First realisation of the impact of The Beatles in America came as we disembarked at Los Angeles Airport, home of Hollywood stars-and almost permanent home of Elvis! The Customs officer-aged about fifty, looked fiendishly up from our ransacked bags, gave us an ugly grin and said, "How're The Beatles doin' then?" We gagged-"We've come over for Elvis to do a swap!" And quickly he cracked back: "You can have him-we'll take The Beatles!'

Apparently, however, not everyone shared his views, for we checked in for coffee at one of the hamburger hamlets and discovered that the waitress came from Liverpool! However, the word "Beatles" only brought an icy silenceand it was obvious that here was one half-American whose place of birth didn't help matters where The Beatles were concerned. But her reaction when we told her that Elvis was on our American list for a possible interview, would have pleased any Elvis fan! (We told her "possible," because we had just had a newsflash that El had contracted a virus, and had been ordered to bed for a few days.)

All her customers were forgotten, and she spent ten minutes asking just about every question possible on Elvis! Result: everybody in the joint finished up with lukewarm ice-water, and icecold coffee!

Beatlemania - to be frank - was almost non-existent in Los Angeles. Supermarkets, stores, juke-boxes nothing! Except for three Beatles books, and really, only one of these was "All-Beatle"! Not one juke-box had a Beatle record, but later we did find Beatle pens, with the heads of the four boys on, and some Beatle bubble-gum.

However-amazingly-although the Beatlemania appeared to be almost non-existent, significant small things kept cropping up. One radio station in the Los Angeles area plays nothing but Beatle discs for instance all day and every day, and adults we met were unconsciously humming Beatle tunes (although hardly any of them knew the titles or the words—psychologically, this proved "brainwashing" must be prevalent in L.A.). Our favourite experience was the 6 ft. 3 in. burly American who sat behind us drinking his coffee, singing "Turn Over Beethoven ... turn over Beethoven ... "!!

Out of twenty-four houses we visited. only one had the appearance of Beatlemania! But, boy, this one had it The three teenage sisters real bad. confessed they had ripped out every photo of Elvis they had had on their walls, and had ruthlessly replaced them with Beatle pics! They literally smothered the walls, and hanging on the door of their bedroom was hung a dreaded notice, which said: "NON-BEATLE FANS ENTER AT THEIR PERIL."

Another confusing fact leaped to light. Certainly there were no Beatle discs on the juke-boxes, but neither were there any Elvis platters! Yet, amazingly, Cliff's "It's All In The Game" appeared on nearly all of them.

One thing we did dislike-heartily! Two British pop singers were appearing on one of the TV channels—so naturally we looked in. And they had the nerve to say that The Beatles weren't doing as well in Great Britain as in the States.

This, we thought, was in extremely bad taste, especially as the two artistes in question hadn't had a hit in Great

Out here, The Rolling Stones and The Dave Clark Five were seldom mentioned by anyone. The majority of teenagers who did mention them, disliked The Stones' looks intensely and remarked that they thought them very ugly. We happened to state that in real life they are quite handsomebut that's the Stateside view, and they wouldn't wear it.

One peculiar thing, which we could not understand:

Beatle wigs!

Young and old alike talked about them; insisted they had sold a bomb; and that "everybody" in the teenage bracket had one, and indeed wore them! The shopkeepers bore this out. YET we never saw one in a shop; we never saw a teenager wearing one; and malewise there was definitely no trace of Beatles hairstyles whatsoever, though some of the dark-haired girls definitely had a trace of Beatles in their hair.

One thing's for certain. Beatles wallpaper will definitely never catch on in the U.S.A. Why? 'Cos you never in the U.S.A. Why? see any wallpaper in the States. All the walls out here are plain decor.

Out here in Hollywood, there is absolutely no trace of the Elvis v. Beatles feud, which exists in Great Britain. But already there are signs of a Beatles v. Dave Clark Five feud (in fact there is already a book out with this title!), and we ourselves forecast a Beatles v. Rolling Stones feud in the very near future. Knowing the States as we do though, this is a very healthy sign, for the States revel in this sort of (Remember Elvis v. Haley, thing. Elvis v. Tommy Sands, Elvis v. Bobby Vee. Elvis v. Fabian, oh hundreds of 'em?) Which fact points yet again to the high opinion the States already have of The Beatles.

It is just over two years now, since last we were in Hollywood, and even in this short space of time, we have found a remarkable change. The Hollywood Scene (other than the film studios where Elvis has always been highly thought of) had never been what one would call an "Elvis stronghold." The free, easygoing Californians, two years ago, treated Elvis as a joke, or alternatively as non-existent. But now we find he commands the highest respect of most adults, and quiet tolerance from the teenager. But then, two years ago also, the Californians had no time to speak or talk about "pop" at all! Now it's different . . .

The Beatles have really hit them hard, and although the adults, just as they did Elvis, treat them as a healthy joke, they know The Beatles well and, what made us feel extra proud, the Americans seemed dead chuffed that they were British: and what is more, they are eagerly looking for other similar British artistes too to make the grade, so that they can laud and applaud them like they do The Beatles! These boys really have done the British artistes a great deal of good out here.

In the next few days we are going right into The Elvis Camp, to see what they feel about all this. We are hoping to feel about all this. We are hoping to meet one or two other show biz people as well, to see what they think about Beatlemania too. The outcome of these exclusive interviews will be reported in NEXT WEEK'S "POP WEEKLY," cabled direct from Hollywood.

Will we, in view of his illness, even get to see Elvis?

Their Mojo is Really Working

One of the liveliest sellers over the past few weeks has been Everythin's All Right by The Mojos. In fact, this rhythm and blues style opus has just about made every "Mod" throughout the country start jumping around in circles. True to say too that The Mojos are one of the most popular groups in the country at present, although "Mods" assure me that they have been popular for some time. A "Mojo" incidentally is a lucky charm, or so a reader from the United States tells us.

There is a possibility that The Mojos and groups like them won't last long on the disc scene. Not because they haven't the talent. But I believe that to be called an R & B team these days is almost as bad as wearing a Beatle jacket. It just means that you're like every other group in the country. Don't forget too that the "Mods" like changing their groups every so often, and unless like The Rolling Stones, enough "Mods" buy your records so that you become established the odds are against you hitting really high on the popularity charts.

With the current onslaught of "new" R & B teams I wonder whether The Mojos are going to be able to establish themselves a place in the charts with every disc, or was Everything's All Right just lucky? One never knows. However it's highly likely that if they can get enough TV and radio and plenty of press exposure they will be able to stay at the receiving end of quite a few big hits. I know they're all talented and nice guys who have waited for a long time for a big break, and now they have a chart hit, want to make sure that they please their fans as much as possible.

Said one of The Mojos when I met

them at a TV show, "It's fantastic the change when you get a hit! It's knocked me out. Suddenly you do more TV shows in a week than we've ever done in a year. More radio dates, and plenty of fun. Mind you, it's not been so easy as we thought it was." The Mojos indeed have had little time to spare since their chart entry and life is getting rather hectic for them.

Certainly fans of The Mojos don't have to wait for the boys to sign autographs. Not too long anyway. "That's the way it goes" someone told The Mojos when they commented on the long hours they were working. Evidently the boys did like working on their rest days. "We have seven rest days a week" they told me, "But we have a manager who usually makes us work on them' they finished with a laugh.

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DISCussion

Hello then-and with a beaty "heigho," here we go again to plunge into the lucky dip of this week's releases. Ready ? Right.

"Shake It Easy Baby" gives us the sound of The Bobby Patrick Big Six, on Decca, and I find the overall impact a little bit tame. Throughout the disc I was just waiting for that extra power and drive which never comes. Groupwork is good, nevertheless, but the boys don't get a chance to really show themselves with this unexciting composition. It's all over before the ear has had much chance to register anything. Pity.

Better late than never! Last week's release of the new Columbia disc from The Shadows exhibits our top instrumental group in all their usual polished glory! The rather intriguing title of "The Rise And Fall Of Flingel Bunt" headlines a just-about-average composition with which Hank and the boys do their accepted masterly job. The fortunes of this one will depend upon the temperature of fan-faith at the time because the overall sound and atmosphere is just the same as all other platters from The Shadows. As slick as they are, I'm positive they can't rest on their laurels *all* the time and, for their own future good, I do wish they could inject a little extra "something" into their discs.

Another disc got to me just that little bit too late for DISCussion last week and its overall impression is so good that I really must award it my

*** BOUQUET ****** Cilla Black has done it again! Parlophone's pressings of her You're My World will be flooding over the counters throughout the over the counters throughout the country over the coming weeks— and deservedly so! The song is Italian by origin and loses little in translation and treatment. I find the solo stringed introduction fascinating and wholly effective; this leads into Cilla's restrained performance which builds up and up to a most exciting climax; a beautiful piece of orchestration by Johnny Pearson sets the whole thing on fire. I have, however, one reservation although this doesn't detract from the complete picture of success. Cilla is rather inclined towards a tightness of voice, almost to the point of coldness, when the song starts to build up to its climax and so we lose that warmth and essential softness of tone. A small point and one which does not mar the fact that here is an excellent platter. ******* Decca's revival of "Apple Blossom Time" introduces us to a new group with the Dickensian name of The Pickwicks; like that Dickensian character, Mr. Micawber, they are hoping something will turn up! I'm very sorry to say that I don't think a big hit will turn up with this one. I like the sound of the group but find their treatment of the oldie a little dull; the dragging beat goes against the spirit of the sentiment and melody of the song—but it is just as good to dance to as any other disc.

Oh dear! It's one of those weeks, I'm sorry to think! Here's another one in which I am disappointed. On Fontana/Ritz The Caravelles give their now well-known echoed, breathy whispering treatment of "You Are Here" and because the song itself is so uninspired and dull there is nothing to lift it into the realms of general interest. Nothing sticks in the mind and that's rather a pity because the girls work well together.

All the way from the barren wastes of Stonehenge come The Druids, complete with flowing robes and solid beat!! They arrive on Parlophone with "It's Just A Little Bit Too Late" and the result is slick without being outstandingly exciting. In this group-age, much more is required for hit potential than the basic element of good workmanship. The group is let down by the composition which is very ordinary, albeit pleasant. They sound somewhat disinterested and lacking in sparkle.

R.C.A. gives us The Mods who lend charm to "Something On My Mind." This is one of those gentle, restrained group-sounds along the lines of The Searchers (but make no mistake, I am not attempting comparison!). Easy on the ear, a pleasant melody and a dancie cert. And that's it, in a nutshell!

- BRICKBAT-

Not to be confused with our own erstwhile hit due there are, on Stateside, some artistes called The Allisons and their Surfer Street is particularly unattractive to my ear, at least. So, okay, you can dance the surfer beat to it but on closer inspection the thin sound and the rather monotonous vocal delivery both lack appeal and certainly do not make for striking listening. It occurs to me that the disc is just an excuse to exploit the basic beat of the dance; it hasn't caught on in this country and, with discs like this one, I don't rate its chances in the future.



And The TOP 3 L.P.s

DECCA LK. 4605

The long-awaited album from The Stones is here—and their fans will not be at all disappointed. The atmosphere the boys usually generate pervades the entire disc and a couple of particularly outstanding tracks are *I Just Wanna Make Love To You*, their version of *Walking The Dog*. Another track carries their now-famous "B" side, *Little By Little* on which Gene Pitney and Phil Spector augment the group on piano and marcaes.

THE DAVE CLARK FIVE. "A SESSION WITH THE DAVE CLARK FIVE"

COLUMBIA 33 SX. 1598

Another first LP from a hit group of the day and, in its way, equally satisfying for the ardent fan. The boys ring the changes and of the more subdued numbers On Broadway is, I think, the most successful. None of Dave's hit discs are included in the selection (which makes a nice change, eh?); all the tracks are "first time on disc" as far as the group is concerned; things like I Need You I Love You; Can I Trust You; Theme Without A Name and Time.

DUSTY SPRINGFIELD. "A GIRL CALLED DUSTY" PHILIPS

A striking set of songs here, including My Colouring Book; Anyone Who Had A Heart; Mocking Bird; Mama Said and Twenty-four Hours From Tulsa. Each one is given Dusty's own brand of attack and, in the main, they benefit from a freshness of approach. Like a lot of folk, Dusty has been obviously influenced by Phil Spector as can be heard on the few tracks on which she uses the girl-group backing. Another interesting "first" album (remembering that this is Dusty's first solo!).


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The eagerly-awaited premiere of THE BEATLES' first film "A Hard Day's Night" is set for July. The boys have had some real fun making

He began pounding out raving rhythm and blues in the days when the pop record buyers only wanted to know The Shadows, but he stuck to his guns regardless and is now in the top bracket of true R & B artistes.

For present-day blues fans his twovear-old recording of Sugar Baby is a guaranteed knock-out.



For quite a long time part of the fixtures and fittings of the Star Club Hamburg, KING SIZE TAYLOR AND THE DOMINOES have at

last got the break they deserve. They returned to this country recently to appear on the Chuck Berry tour and are certain to make English fans wonder just what they have been missing.

Only last month, over a rum and coke in the Vagabond, a bar close to the Star Club, King Size was telling me that although he had bags of good work in Germany he was hoping to get back home for a while soon. Now he has done it on the same show as his idol Chuck Berry.

guitarist Graham Gallery are prolific song-writers, and such is the quality of the numbers they produce that Billy Fury said of their latest single I Don't Understand Cry Little Girl Cry "If they don't record these numbers I will.'

Sales of this disc have been quite strong following their appearance on "Thank Your Lucky Stars" and their manager, Mrs. Regans, informs us that their next disc-also an original- will be recorded within the next ten days.



Will This Be Another Winner For Eden Kane?

Handsome, a good singer, a fair actor and one of the singers who is rather glad at the moment to have recorded a certain song which he was in two minds whether to sing or not. The singer? Eden Kane. The song? Boys Cry which has reestablished Eden in the charts which he hasn't seen for some two years. Everyone has of course reported what Eden hasd't seen getting back into the charts, "Great! etc." but no one seems to have thought of the problem of what was going to be the next recording. Or rather what style Mr. Kane was going to stick to.

In fact, even Eden must have spent a lot of time worrying about his follow-up. Good songs are about the only things that make hits. Eden has kicked around for two years to get Boys Cry but as yet he hasn't had to worry about work. Not, however, after having tasted the sweet life for the past few months via Boys Cry I doubt whether he is very happy thinking about going back to that life of hardly any TV or radio work and hardly any publicity. Surely he will now be wondering whether his new release Rain, Rain, Go Away will repeat or surpass the success of his last disc and establish him more firmly in the charts again.

Having given it a few spins, I am sure that Eden has another winner here. On first hearing I was not too certain, but like his last, this disc appeals more after two or three hearings.

Eden has succeeded in showing that he is determined to stay on the record scene until he gets what he wants. Unfortunately, *Boys Cry* although a very, very good record wasn't as distinctive for Eden's voice as his previous hits. In fact, it could sound like any of nine or ten singers, or even an American group I find *Rain, Rain, Go Away* has much more distinctively the Eden Kane stamp.

Last but not least, I say, don't underestimate Eden. Now that he has proved that he can hit the charts again, just think what he can do in the next year if he really puts his mind to it!!

One group rapidly showing that they don't expect to be content with hitting just the British charts are The Merseybeats. Already they have shown that their records, somewhat more slow and melodic than most, are popular enough to shake the British Top Ten. Now they are aiming for the Continental charts, also of course the American Hot 100. Although they come from Liverpool (where else with that name?) they don't seem to have the typical kind of brash humour that most of the groups from Liverpool have. Indeed, they are fairly quiet boys, and whenever someone does anything for them, they are very appreciative.

Their record company press officer, Gloria Bristow, told me, "The Merseybeats are a marvellous group. Not only their playing but they are good about doing an extra photo session or something like that. Even when they're very tired they always help out. They work terribly hard. They do have one failing which I always kid them about. As their press officer I don't arrange bookings for them, but now and again I manage to add an odd TV date. But it's surprising. What happens? The Merseybeats meet some of their friends (you know groups) from years ago, and ask them to ring me if they want any TV bookings. Even if they are under another record company!"

Apart from that, Gloria told me later they are the greatest. In actual fact, although they don't seem to have created as much controversy as The Rolling Stones or The Animals, The Merseybeats seem to have aroused a tremendous amount of interest. Especially in the South rather than in Liverpool. "We like working every-where in the country" they told me. "It gives us a chance to see whether their taste in music changes a lot.' The Merseybeats in fact, haven't played at one booking where they haven't been asked back, which is very nice indeed. I doubt whether there are many groups who can boast that. Of course they do have fairly long hair and "Mod" gear. I can't see the "Mod" gear dying out but I can see the hair getting shorter especially where The Merseybeats are concerned.

Their talent is strong enough to keep in the charts in my opinion without having hair down the backs of their necks. A few more months may see a few sweeping changes in the new groups. If The Merseybeats' idea of quiet numbers pulls off, the new groups will probably be welcomed with open arms by those who dislike most of the real rave groups!
