


A NEW ALBUM SAVE THE LAST DANCE MM DeFRANCOS THE DEFRANCO FAMILY FEATUR ONCE EVERY SO often life has a strange tendency of creeping up on unsuspecting people and teaching them one of its many essons.

Mike McGear caught in a tangle of personal battles, so far as show business concerned found himself taking the whole affair far too seriously and letting reporters and critics get him

He had spent ten years trying to break away from his famous "kid-brother" without just or practical reasons for doing so, and eventually. before reaching the end of

bis tather, quit show business completely. During an eight week absence from the hassles and problems of entertaining, Mike McGear learnt his lesson: "I saked myself what are asked myself what are asked myself what are saked myself what are saked myself what are saked myself which who will be and be that it as a giggle and you'll survive!" "Our kid (Paul) and me had been taking the whole business far too seriously when really it was all so irrelevant. So what if I to get together with our kid sometime? Black music really is today's sound — a glance at the charts will confirm that. Just pay a visit to the disco-pube and clubs which only a year ago were featuring almost exclusively rock music and you'll find most have swung over to a near 100 per

cent soul policy.

Up North the Northern Sounds' craze for rare oldies has reached epic proportions with all-nighters drawing thousands of fans each week to places like Blackpool Mecca, Wigan Casino and Stoke Heavy Steam Machine.

In the South it's the funky sounds which proliferate but here too there's a strong oldies scene with many DJs concentrating on classics from the great years of

Motown, Stax and Atlantic.
Each month Body 'n' Soul will bring you the news and views on this thriving scene with top-star interviews and expert reviews.

SOUL'S SECOND COMING

SOUL music's '74 revival is bringing many neglected stars back to fame after years in the comparative doldrums. Chuck Jackson, Bobby Bland, and, most notably, the one-time Atlantic "Soul Clan" members like Solomon Burke, Wilson Pickett

Mercy man Don Covay see-saws back with the big boom and Don Covay are all consistently back in the US charts.

Ironically, none of those three Atlantic men who spearheaded that label's unique sound during the Sixties is still contracted to the company.

"The old Soul Clan, yeah that was really something. We're teaming up again though for a movie which I wrote the screenplay for.

"We're financing and producing the whole thing ourselves. It's all about how a beautiful young soul sister brings together some rather varied

characters and exploits them to raise funds for a social programme.

"Joe Tex will be playing a rich black power con man; Solomon Burke will be a minister, and I'll be a playboy.

"It's a big venture but I spent seven years in a film - making school and I've been commuting out to California as an actor so I guess I should be ready for it now."



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
