TEN YEARS KING

The greatest!! The King!! The world's Top Male Singer! Those are only a few of the phrases that get bandied around when Elvis Presley is mentioned. Let's face it, to use that corny old line, Elvis is still the King. The greatest obviously. The boy who really has grown into a man over whom girls swoon in millions, and whom boys love to imitate. It's Elvis all the way. With films coming out at sixteen to the dozen, records still notching up Top Twenty and Top Ten smashes everywhere, Elvis must be the King of them all.

Over the last ten years Elvis has proved that he is undisputably the King, the man who, whatever anyone says about his acting or his singing, has survived more pop singers and more bad publicity than any star in the business. He also holds the fantastic total of fifty-five records in Britain's Top Twenty. This is the highest total for any group, soloist, star band, duo or what have you. It proves that whatever people say, El is the King.

Record sales stand at something like 120 million. Films make more money than anyone else's. Now Elvis is rated as one of the highest paid actors. He commands a very high fee for a film and he also takes fifty per cent of the gross profit. He has a string of films lined up

Elvis demonstrates his versatility in a more recent production "Fun In Acapulco" for the New Year and for the year after that. His record contract runs until 1972 and I hear that they are already considering renewing that as well.

The earlier Elvis has disappeared. Songs like the fantastic Hound Dog, Blue Moon, Love Me Tender, Loving You have faded from the charts many years ago. But to Elvis fans that past era still retains many memories and the true Elvis fans are always playing the oldies. At this very moment Elvis is in the charts with Blue Christmas an old track from a million-selling Christmas and is still bought in hundreds of thousands every year.

Elvis films continue to make masses of money all over the world. Even now, at cinemas all over the country, not only the latest Elvis film "Roustabout" is showing, but films like "Loving You," "Love Me Tender" and "King Creole" are still going the rounds and making money. A brilliant idea not long ago by Albert Hand, President of the International Elvis Presley Fan Club was to get a cinema to put on Elvis films for a whole week, with a different film every night. The idea worked too, for the place ended up being packed with Elvis fans. The manager made a lot more money than he would have normally.

For Elvis this must be the supreme triumph. Whilst critics still tear his

Our only female "rocker" is Brenda Lee. In the earlier days she was our beat artiste, the only one who really made the grade. Most girl singers then were crooning stuff about sailors across the sea, whilst Brenda, like the tomboy she was (and still is even now) was swinging out with Let's Jump The Broomstick and big pounding beaters of that class. Again one of the few who has lasted in the charts but she too has turned to ballads to prove that that is where her true strength lies.

Now for three of the most frantic rockers on stage ever. First is Jerry Lee Lewis. Tall, wild-eyed, and just about one of the most successful disc sellers of five years ago, Jerry Lee Lewis now has to resort to just tours of this country to boost his records. The big TV shows are out for him at the moment. although occasionally he makes an appearance on a beat spectacular. A man who puts more into his stage act than anyone I know. A fabulous piano player, and a great rocker. Even tho' he has many thousands of fans in this country it's rare indeed to see him on a very big tour. Perhaps the day will come when he will make the charts really hard again. It would be nice.

Next of the Frantic Three is Gene Vincent. Like Jerry once a big name op pop packages, now rarely seen with the modern stars on a bill package show. But he still has a fantastic following of die-hard fans who haven't forgotten that Gene topped the charts with Blue Jean Bop and other such records. A fabulous figure who puts everything into his stage act and who is capable of showing that having a bad leg makes no

difference,

Last but not least of the rocker three is that great guy, Little Richard. Over ten top smash hit discs that made the charts all over the world and he also wrote many of them. Hits like Babyface, and all the really wild knockout rocker songs were either sung or written by Little Richard. A truly great ariste, he appeared in many TV and radio shows over here and in quite a few films. Today, after saying he would pack up the business about four times and then coming back into it, Little Richard is still a well-known figure on his infrequent tours here.

But out of the eight people mentioned, only three have succeeded in staying in the charts regularly. Billy Fury, Cliff Richard and Brenda Lee. Brenda too is, I believe, going to find it much harder to hang on to the chart hits with so many girls gunning for her. Of Cliff and Billy let's hope that yesterday's rockers become and always stay tomorrow's greats!!

Of the other five, I doubt whether they will make the charts again unless they are extremely lucky.

Last week I had a go at the lifeless entertainment, or so called entertainment iven to us by the pop TV shows. This week I challenge the radio companies to the same thing. Where has all the life gone? Admittedly, it's more difficult to put an entertaining show over on radio than on TV, so perhaps I shouldn't judge too harshly. But the main factor is that radio is becoming more like TV in one respectthat news and views and anything with a spice of life in it is dying out. Disc-jockeys are the same old combination of old men trying to be teenage disc-jockeys, and ex-BBC accents trying to sound with-it!!

As far as any kind of radio, with at the moment the exception of Radio Caroline and Invicta, the teenage shows are in a sorry state. We have the same old formula, tried, trusty and therefore always to be used of recorded interviews with various top stars being asked inane questions like "Is this your latest record?" programme if it wasn't).

The situation really is ridiculous. Here we are, the country that has shown every radio and TV station all over the world that we have the best artistes. Radio dee-jays, unlike the United States lockeys do not have any enthusiasm, except for Jimmy Savile, who on occasion makes me wish that he was the controller behind Radio Luxembourg. The situation is indeed stupid and the fact that most of the dee-jays have been going so long now that one wonders how old they really are, is enough to put any selfrespecting teenager into a coma. What we need are young disc-jockeys, new dee-jays, or get the present ones to liven themselves up. I'm not the only one who must be fed up with I'm not the only one who must be disc-jockeys who make their living out of pop records coming out with phrases like, "Of course, none of today's pop singers are half as good as Ella Fitzgerald, Peggy Lee, etc."

He may be mad, but he's shown that he can become the No. 1 dee-jay in the country and that can't be bad. Turf out those tired and worn disclockeys and let's have some new life for the New Year.

You told readers to listen to the first line of the great waxing, but what about the rest of the record, you can't judge a record by the first line, especially a fab group like The Four Pennies.

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films to pieces, Elvis continues to draw fantastic crowds and break box-office records everywhere. Never mind what films may beat Elvis in the long run, the fact that one man can turn out three or four films a year and still keep the fans pouring in for more, and still have the public wanting more, is the great triumph of the decade.

Remember songs too, like Are You Lonesome Tonight. The fabulous It's Now Or Never that set a new record for advance sales and went straight to No. 1? The great Surrender? What about that disc that had everyone jiving in the isles, Jailhouse Rock? The film that set the fans dancing and many girls crying when Elvis was sent to prison.

Yes, let's admit it. Elvis is the King. Of course there will come a time as everyone knows when his records won't bound into the Top Twenty. When possibly his acting will improve but his teenage appeal will die. But who wants to think of that? Just the mere fact that one is an Elvis fan sets one going. The simple idea that in ten years' time you will be able to turn round and say, "Elvis, of course I know Elvis. I have all his records since he first came out."

The people who first bought Elvis records are now married, or many of them are. The earlier records are obtainable but not under their usual LP covers. One of the authentic Elvis LP's now could cost as much as five pounds or more. That is the value of Elvis. An artiste who can make the charts without worrying about promotion on TV or radio. An artiste who hasn't made a public appearance for years and can still turn down offers of millions of dollars. This is Elvis. The God of all record companies and a singer that I predict will still be on the scene in another ten years' time. Maybe not as

an idol for screaming girls but as a film star who is rated as one of the best.

The only question, to my mind, is not whether Elvis will still be a star in ten or fifteen years' time, but what kind of star? Will he still be making his present type of films? Or will he be cast in the lead of really full-scale musicals of the multi-million dollar type of productions? Or again, will he turn to serious acting roles, of which I am sure he is capable?

Another intriguing possibility is Elvis on the stage again. Think of the impact of a Broadway musical with El at the head of the cast. How many years would such a show run? How many millions of people would want to see it? I'm afraid, however, that this is a very remote possibility, as the very fact that so many people would want to go to such a show and the length of the run would make it impossible for Elvis to find the time in view of his many other commitments.

I should be very interested to hear the views of the Elvis fans on what lines they would like to see the King's career develop.

Where Have All The Rockers Gone?

Where Have All The Rockers Gone? That is the question, guys and gals. The Rockers? Marty Wilde, Tommy Steele, Cliff Richard, Billy Fury, Brenda Lee, Jerry Lee Lewis, Gene Vincent and Little Richard. All of them at one time or another Rockers (in the stage sense) and rated as the best in the country and even in the world in some cases.





Let's take a look at them one by one Marty Wilde, once the tall, well-known rocker with the stage act that was considered so sexy once that they had the curtain pulled down on him. Today he rarely if ever appears in the charts, but is always just not too far off. Chartwise however I think Marty will admit that he has not had anywhere near as much success as when he first hit the top. Now he is content with appearing on various pop shows, plus too appearing in more films. He also has more ambitions to be a songwriter and to produce his own records.

Although he has died out of the charts he is still rated as one of the most professional stage acts in show business.

Next on our list is Tommy Steele. A rocker from the fifties, when his hoarse voice could be heard shouting Rock With The Caveman, Whistling The Blues etc. on every radio set, and every TV channel. Today he is one of the richest and shrewdest of entertainers and after a number of early films which put him over not only as a pop singer but as a singer who appealed to all the family he is now content to appear on stage shows and in various productions, all of which have done fabulously well.

Cliff Richard. Now there's a name we know. But go back six years. Who is this lad on the stage with orange socks, bright yellow shirt and black tie? Bouncing about on white suede shoes and jet black trousers cut very tight. Yes, it's the Cliff of today, but looking younger and with sideburns that would have impressed any Elvis fan.

Today the same guy is now a household word and he appears on shows like the Royal Variety Performance. Not wearing orange socks either. Buttired in a dress suit and making the already handsome figure look more handsome than ever. It's Cliff who is the star who has come so very successfully from being one of the earlier rockers to one of today's biggest entertainers and indeed to being Britain's top popper. True his disc style has changed as well, and he now records slow ballads instead of Willie And The Hand Jive and Move It Baby.

Then comes one of the real stage rockers of the old days. Mean, moody and a violent stage performer who came up the hard way and knew it. Now rated Britain's No. 2 singer, Billy Fury has had strong chart success and although lagging behind Cliff slightly in the film world he is now making up for that with a vengeance. Today with a string of hit parade discs behind him Continued on Page 11

DISCussion

Hello then; and so on to the first full batch of new releases following the Christmas break. I'm all agog to watch the way of the pop world's trends during the first few months of this new year; with the tail end of the great dominance of the group era are we going to find something equally exciting or are we going to stagnate and let things just trickle along until we find someone else's bandwagon to climb upon? As we now hold the lead in the pop universe I say we must do all in our power to keep it that way; this can be achieved only by our composers, recording managers and artistes giving full rein to their creative abilities to COMPETE with any new trends from abroad. Let 1965 be as vibrantly alive and exciting as 1964. There are no signs of anything new in the releases for this week but there are some interesting discs; so let's DISCuss:

The Four Seasons. A pounding beat backs their new Philips release, "Save It For Me" and the "sound" of Frankie Valli is well to the foreground. There is something vaguely familiar about the melody and I found myself spinning the disc three or four times in an attempt to pinpoint it. A powerful disc, well-made.

On Decca, Bern Elliott goes solo and waxes all softly sentimental with his "Guess Who." A slow beater, this, with a "heavenly choir" backing. Bern handles the lyric to effect but the song itself is not of the stuff headlines are made, as pleasant as it is.

Following his smash hit of Walk Tall, Val Doonican turns to a slow, gentle lilter on Decca's "The Special Years." Strings and periodic harmonica add a lot of atmosphere and Val's deep, warm tones make for easy listening. (Did I hear somebody say that "here is the nearest voice to that of Jim Reeves?") It should do a lot of good for Val.

Cole Porter's famous "Wunderbar" is given an ear-catching revival by Zarah Leander; here is a powerful, deep-throated performance in the "grand manner" which comes off! There is a fascination throughout and the FFB Orchestra conducted by Willy Hoffmann makes this German recording on the Oriole label well worth a few spins.

Those renowned teenage "lovers" Paul and Paula are back with us on Philips with a revival of "No Other Baby." The simple melody is as pleasant as ever and Paul and Paula deliver the lyric with some charm but there is nothing very original to make the disc outstanding. Just two pleasant voices singing an easy-on-the-ear song with plenty of rhythm.

The much-heralded James Tamlin arrived on Columbia with "Is There Time?" A slowish, gentle beater with an easy melody. Despite the double-tracking, one can detect a warm personality in James's voice and the bouncy rhythm is quite infectious. A successful debut disc although not quite strong enough for top hitsville.

Young Elaine and Derek unite over "Invisible Tears," on the Decca label. It is easy on the ear and the treatment is foot-tapping but there is little individ-

uality to earmark the disc over and above many others of its kind. For example, although there are the two different voices of Elaine and Derek, it could just as easily be one voice double-tracked, strange to say. This is a pity because it robs the couple of any attraction they should claim on their own account.

*** BOUQUET ****

Of all the discs this week there is one which stands out on the counts of performance together with artistic and technical achievements. Cilla Black's cover version of You Lost That Loving Feeling is, perhaps, the more successful, for our home market. And certainly, Cilla does her most striking bit of work since Anyone Who Had A Heart! The disc has lots of "feel" and contrast; consequently, the attention is held throughout. The arrangement of this heavy dramatic ballad packs a punch and the whole thing welds together to maximum effect. Above the standard of this type of beat ballad. Congratulations all round.

On the Stateside label Del Shannon tells us to "Keep Searchin' (We'll follow the sun)." This is a self-penned offering from Del who lets himself go on a powerful handclapper. It is the kind of thing with which Del was enjoying big success quite a while back and, although well-performed, this one might be just a little too late for a big hit on today's market. It is, however, strong and familiar meat for the happy digestion of all Del's fans.

The Pickwicks have changed labels from Decca to Warner Brothers on their new beater called "Little By Little." It is even more essential than ever today for a group to have a vitally distinctive sound—on this disc The Pickwicks do not have that, unfortunately. It could well be A. N. Other group and this fact could rob them of any attention over and above that of their most ardent fans. The sound is a bit thin with the guitar dominating everything including the vocal for the most part. The group's own performance, as it stands, is clean cut and competent.

Parlophone's "Time Is On My Side" has a distinction of its own. Four Plus



One give a very concise performance of this slow beater but the strong point is the treatment given to the repeated title phrase; this will catch the imagination of many. For the rest, it is reminiscent of a few things including, perhaps, a slight shade of *The House Of The Rising Sun*. Anyway, it is an attention-getter which is always at least one rung up the ladder to start with.

Jackie Lynton, now on the Decca label, gives his own individual interpretation of the nursery rhyme "Three Blind Mice." Many variations on the theme here and it works up into a fair frenzy by the time the stylus reaches the run-out! This is a striking performance of the kind which you either love or hate. There can be no half-measures here and Jackie doesn't give any either. Here is novelty interest more than big hit interest, I feel.

On the Philips label you will be able to spot The Cheetahs! This group's "Soldier Boy" holds much interest because there is an attempt to be a little different. Not so much an ordinary group performance but more a production number with Femme chorus and a striking lead vocal. The sentiments of the lyric will make the disc an undoubted hit for "Two-Way Family Favourites" and the melodic appeal and overall sound should make it generally acceptable to most pop fans. So let's hope The Cheetahs gain that two-way attraction.

And there we are—more new releases next week when I hope you will join me once again for a DISCussion of the latest?
