the title because of the amount of screaming and clapping from the audience, who were obviously enjoying themselves in a way that they wouldn't normally have done on most package shows. The Ronettes' rhythm is so intense that it sounds rather like West Indian beat, which if you didn't know, is about the most rhythmic, beaty music ever produced since the earlier days of the 12 bar blues.

For The Ronettes, I predict that the future, especially discwise will be filled with many hits, and a very big success for the three girls throughout the world. At least, I think it will. I certainly hope so, for the girls are an absolute knockout-and have proved that their sound off-disc can be just as good !!!
