

THE SOUND OF THE ...

ICKY TESCO didn't tell me his real name. I didn't press him on the subject.

After all it might be Seinsbury, or even Fine Fare. Tesco fits rather well for somebody like him, someone who looks a bit cocky, a bit of a try-anything sort of bloke, definitely one of the lads. It comes as no surprise when he says, "Course, I always wanted to be a rock and roll star."

So do a lot of people and they don't get onto Top Of The Pops. Tell us about your gruelling climb to the top, Nicky.

"Ah, well. I gatecrashed a party at this

rehearsal studio and I was being obnoxious to all these guys who were in bands. So somebody got annoyed and said 'Why don't you form your own band and we'll see what you can do?' So I turned up the following week with a load of mates and that was the

get bookings for The Members.

ATTHIS stage, in mid-1977, the line-up of the band had stabilised at Gary Baker (guitar), Jean-Marie Carroll (guitar), Chris Payne (bass) and Adrian Lillywhite (drums). Plus, of course, Tesco on vocals and leaping around. Apart from the replacement of Gary Baker by Nigel Bennett, this is how they are today.

After going through the usual 99 miles per hour punk-pogo phase, The Members settled down to experiment with more demanding musical forms. For instance, regges.

Tesco admits that he'd no idea what punk rock was until he saw The Stranglers on TV. "I'd always listened to Big Youth and Bob Marley and Burning Spear, I think we looked to reggae like the Rolling Stones used to look to R&B music. As a sort of inspiration."

One listen to The Members mighty new single, "Offshore Banking Business", will convince you that those reggae influences have been very worthwhile. They manage to get a very strong reggas feel without sounding as if they're just copying Jamaican music. A lot of people have tried and failed to achieve that sound. How come The Members, working in a studio not a stone's throw from Marble Arch, managed to pull it off?
"Ah, well you see," says Nicky, as if he's

letting us in on the secret of eternal life, "we like to work while it's hot. Then your fingers can handle the beat."

I have visions of The Members surrounded

by paraffin heaters and smothered in scarves and mufflers.

THEIR FIRST hit was, as you know well, "Sound Of The Suburbs", a scathing but humorous look at life in the semi-detacheds

and tree-lined evenues of most of the South of England. This is, in fact, where much of the population lives; although if you were to listen to most punk bands, you'd assume the world was just one big high-rise block of flats.

"That all started when we played a 21st birthday party for this rich young lord. We got shoved away in the dressing room and treated like dirt. We were thinking about The Clash and all that stuff about the Sound of the Westway, and we thought the bound of the like the Suburbs' Sound.

"See, we all grew up with the jets from Heathrow going over the top all the time. We lived neer Broadmoor Mental Home and they used to test their siren every single Monday morning. Now, when you hear thetyou don't

forget it in a hurry."
In fact "Sound Of The Suburbs" is part of a trilogy of songs, along with their first single "Solitary Confinement" and the title track from their upcoming album, "At The Chelses Nightclub", which tells the story of a young lad from the suburbs coming up to town on a Saturday night looking for some action.

Tesco insists that he wants to make music about, and for, the thousands of kids who just live normal unglamorous lives. As he says, "Not everybody is like the people who go down The Marquee."

"OFFSHORE Banking Business" deals with rather different matters, however. Written by guitarist Jean-Marie Carroll (better known as simply J.C.), it's all about some rather suspicious goings on in the world of

international finance. "J.C. used to work for this merchant bank. He got to know about all these businesses that used to put all their money through offices in Nassau and Jamaica in order to avoid the tax they owe. They'd just have this office with one guy in it, and officially that would be classed as a bank."

It's a tribute to The Members that they can handle a subject as controversial and political as this without sounding in any way pompous or opinionated. The whole thing is enormous fun, and one of the most commercial singles I've heard so far this year. 1979 has definitely been a good year for The

Members. They've had their first hit and started their first major tour, as support for Eddie & The Hot Rods. But the pace can begin to tell. When I spoke to Tesco, the band were just in the middle of rehearsing a new bass player in order to complete their tour.

Chris Payne, the bassman, had collapsed in Bradford the previous night from nervous exhaustion, the result of a sudden exposure to the rigours of constant late nights, cold halls and endless hours in the back of a van , all the little pieces of torture that make up

Anyway, they're giving him time to recover life on the road. and adjust and then they'll be back on tour, this time on their own. Like everybody else, they really wouldn't swap it for anything. Good lads, The Members. Watch 'em go.



LET'S GO straight into news of the new disco sounds: Linda Clifford, the lady who had a hit last summer with "Runaway Love", is back with a new single which - believe it or not - is a disco version of "Bridge Over Troubled Water". After Sylvester's "I (Who Have Nothing)", which is really something else, it makes you wonder what will be the next oldie to get the disco treatment.

Talking of oldies, the Beach Boys and Mike Oldfield are the latest rock artists to get the disco bug. Both are trying to cash in on the disco market — following Blondie's lead maybe? with their new releases. Me, I'll stick with the real thing (no, not the group, but my favourite disco artists like Herbie H., Instant Funk and good old Sylvester).

I went up to Fantasy the other day to pick up a Sylvester 12 Inch and also came away with Instant Funk's superb new album "Got My Mind Made Up" — it contains an eight-minute remix of the title track which is so good that I'd buy the album just for that.

Even though we're only in April, I think I've chosen my favourite slow record of '79 - the Pointer Sisters version of a Bruce Springsteen song, "Fire" (you'll find the words in this

I haven't heard Dyan's album yet but if it's all as exciting as this it can't be bad.

SIOUXSIE & THE BANSHEES: The Staircase (Mystery) (Polydor, pic bag). Apart from the fact that most of today's records are heavier sounding, a large chunk of '70s new wave seems to be evolving into re-runs of either '50s rock 'n' roll, early '60s beat-pop, or, as in this case, late '60s acid-rock The "mystery" of the song is solved if you speculate that the band were zonked out of their brains when they wrote it. Hypnotically fascinating, as is the flip, "M Factor". On the 12in version both songs are intertwined on one side of the world's first 'double groove' single. Tricky stuff, eh what?

SIDE EFFECT: Disco Junction (Fantasy). Everyone vibrates on his or her own particular wavelength. Side Effect have just found mine. I wouldn't claim this is a great disco/funk record but if your pulse beats in a similar time to mine it'll get

you dancing quicker than any other current release. Care to bump awhile?

SQUEEZE: Cool For Cats (A&M. pic bag). Deadpan delivery of a brilliant song about ... er . well, it's life, innit? Four of David Bowie's earliest recordings (he was lead singer of both groups in 1965), packaged together for fans and collectors who have been offering small fortunes to get hold of the original two rare singles. To me the tracks are clumsy, amateurish efforts that represent the very worst side of the '60s beat group era - but I'l say no more for fear of finding mysalf croaking on a lily pad next to our princely album reviewer.



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
