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



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

ADAM left readers of the London Standard in no doubt of his intentions with The Prince Charming Revue. "I am going." he told the paper's showhiz eyes out of their skulls.

What actually happened was a little different. The Revue was well put together hut hardly very original. It takes more than three set changes, a couple of videos and a dance troupe to hlow this
