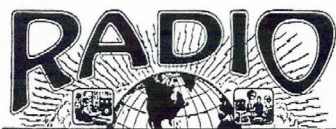

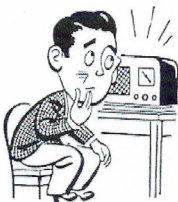

PUBLISHER'S COMMENTS

CHANGE IS GOOD!

This is the first issue of Antique Radio Classified since June 2014.

We stopped publishing due to financial and marketing reasons. Financial reasons are easy to explain – there is no way a small niche market magazine like A.R.C. can operate in the black in today's economic climate. The cost of printing and postage costs increased to about 75% of our budget. We were losing money.

Marketing reasons are a different story. The world has changed and to survive a person or company must change with it. I've met many people who in the last few years have lost their jobs due to certain industries disappearing or new industries replacing what was considered the "norm". In order to survive they have had to re-invent themselves to provide for themselves and family. A company isn't much different because due to market changes their expenses have increased and/or income decreased. A.R.C. will now change.

Beginning immediately, A.R.C. will be published on a monthly basis as an online only magazine. There will no longer be a printed edition. There was no other choice.

Our community needs a national publication to unite and keep us informed with articles, radio meet dates, information on radio clubs, advertising from vendors, etc.

I know some people will be happy that we have returned and others will be angry that the print edition is gone.

But after all is said and done and at the end of the day, there is no other way for the magazine to financially survive.

BENEFITS OF BEING ONLINE

In the past I have discussed the benefits of an online publication:

1. First of all, being online enables us to stay in business due to the reduced costs.

2. There is no limit on the number of pages in the magazine. In the past, we had to limit the number of pages by multiples of 16 pages (not including the covers) to achieve the most economical cost.

3. The printed magazine was only printed in black and white. The online edition can have everything in color including the photographs, diagrams, etc.

4. The subscription cost drops. There is no more First Class or Magazine Rate shipping of magazine. In the past a one year subscription was \$36.00 for Magazine Rate and \$48.00 for First Class. Now the subscription rate will be a flat \$30.00 a year.

5. Everyone will see the magazine at the same time because it will be available for viewing when it is posted on the web site.

6. What happens if you don't have a computer? Every library in this country now has computers to use. Usually at no cost. Most will print out articles of the magazine at no cost or a very low price. Mostly everybody has a friend or relative with a computer who will be happy to help you.

7. The list of benefits goes on and on.

There are things that still need to be worked out especially with the Classified Section. Since we haven't been published in a long time, the Classified Section in this issue is one page. We are all well aware that online sources such as eBay have for many years reduced the number of classified ads. My response is that you are welcome to pay eBay or other web sites 15% or more or you can advertise your items with us at a cost of next to nothing. Also, very important, there are very few places where you can advertise

“Wanted” listings. Remember, we require a name, address and contact information for our “For Sale” or “Wanted” items. Not just the screen name of an unknown person.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

Anyone who presently has a subscription will automatically receive the online subscription to fulfill their remaining subscription period.

WE NEED YOUR HELP

The biggest help you can give us right now, besides your support, are written articles. It can be a technical article, a write up of how your club is organized, a description of your latest radio meet with photographs, auction listings with descriptions and prices along with photographs, book reviews, photographs of your own collection for the Photo Review, and whatever else you would look for in a magazine for our community.

THIS MONTH IN A.R.C.

We have an article on the most important radio auction in decades. The John Terrey Auction – Session One will have the realized prices along with photographs.

Also we have the results from the Tekserv Radio Auction that took place last August in New York City.

There is an article on the last Kutztown Radio Show and a short article on by Dave Sica of the New Jersey Antique Radio Club on why he feels the use of computers and online books and magazines will be an asset to the antique radio community.

There will also be a book review on Alan Heil’s book Voice of America – A History. This is an important book on the history of shortwave radio and its effect in today’s world.

CONCLUSION

We know that a certain number of our readers will not be happy with this change. But the choice is change or disappear. I would rather keep the tradition alive.

Thank you for your support and I look forward to meeting you at a future radio meet.

THE JOHN TERRY AUCTION OF VINTAGE RADIOS

Who hasn't always wanted to go to one of those fancy auctions that you see on television or in the James Bond films. Whether the auction includes priceless pieces of artwork or high end performance automobiles like a Ferrari or the 1968 Ford Mustang GT driven by Steve McQueen, I've always thought about being present in the auction room.

I never had the chance to attend the Ralph Muchow radio auction in 2001 or the radio auction at the Henry Ford museum in 1995.

Well, this past September 18, 2016 and November 13, 2016 I had the opportunity to attend some high end auctions at the sale of The John Terrey Collection of Vintage Radios. Both auctions were held at "The Barn" on his property in Carlisle, MA outside Boston.

The auction had such importance that the Boston Globe published an article last August ([click here](#)) regarding the auction.

John Terrey has been collecting antique and vintage radios and various electronic

equipment since 1962 and has a collection of over 1000 items! Also, John has an extensive book and magazine collection pertaining to electronics and communications dating back to the late 1800's. And don't forget he was also the owner of this publication for 24 years.

The Auction Preview

The day prior to the first auction on September 18 myself along with many collectors were attending the Kutztown Radio Meet in Pennsylvania. I left Kutztown at 12 noon on Saturday and drove the 5 hours to Massachusetts in order to make it to the BBQ that John and his wife had for those who would be attending the auction on the following day. The food was excellent and with the 65 people attending the BBQ and auction preview it made for a wonderful evening. No expense was spared.

The Auction

The auction took place on the following day starting at 12noon and ending on time at approximately 6:00pm. There were over 300 items on the auction block. In the auction tent there were approximately 65 people. The professional auctioneer, Wayne Tuiskula of Central Mass Auctions had not only coordinated bids from the people in the tent but also had set up telephone and internet bidding. He had organized the entire bidding event and everything was coordinated without any issues. Instead of bringing each individual item out to the tent, a screen was set up in the tent to show which item was presently being bid on.

I forgot to mention, in addition to the previous night's dinner, John and his wife supplied breakfast (coffee and donuts) as well as lunch during the half-time break.

One of the nice things about the auction was that there was something for everyone. Yes, there were the high ticket items but there were also an auction of un-cataloged box lots as well as a tag sale of lower priced items.

Auction Results

Some of highlights of the auction include a Chicago Radio Labs model AGN2 detector and amplifier which sold for \$14,000, a Magnavox model AC3-P audio amplifier which brought a high bid of \$9,000, a RCA Theremin with model 106 speaker sold for \$5,500, and a Chicago Radio Labs PAR tuner for \$4,500. There were some surprises such as the Amrad model 2645 vernier variometer with an auction estimate of between \$100 and \$250 which sold for \$1025. The list goes on and on.

Conclusion

The auction was a great success not only for John but also because his collection has now been passed down to another generation.

The hospitality by John and his family cannot be measured.

The Kutztown Radio Show has turned out to be the largest radio show on the East Coast over the past 10 years.

The show is run by the Delaware Valley Historic Radio Club (DVHRC) and held at the Renninger's Antique Market in Kutztown, PA. The show is held twice a year in May and September.

The DVHRC, founded in 1991, is an active club dedicated to the collection and preservation of antique radios, televisions, electronic test equipment, and related items.

The DVHRC meets the second Tuesday of each month at the Telford Community Building in Telford, PA, about 25 miles north of Philadelphia. The club was founded in 1992 by Jay Daveler and a small group of radio enthusiasts from the Philadelphia area. The first meeting was held on February 4, 1992 and hosted by Tony Mollettiere at his business, North Penn Amusements in Souderton, PA. Thirteen people attended including Jay Daveler (President), Larry Hilgner (Vice-president), John Kern (Treasurer), Tony Mollettiere (Secretary) and his wife Sylvia, Pete and Jan Grave, Arnold Finkel and his wife, Mike Koste and Charlie Class. Shortly thereafter, meetings were moved to

their current location, the Telford Community Center in Telford, PA.

Since the Kutztown Radio Show was started in the mid 1990's, the DVHRC has hosted the Kutztown Radio Show at Renninger's Antiques and Farmer's Market in Kutztown, PA, an ideal location with plenty of covered space, parking and a nearby Farmer's Market with food and other attractions. The show is held twice each year, in May and September, and has grown into the premier radio event in the east attracting collectors and dealers from across the United States.

One of the best things about the show is the expert organization by Renninger's. They organize many swap meets, antique shows, etc. every year and they are extremely professional. During the show the organizers stop by your table(s) and ask if you would like to reserve the same location for the next show. A few weeks before the show you receive your passes and all the necessary information needed for the upcoming event. I've been attending the Kutztown show for about 10 years and have never had any problem. Another good thing about the show is that it is held in 2 pavilions under a covered roof with the sides open. I think one year it rained very hard



and the rain came in sideways but there were plastic sheets that hang down the sides that protect the vendors.

On the first day of the show the radio vendors set up in one of the pavilions and use half of the other pavilion. On Saturday, the other half of the second pavilion has been used by regular flea market people selling any items. I have heard a rumor that at the next show in May 2017 the radio people will occupy both pavilions entirely.

The show is "scheduled" to start on Friday morning and end Saturday 12noon. In the past few years some vendors have started to arrive early on Thursday and how some show up on Wednesday evening. In response to this, the organizers have changed some of the rules which will be discussed later in the article.

There is plenty of free parking in the showgrounds and acres of grass for free onsite camping.

The photographs shown are from the September 16-17, 2016 show.

Attendance

While the number of vendors at the show is huge so is the number of attendees. I have estimated approximately 400 people attend the show as either vendors or attendees.

Auction

Friday night there is an auction with a 15% commission for consignors and no buyer's premium. Preview is from 5:30pm to 6:00pm and the auction starts at 6:00pm. Bidder card is \$3.00.



New Rules for 2017

Starting with the May 2017 show, vendors can only set up after 12noon and will have to show their vendor space permits. Early buyers will not be permitted on Thursday without a dealer permit. Only vendors who are setting up are able to enter the showgrounds on Thursday.

The show will be open Friday 7:00am to 4:00pm and Saturday 7:00am to 4:00pm.

The spaces are 10' x 10' and cost \$40.00 which includes 1 table and electricity – bring your own extension cords. Extra tables are \$5.00 each.

I urge anyone who has never been to the Kutztown Radio Show to attend. There is something for everyone to buy or attend just to say hello to old friends.

TEKSERV RADIO AUCTION ROLAND AUCTIONEERS

AUGUST 23, 2016 NEW YORK CITY

Last summer the Tekserv Radio Auction was held in New York City.

The auction attracted a large crowd with over 100 bidders. While the owner of Tekserv was a collector of vintage electronics such as radios, tv's, audio equipment, etc., they asked Roland Auctioneers to conduct the auction.

While some of us might consider the collection to consist of "beginner" items, there were some very high end radio, television, and audio items. Some of the items were the RCA DX-77 microphone with stand that brought in \$1100, a Silver-tone 1807 wood tombstone radio with a high bid of \$250, the Philco Predicta went for \$425, KLH TR-82 FM radio \$175, a General Electric K-52 cathedral for \$200, Fisher 400C preamp had a high bid of \$600, a Universal Suspension Spring Microphone \$550, a newer model Vibroplex bug key \$175, and a Victor VV-260 low-boy windup phonograph \$325.

One of the big surprises was an Atwater Kent model 30 radio with matching speaker which had a high bid of \$425!

Tekserv was a well know early servicer and seller of Apple products in New York. It really was the precursor to the Apple Store! They originally opened in 1987 to serve the Apple and Mac community. They closed in 2016.

In my opinion they couldn't compete again the sleek and new Apple Stores. Due to its old world style, I feel many of us would liked to have visited the Tekserv facility.

Roland Auctioneers had been family owned since 1973 and is a well know and established name not only in the New York area but the rest of the country. They do appraisals, auctions, consignments, and estate purchases.

An e-Embarrassment of Riches

Antique Radio Classified is back. That's the good news. It's coming not to your mailbox, but to your email inbox. I'm probably as 'old school' as anyone when it comes to reading. I greatly prefer to hold a printed book, magazine or newsletter in my hands. I like to place a bookmark, or even sometimes to make pencil notes in the margin. And it's hard to take a computer into 'the library' if you know what I mean. But for so many specialty publications (and even longtime national publications like Newsweek) the reality of the publishing industry today means that horse has pretty much left the barn.

While I'm mixing my metaphors here, the fact is that there are a lot of publications I like to read that are only available online now. And others that cost significantly less to receive electronically. When my subscription to Newsweek magazine became 'online-only' I chose to cancel it as I did not relish the idea of reading a magazine on my computer. Shortly afterward, I got an iPad and found out that the experience of reading a magazine or a book on a tablet is pretty much the same as reading one on paper.

Even if it weren't, there are very real cost considerations. I choose to take delivery of my club's newsletter, the New Jersey Antique Radio Club "Broadcaster" online to help save the club the considerable cost of printing and mailing an eight-page newsletter each month. On those occasions when I just have to hold an issue in my hands, I can print out a copy easily enough.

For Antique Radio Classified (and many other publications) there is no longer any choice; the economic realities of printing and mailing a publication mean it can no longer be done at a cost that is acceptable to enough readers to make the operation sustainable.

BUT I come back to that iPad thing (And it doesn't have to be an iPad, any decent tablet will work). I like the 'full-sized' (nominally 10-inch screen) model, although you can read a book well enough on a smaller screen, typically 7-inches. And there are also larger models available. A new, top-of-the-line iPad will set you back many hundreds of dollars. But an older model like the one I have can

be had fairly inexpensively, sometimes for as little as thirty or forty dollars. The older models won't do all the things that a new tablet will do, but they make a nifty and inexpensive book reader.

Considering that it costs about \$18 a year to print and mail each copy of our club newsletters, a tablet could amortize its cost in as little as 2 years.

Many of the 'hobby' publications, like our club newsletter and A.R.C. are necessarily printed in black-and-white. Color printing has always been cost-prohibitive. But although the print version is only available in black-and-white, the online version comes in full color. That alone makes reading it on a tablet a superior experience. And if I want to print out a copy it can now be in color too if you have an inkjet printer.

There are other advantages to electronic delivery: you receive it immediately, as soon as it's sent. It won't get lost in the mail or be accidentally damaged during delivery. More importantly, you can usually click on the photos and illustrations and see a full-sized version. Or just click on a link in the story rather than having to go to the computer and type in the address from a printed copy.

Final benefit: a magazine weighs about a half pound. A softcover book might weigh a pound or two. My first-generation iPad weighs a pound and a half, about as much as one book, so it's comfortable enough to hold for long periods of time. And I have hundreds of books in my iPad yet it doesn't weigh an ounce of feathers more than it did when it was empty!

So there are many upsides and a few (unavoidable) downsides to reading books electronically. If you're like me and you disliked reading magazines online at your computer, try using a tablet and you may find the experience to be almost as good, and in many ways even superior to the old way.

Voice of America – A History

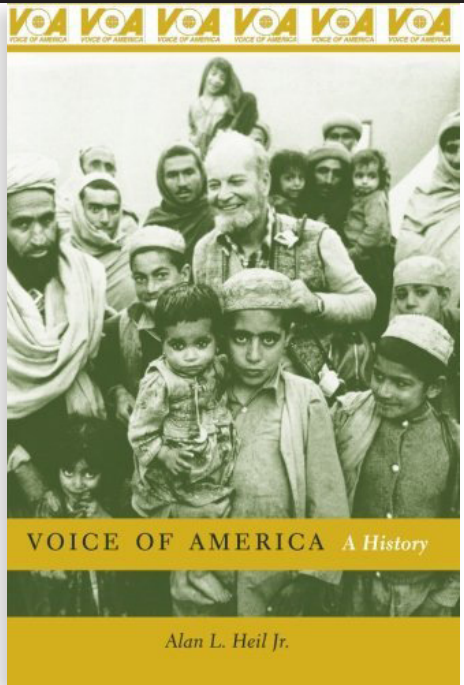

Having been involved in SWL activities in one way another for over 34 years, I have often listened to the Voice of America during that period. This giant of an international broadcaster certainly fills an important role for the United States Government through the communication of factual reporting and high journalistic reputation.

In recent times, however, I've had the feeling that the good old VOA hasn't been quite as unbiased as it used to be. Nothing like the right-wing conservative nonsense that FOX News puts out, mind you. But still, I have detected a stronger US Government line than used to be the case.

And so, it was with keen interest that I began reading Alan Heil's excellent history of the Voice of America. This is a marvelous book! And Alan has had to tread the fine line between listing dry historical facts and making the book something that encourages the reader to keep turning the pages.

For instance, the first chapter give a rather pacy and exciting account of the events surrounding Tiananmen Square in May and June of 1989. The author offers perspectives from both journalists on the ground in Beijing and the decision-making of VOA officials back in Washington. It seems that many of the thousands of Chinese protestors who crammed into the Square were getting their reliable and up-to-date news from radios all tuned to the VOA. Heil also quotes a statement from one very brave Radio Beijing announcer who broadcast what was probably that station's only truthful announcement about the massacre soon after the event. He was later send away by the Party Officials for "reeducation".



The author worked for The Voice from 1962 until he retired in 1998. He held various positions including foreign correspondent, chief of News and Current Affairs, and deputy director of programs.

It appears that VOA has, like many international broadcasters, struggled with limited funding for its operations. This was often apparent in the early years, and Heil's history spends some time on giving a view of how VOA staff coped with cramped facilities and old technology. The organization has also struggled to maintain journalistic integrity, endeavoring to provide fair and balanced reporting at all times, generally under great pressure from government officials. Heil often addresses this throughout the book.

Of particular interest to me as a long-time radio enthusiast were the chapters on the establishment of transmitter relay stations and how the broadcaster coped with the jamming of its broadcasts. Starting with Greenville, North Carolina, Heil gives a vivid description of what it's like to be a rigger on one of the largest curtain antenna

arrays in the world. In the 1960s, relay stations started to sprout like mushrooms in some of the very remote locations such as Liberia, Botswana and northern Costa Rica. The 1980s saw the construction of high powered relay sites in the Philippines and Thailand, and Heil talks about the importance of the medium-wave outlets that complemented these high frequency shortwave stations.

There is a brilliant account of the attack on the Monrovia Relay Station at the hands of Charles Taylor's rebels in early 1990. American supervisors were forced to return home while local Liberian employees heroically tried to keep the station on air. At the same time, some 20,000 terrified civilians fleeing the civil war were encamped on the relay station property. They managed to keep the station going for 14 weeks. During that time, Taylor's National Patriotic Front of Liberia (NPFL) rebels entered the compound and harassed refugees and station employees, and it was clear that some of the rebels were unhappy about how the VOA was reporting the civil war in Liberia. Eventually, the rebels closed the station, ordered the local VOA staff to flee, and went about trashing the \$17 million installation.

An equally fascinating story surrounds the building and opening of the Sao Tome relay facility. The President of the Republic had heard about the destruction of the Liberian transmitters and simply asked "Well, why don't they come here?" The site chosen was an old radio installation, long abandoned by the Portuguese, and had not been used for fifteen years. Constructing and operating the Sao Tome facility was filled with hardships. Nearly every American stationed there has had malaria at least once. About 10 percent of the Sao Tome staff has the disease.

The lengths that Soviet citizens would go to cope with jamming in order to hear broadcasts is also discussed in this book. For example, Dr. Yelena Bonner, wife of dissident Soviet physicist Andrei Sakharov, was reported to have sat in Gorgy Park with her husband, their portable radio and a note pad, listening to the news. They would switch shortwave frequencies and write down phrases, getting bits and pieces because they were so heavily jammed. Then they would listen to rebroadcasts later that night and fit all the pieces

together to learn what was happening.

There is also a story of a Russian jamming station which blocked VOA broadcasts for some forty years until it finally ceased operations in May 1987. This station was described as a being like a family enterprise, being run much like a lighthouse in other parts of the world. It's superintendents were a man, a woman and an aged mongrel dog. Later on, after the fall of the Soviet Empire, the station began relaying VOA Russian programming to hundreds of thousands of listeners!

The book also has some wonderful quotes from actual VOA news reports, written by journalists and VOA reporters around the world. Highlighted here are reports from the USS Midway, off the coast of Vietnam in 1975 during evacuation from the U. S. Embassy in Saigon, the invasion of Kuwait in 1991, and from a Refugee Camp in Macedonia in 1999.

Later, the book deals with the reporting of the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001. There are descriptions of the news reports as they went to air, plus the dilemmas facing VOA officials in making sure that they kept to the broadcaster's Charter and Journalistic Code.

If you are looking for an insight into one of the two big international broadcasters (the other one being the BBC), then this book is quite illuminating. It is well written, keeps the reader enthralled by recounting interesting stories and moments in the history of The Voice, and is a fascinating account of the amazing people who operate behind the scenes of the Voice of America.
